GIRL ASKS \$10,000

"Diarthrosis" Disease Makes One
Saxophone Moan Cause
1,000 Quivers

CHICAGO, May 23.—Modern dancing
did so much to Miss Marie Ehlers
she has sued Ernie Young, a theatrical
promoter, for \$10,000. She says she is
suffering from "diarthrosis." In her
bill she states she also has con-
tracted a disease which causes her
limbs and body to quiver when she
hears jazz music.

CIVILIZATION.

IT IS explained that the tragic loss of life on the English liner
Egypt, when rammed in a fog, was due to the conduct of the Las-
car crew. The East Indian sailors, terrified by their danger, swept
aside the women and children and seized the life preservers and life-
boats for themselves. The result was the death of scores of pas-
sengers who might have been saved, along with the sailors themselves,
if the latter had kept cool heads and shown true sportsmanship.

Compare this sordid picture with that of the ship printer, a man
named Genner, as the ship was sinking. He had buckled on his life
belt when he saw a woman unable to reach a lifeboat and possessing
no belt. He took off his own belt and handed it to her, saying: "I
can't swim madam; but no matter. Tell my wife at Dover." The
woman was saved, and he was drowned.

CATCHING THE HABIT.

AMERICANS learn with surprise that the treaties resulting from
the Washington arms conference are not yet in effect, and are
not likely to be for some time to come. They do not become opera-
tive until all of the signatory powers have ratified them and exchanged
ratifications, and the United States is the only one of the five big
powers that has taken the necessary steps.

Japan has ratified the Shantung agreement, and is expected to
ratify the important five-power pacific treaty at any time. But when
Great Britain, France and Italy will ratify is problematical. There
is even a possibility that France may never do so at all, for that coun-
try seems strangely inclined of late to play a lone hand in interna-
tional affairs, and she gave her preliminary assent at Washington
unwillingly.

Why the powers should delay action is not explained. They have
been busy with the Genoa conference, but that hardly accounts for
so long a delay. They have had time enough to ratify, if they wanted
to, in these four months. There is some ground for suspecting that
perhaps they want to punish Uncle Sam a little, for his refusal to ratify
a certain other treaty and his disinclination to participate more
fully in international affairs.

MORE ROBBERIES
AT CENTRAL POINT

Burglars broke into the Ross and
Ross confectionery store at Central
Point Monday night, and stole about
\$300 worth of tobacco—chewing and
smoking, candy, old French and
United States coins. The same night
—probably the same gang of prow-
lers—broke into the Central Point
service station and stole 11 auto
tires, two fire extinguishers and an
inner tube.

Arrests in the two crimes are ex-
pected shortly. The latest burglar-
ies confirms the sheriff's office theory
that two gangs of thieves have been
operating in the country districts
this winter, a burglary in Central
Point being almost a regular monthly
occurrence.

Leo Summers and Jack Law, con-

Salem, to a series of rural section
robberies.

INSURANCE CASE
STARTS J'VILLE

The civil suit of the A. W. Walker
Auto company of this city against the
Fireman's Fund Insurance company
was begun in the circuit court today,
for \$10,717.77 alleged to be due for
the destruction of 17 used automo-
biles, and a tractor and a truck, in a
fire on the evening of February 11,
1921, in a building used as a ware-
house on South Grape street, \$8947.27
being asked for the used cars, and
\$1770.40 is asked for the truck and
tractor. The defendant is represent-
ed by Reames and Reames, as attor-
neys, and the Plaintiff by Attorneys
Gus Newbury and E. E. Kelly.
The entire morning session was de-
voted to the securing of a jury.

POLITICS BLAMED BY GATES

(Continued from Page One)

has originated in Portland and other
parts of the state, beyond stray items
appearing now and then in Portland
and Salem newspapers that he was
looked upon as a possible or probable
independent candidate. He also stated
that some time ago when it appeared
that Governor Olcott had won the nom-
ination over Charles Hall, the Ku Klux
Klan candidate, several men from the
northern part of the state had called
him up by phone and asked him if he
would not entertain the idea of run-
ning as an independent candidate for
governor.

The mayor did not take this ques-
tion seriously at the time or since,
and so stated to the inquirers and
local friends with whom he talked
about the matter. He so informed all
telephone inquirers from the north to-
day. The mayor has also received a
number of inquiries of this nature,
which were answered the same as the
telephone inquiries.

Mayor Gates has been a very active
worker on the state fair board and is
chairman of a number of its important
committees. In fact contracts and
other important business relating to
the coming state fair are piled on his
desk, and more coming in with every
mail, awaiting his signature and views.
He will have to hurry this state fair
business out of the way by tonight as
the governor's edict retires him as
state board member June 1st.

Beyond his formal reply to Governor
Olcott's dismissal letter, published
above, Mayor Gates had no statement
for publication on the affair today.

The press version of the ousting is
as follows:

SALEM, May 30.—C. E. Gates of
Medford was today notified by Gov-
ernor Olcott of his removal as a mem-
ber on the state fair board, effective June
1. The removal, the governor explains,
in a letter to Gates, is made for the
"good of the service."

Further than this, Governor Olcott
refused to comment on his action in
removing Gates, who was appointed to
the fair board shortly before the state
fair last fall.

Speculation here, however, has it
that the removal of Gates, who is
said to be an active Ku Klux Klan-
man, signifies a general house
cleaning which may be expected to
include all Klansmen who might be
found within the ranks of the of-
ficial family.

The name of Gates has been prom-
inently mentioned as an independent
candidate for governor in the No-
vember contest, with the backing of
the K. K. K. Gates, it is understood,
sought the endorsement of the fed-
erated societies for his candidacy and
only withdrew from the gubernator-
ial race when this endorsement was
not forthcoming.

The letter of the governor to Gates
reads as follows:

"This is to advise you that you are
removed as a member of the state
board of fair directors, such removal
to become effective June 1, 1922. This
action is taken under the provisions
of section 4433, Oregon laws, for the
good of the service."

The governor stated Monday that
he has another man in mind for the
post and that the announcement of
his appointment could be expected
within a few days.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29.—The
California-Oregon Power company
has been authorized by the state rail-
road commission to issue and sell at
not less than \$90 a share, \$200,000 in
7 per cent preferred stock to finance
its construction programme. The
company recently issued \$1,000,000
in stock for the work, but found this
inadequate.

The present issue is needed to
build a transmission line to connect
the company's plant with that of the
Mountain States Power company and
for work on its Copeco, Cal. plant.

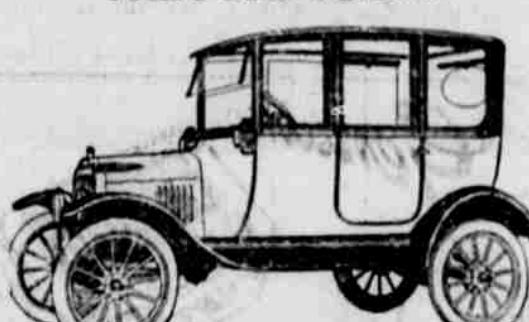
