

OREGON MOTORIST DECLARES ASHLAND LAWS O. K. NOW

In the April issue of the Oregon Motorist, there was published an article under the heading "Beware of Ashland Speed Cop!" calling attention to the fact that there had been numerous complaints made regarding unfair tactics used by the Ashland police in the regulation of traffic through that city. Judging from the storm of protests which have been received by the Motorist, and the general office of the association, the business men of Ashland did not relish this bit of publicity, and they have asked that their city be set right with the motoring fraternity. Some of those who protested absolutely disclaimed that the city traffic police were unfair and over-zealous in the performance of their duties, while others practically admitted the charge, but said that action had been taken to see to it that the officers used better judgment in the future.

It is not the policy of the Oregon State Motor association to countenance in any manner the infraction of the traffic laws of any community in the state, nor to discriminate against any city, but neither does it countenance anything that will tend to arouse resentment in the minds of visiting motorists, such as freak traffic ordinances and the enforcement of such. The general run of automobilists are good sports, fair minded and perfectly amenable to just laws, but they are quick to resent any unfair or unreasonable regulation, and they are not slow to make that resentment felt by advising their brother motorists to shun any city, which does not extend fair treatment. In the case of Ashland, according to the information received at the main office of the association, there is little doubt but that there was cause for complaint but now that the citizens of the bustling little city near the California line have been brought to "see the light," we would ask motorists to forget the pang. We feel satisfied that there will be no further cause for complaint in that community.—Oregon Motorist.

WOMAN ANIMAL HUNTER BAGS TEN COYOTES

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 30.—The first woman predatory animal hunter to be employed by the federal bureau of biological survey in this state is Mrs. George T. Rose of Deep Creek, Spokane county, who already has ten coyote pelts to her credit. Her greatest pelt is "three foot," a coyote who lost one paw in a trap several years ago and has been a menace in that section of the country for the past fifteen years. George T. Rose, who is the regularly employed hunter in the Deep Creek country, disposed an elbow recently and his wife immediately took his place. She was placed on the federal payroll today by Glenn H. Bach, predatory animal inspector.

30 PER CENT VOTE IN PRIMARY, 593 VOTES SWORN IN

At the primary election held May 19th, 3841 republican and democratic votes were cast, out of the county clerk's estimate of 11,293 votes in Jackson county, showing a vote of about 30 per cent at the primary. 3936 votes were polled by the republicans, and 815 by the democratic party. Workers in the political vineyard were busy on primary day, the poll books show. In the county 593 votes were sworn in. Of this number practically none were of the democratic faith. About 15 per cent of the total vote cast was sworn in.

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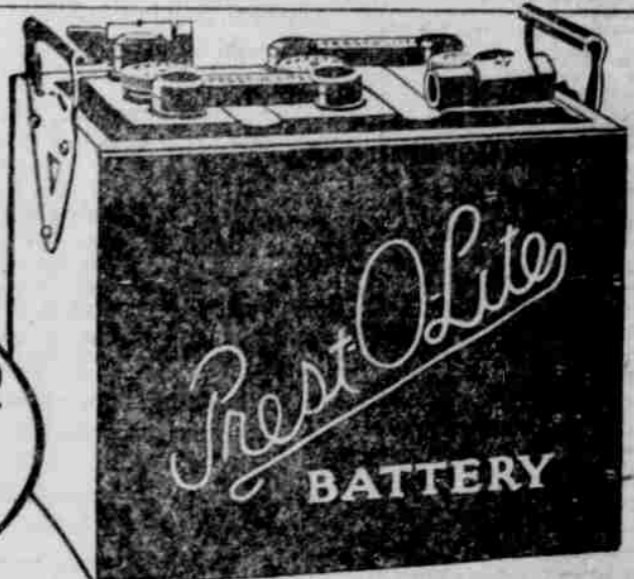
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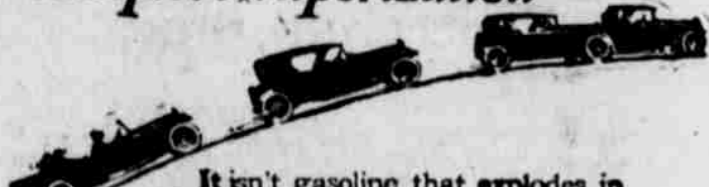


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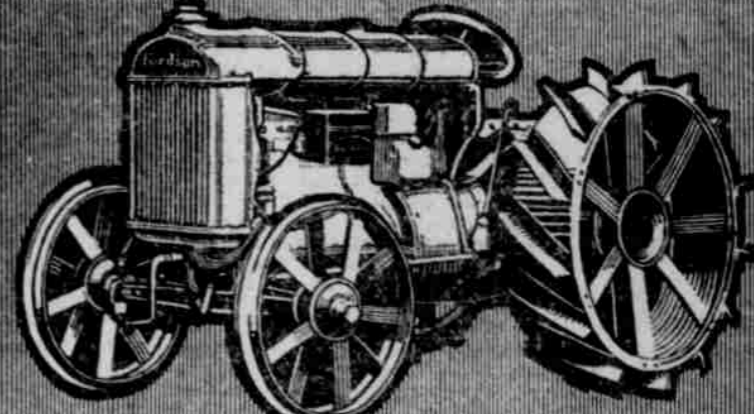
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
