

LOCAL MERCHANTS GIVE PRIZES IN MANUAL TRAINING

Thursday afternoon at the high school manual training exhibit the best pieces of furniture will be selected. Local merchants have very generously offered the following prizes: The Medford Furniture & Hardware Co., a prize of \$10 value in tools to be given for the best piece of furniture; the Big Pine Lumber Co., a prize of \$5 for the best piece of furniture made of Oregon fir; the Southern Oregon Hardware Co., a prize of \$2.50 value in Silleto tools for the second best piece of furniture whether oak, mahogany or fir. All work is to be judged upon workmanship and finish.

The boys are taking great interest and each is working hard putting the finishing touches on his piece so that it may be looking its best.

Throughout the year over sixty boys have been taking manual training, some for one semester, some for two, and nearly every boy has a fine piece or two on exhibit. This work ranges from the first practice pieces, such as book ends and foot stools to the more advanced problems of oak library tables, mahogany tea wagons and cedar chests. In addition there will be a demonstration at the wood lathe and an exhibit of work done in wood turning. The 8th H. boys of Washington school will have an exhibit of baskets and flower holders made of art fibre cord which they have finished in the last two weeks. Mr. Mentzer, the instructor will show a chair, which he made of the same material, only to show the possibilities of art fibre weaving and its coming place in connection with manual training.

Mr. Mentzer assures the patrons of the school that their time will be well spent in looking over the exhibit, and that a view of the crowded conditions under which the work is produced will be a convincing demonstration of how badly Medford needs a new high school building.

In addition to the manual training exhibit, Miss Carroll and Miss Heywood of the domestic arts and science departments will have their work on display. All visitors to these departments will be served with refreshments. Everyone can afford at least one visit a year to the high school, and Thursday will be an interesting time to make that visit.

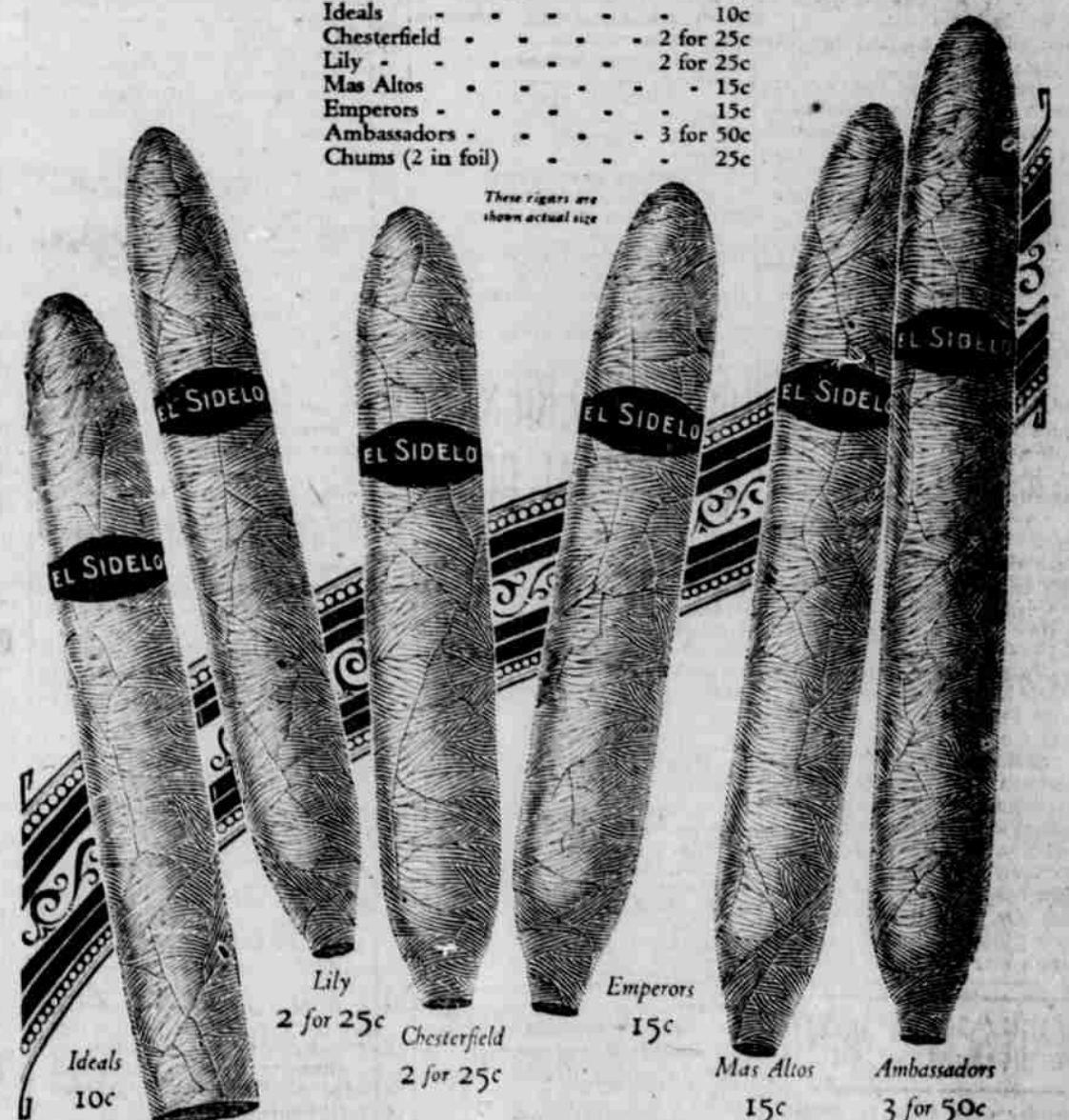
