PARIS, June 1.—(By the Associated Press)—The finance commission of the chamber of deputies today voted an appropriation of 11,000,000 francs to defray the expenses of the 1924 Olympic games in Paris.

U. S. EXPORTS TO EUROPE INCREASED MONTH OF APRIL

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Exports to Europe increased during April as compared with the same month last year but exports to South America declined. It was shown in trade reports issued today by the commerce department.

Imports from both Europe and South America declined.

Exports to Europe during April aggregated \$182,000,000 compared with \$175,000,000 in April a year ago, while imports were valued at \$56,000,000 against \$69,000,000 in April 1921.

For the ten months ended with April, exports to Europe were \$1,711,000,000 against \$3,054,000,000 during the same months last year, while imports for the period amounted to \$680,000,000 compared with \$822,000,000 during the ten months ended April 1921.

Exports to South America for April aggregated \$18,000,000 compared with \$21,000,000 a year ago and imports totaled \$23,000,000 against \$31,000,000 in April last year.

Exports to South America for the ten months ended with April reached a total value of \$152,000,000 compared with \$188,000,000 during the corresponding months of 1921, while imports for the same period were \$122,000,000 against \$142,000,000 during the same ten months last year.

INTEREST RATE FARM LOAN BANKS CUT

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Reduction in the rate of interest charged farmers by federal land banks from six to five and one-half per cent effective today was announced yesterday by Commissioner Lobdell of the farm loan board.

The reduction in the rate, Mr. Lobdell explained, was the result of the successful flotation of \$75,000,000 in 4½ per cent farm loan bonds, the proceeds of which are now available for loaning purposes.

WEATHER MAN CRAZY, SNOW IN CHEYENNE

CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 1.—Snow fell generally in central and southern Wyoming yesterday and today is having its first "white" June first within the memory of the oldest inhabitants. It began to snow here late yesterday afternoon and continued late into the night. The temperature is moderate.

Stop Hay Fever at That First Sneeze



With the coming of spring and blossoms, hay fever becomes quite common. In the women's clinic in Washington, a cure has been perfected which involves the placing of pollen of plants likely to cause hay fever on tiny scratch marks on the forearm of the patient. The pollen causes a slight swelling around the scratch and the treatment is then directed against that specific pollen.

PRINCE OF WALES NOW FILM STAR, RELEASED JUNE

LONDON, June 1.—(By the Associated Press)—The Prince of Wales will appear in the new role of premier British film star when the official cinematographic record of his world tour, in a series of six two-reel episodes will be released simultaneously with his return to England in June. These films later will be exhibited in America.

Three camera men were attached to the royal party and they made an intimate record of the prince's journey, which it is claimed will rival the best American thrillers.

The prince is featured landing at Bombay, in parades and gymnastics, riding winners in Indian race tracks, watching the famous devil dancers, visiting the tomb of Agra and the gold domed mosque of Lahore and tiger hunting in Nepal. It is stated that the prince objected to posing as a big game hunter, consequently he will not be shown in the act of shooting.

The film begins with an unposed picture of the prince taken unawares. It bears the subtitle of one of his most familiar comments: "Photographers are a nuisance."

H. G. Wells is considering entering British politics, but says he does not intend to stand for parliament at the present. The novelist has been nominated Lord Rector of the Glasgow university by the student adherents to the labor party.

Lord Birkenhead and Sir John Simon are the unionist and liberal nominees opposing Mr. Wells. According to the novelist, the nomination provides an opportunity of testing what welcome awaits him if he takes a direct interest in political affairs. Mr. Wells claims no connection with any political party and assumes that the nomination does not commit him to strict adherence to the labor program. He says he is a socialist, educationalist and a republican.

ARMOR PLATE PLANTS CLOSED BY PARLEY

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Large manufacturers who have supplied armor plate, ordnance, torpedo and other supplies to the navy have notified the navy department that because of the armament limitation treaty and consequent falling off in government orders they will close their plants. Rear Admiral McVey, chief of ordnance, told the senate naval committee. Some of the private plants, and the government's armor plate plant in West Virginia have been closed and others are to shut down as soon as the naval limitation treaty is ratified by all the signatory nations. Admiral McVey informed the committee.

Cotton Exchange Members Fired
NEW YORK, June 1.—Three members of the New York cotton exchange today were suspended for six months each for conduct detrimental to the best interests of the exchange. They are A. H. Lamborn, A. J. Marks and John P. Clark.

SENATOR CAPPER INTRODUCES NEW BD. TRADE BILL

WASHINGTON, May 31.—A new bill for regulation of future trading on grain exchanges, designed to meet the recent decision of the supreme court holding the present trading act inoperative in part, was introduced in the senate today by Senator Capper, republican, Kansas, chairman of the unofficial agriculture bloc and author of the original act.

In presenting his new measure Senator Capper said it had the support of the agriculture bloc and of Secretary Wallace and others of the department of agriculture. It was referred to the agriculture committee.

The bill is similar to the act declared inoperative by the supreme court except that its fundamental principle is based upon the power of congress to regulate interstate traffic. The bill like the present law, provides for designation and regulation of "contract markets" by the secretary of agriculture and for admission to grain exchanges of farmers' co-operative associations, the latter a provision opposed vigorously by the established boards of trade.

"Another important change," said Senator Capper in a statement explaining the new bill, "is the provision which substitutes regulation of the use of the mails and interstate commerce for the taxing provisions of the previous statute. A further provision not found in the preceding statute is designed to give the secretary of agriculture power to deal with the question of grades that may be delivered on contracts, premiums and discounts, inadequate elevator capacity and any other conditions that may have similar importance in relation to the price and executions of contracts."

TWO SUICIDES A DAY IS AVERAGE EX-SERVICE MEN

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 1.—The worst casualties suffered by American soldiers during the world war are just beginning to show themselves. By contrast troops wounded on the battlefields are lucky compared with the greatly increased casualties of today, according to C. H. Harris, an official of the American Legion's national headquarters here in charge of ex-soldier claims against the government.

There is an average of two ex-soldier suicides a day, Mr. Harris declares following a study of reports. These men, Mr. Harris finds, almost without exception were in the battle-lines in France. These soldiers, the legion official contends, were discharged by army doctors as normal. Since the war, however, these men, struggling for a living, have undergone mental anguish that their war-racked nerves could not withstand.

There are two ways in which the Legion hopes to minister to these mental cases and to prevent their increase, Mr. Harris points out. The Langley bill, now law, provides \$15,

000,000 for the construction of new hospitals. The larger portion of this money is to be spent in creating facilities for treating the neuropsychiatric, mental patients. The legion is also preparing to petition congress to liberalize the present Sweet bill. This bill now makes it impossible for an ex-soldier to obtain government treatment for war injuries which show up more than two years after discharge from service. The legion contends that it might easily be five years after discharge before injuries,

physical and mental effects of his service would appear.

Maryland Follows Oregon

BALTIMORE, June 1.—The state of Maryland today added to the high cost of gasoline when it began collection of a tax of one cent a gallon on gasoline used in motor vehicles. The money will be used to reduce a long standing deficit of \$1,100,000 in the maintenance funds of the roads commission.
