BROADHURST
ATTACKED ON
SHIP AT SEA

Noted Playwright and Producer Victim of Murderous Assault By San Francisco Man—Life Saved By a Woman Who Wields Revolver—Mysterious Case.

BALTIMORE, June 2.—John Barnes Symer, a San Francisco business man, was held under \$5000 bail on a charge of assault on the noted playwright, George H. Broadhurst, at a hearing before a United States commissioner here today.

The assault is reported to have taken place aboard the steamer Columbia shortly before she touched at Havana. The ship reached this port today.

BALTIMORE, June 2.—When the steamer Columbia docked here today from San Francisco, United States officials placed George H. Broadhurst, noted playwright and producer of New York and J. B. Symer of San Francisco, under detention as the result of an alleged murder assault committed by Symer upon Broadhurst, while the vessel was on the high seas.

According to Mrs. Bradley, Broadhurst's stage director, at midnight on the night of May 27, when the Columbia was just off Havana, a man dashed up to her on the deck and told her that Broadhurst was being murdered. Going to the latter's cabin, she said she saw Broadhurst stretched on the floor, covered with blood, with Symer swaying above him. She obtained a pistol from a drawer and ordered Symer from the room. She said that she would have shot him had not other passengers interfered.

Mrs. Bradley stated that Broadhurst was suffering from pneumonia at the time of the assault and was powerless to defend himself. Symer occupied the state room next to Broadhurst.

When the Columbia docked she was met by a local attorney employed in the interest of Symer.

Passengers declared Broadhurst held aloof all during the passage from San Francisco. He had his cabin changed several times during the voyage.

FIND KLANSMAN
GUILTY ROBBERY

BAKERSFIELD, June 2.—William Pickens, a member of the Ku Klux Klan, was found guilty by a superior court jury yesterday of assaulting and robbing Clyde Ritchey, taxicab driver, late yesterday. Three more indictments against members of the Klan are pending.

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—The Los Angeles county grand jury convened today to resume its inquiry into the activities of the Ku Klux Klan in the county. Two witnesses were subpoenaed. They were C. R. Isham, formerly secretary to Grand Goblin W. S. Coburn and Dr. Dwight Nathan of Taft, Cal., who was beaten by masked men in his home community several weeks ago.

The hearing of these additional witnesses was expected to delay the presentation of the grand jury reports on its inquiry into Klan activities until some time next week.

\$50,000,000 for Roads.
WASHINGTON, June 2.—The deadlock over federal roads between the senate and house was broken today when their conferees reached a compromise by which \$50,000,000 will be available during the next fiscal year for continuing federal and state co-operation in road development.

PRICE OF COAL
BOOSTED AFTER
HOOVER RULING

Chicago Retailers Raise Price 25 to 50 Cents Per Ton—Hoover Advises Consumers to Check Up Costs and Demand Square Deal.

CHICAGO, June 2.—Increases of 25 to 50 cents a ton for coal on the retail market yesterday were fore-runners of further advances after existing supplies are exhausted, according to leading dealers today. Retailers declared the rise was one of the results of the Washington conference of coal operators Wednesday when Secretary Hoover approved a maximum price of \$2.50 a ton for spot coal at the West Virginia mines. Those retailers predicted that West Virginia coal would go to \$3 a ton within a few days, an advance of \$1.75.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—With conferences looking to a price agreement for their district still to be held with the operators of producing fields in Pennsylvania, Secretary Hoover has secured the agreement of operators producing eighty per cent of the bituminous coal now being mined to a maximum price of \$2.50 a ton at the mine for the duration of the strike.

In making this announcement last night Secretary Hoover said he regretted that a small minority of the operators, representing western Kentucky, had refused to co-operate and were demanding \$4.25 a ton, a price which he said he did not feel justified in advising the public to accept, although production costs were higher than in other fields.

In purchasing spot coal—the prices not affecting coal under contract—consumers can insure themselves a square deal Mr. Hoover said, by checking freight rates, together with the maximum price established and making proper allowance for retail distribution costs. Consumers not receiving fair treatment as to prices may appeal to the department of commerce, he said, with assurance that an inquiry into their cases will be instituted.

Falls 6 Stories and
Walks to the Doctor

SHREVEPORT, La., June 2.—After falling six stories from his office window yesterday, G. M. Wallace, lawyer, picked himself up and asked the way to the nearest doctor, as he believed he had hurt himself. His fall was broken by heavy wire netting over a skylight through which he plunged. He was only slightly injured, his doctor said today.

Mine Owner Electrocuted.
BUTTE, Mont., June 2.—Walter L. Thompson, part owner of the Torrey mine near Salmon, Idaho, was electrocuted while making repairs in the transformer room. No inquest was held. Thompson was 48 years old, and leaves a wife and three children at Salmon.

FIGHTING
RESUMED
IRELAND

Heavy Firing On Ulster Border for Seven Hours—British Regiment Dispatched to Belfast—De Valera Defies British Government—Civil War Declared Certain.

BELFAST, June 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Heavy firing for seven hours between Irish republican army forces and Ulster special constables occurred during the night at Dungoley Cross on the Lough-Ar-magh border.

The inhabitants along the border have fled to Dunkirk.

Firing also occurred at Colleville for several hours.

At Irish republican headquarters it was stated the republican forces sustained no casualties in either clash.

LONDON, June 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—A British regiment which returned from Ireland in February left Plymouth today for Belfast.

DUBLIN, June 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The most Rev. John A. F. Gregg, protestant archbishop of Dublin, started a diocesan meeting here today with this statement:

"If we are not already engaged in civil war in Ireland it may be upon us this week or the next."

LONDON, June 2.—A number of questions were put to Eamon DeValera today respecting Winston Spencer Churchill's statement in the house of commons yesterday, especially as to whether as a member of the coalition cabinet he would give a written acceptance of the treaty and according to the Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent, he made the same stereotyped answer to all inquiries—"Churchill's threats cannot affect us. We deny the right of English authority to prescribe what an Irishman shall or shall not do."

LONDON, June 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Announcement that Prime Minister Lloyd George will leave London tonight to remain away a week encourages the belief that there is some improvement in the Irish situation. He will go to Criccieth to participate at war memorial exercises tomorrow. The gravity of conditions in Ireland is emphasized however by the summoning of the Earl of Cavan, chief of staff, by the cabinet and the introduction of the Earl of Balfour into the cabinet conferences.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—A request that the Pacific Coast league adopt resolutions asking Baseball Commissioner Landis to reconsider his suspension of President W. H. Klepper, Vice-president James Brewster and William J. Kenworthy, manager of the Portland club on charges of undue collusion in the switching of Kenworthy from Seattle to Portland, was made at a special meeting of the league directors here today by counsel for the suspended men and the affected club.

G. Moses, Portland attorney and ex-officio director and stockholder in the Portland club, told the meeting that Judge Landis had exceeded his authority because of the agreement between the major and minor leagues "to make a remedial and not punitive action in cases of this sort."

CANADIAN ABBE
CHARG'D MURDER
OF HALF BROTHER

MONTREAL, June 2.—Abbe Adolphe Delorme must stand trial for the murder of his half brother, Raoul, an Ottawa university student, in this city, last January.

This was decided today when the grand jury of King's bench court which has been considering the case this week returned a true bill.

As soon as the jurors made their report, Justice Monel, set the trial for Friday, June 9. The court intimated that the Roman Catholic church had disposed the defendant of his clerical status.

Wearing a semi-lay attire, the accused fled away his time while awaiting the jury's report by chatting with his guard. At noon a car with a bouquet of flowers tied to the hood called to take him to lunch.

Bank Robbery

OKANOGAN, Wash., June 2.—Officers today still were searching for a man named Kivell, said to live in Fairview, B. C., and Jack Kearns, who with J. L. Liever are alleged to have robbed the Okanogan state bank at Loomis Wednesday afternoon.

The search is being centered in the Fairview district. Liever was captured with the automobile believed to have been used by the alleged bandits.

H.F. McCORMICK
RESIGNS HEAD
INT. HARVESTER

Principal in Marriage and Divorce Mix-Up Steps Out—Denial Made Action Caused By Other Than Business Considerations.

CHICAGO, June 2.—Harold F. McCormick resigned as head of the International Harvester company today.

Declining re-election Mr. McCormick nominated Alexander Legge, vice president and general manager, who was unanimously elected.

An executive committee of five, selected from the board of directors, was created and McCormick was named chairman of the new body.

"The change in the presidency of the company and the creation of an executive committee have been in contemplation for more than a year," said Mr. McCormick. "I do not contemplate any diminution in my interest in, or service to the company."

Marriage in Air

CHICAGO, June 2.—Contending factions of the erstwhile household of Harold F. McCormick were committed to a policy of compromise today over the romance of Mathilde McCormick and her former riding master, Max Oser, Swiss horseman of Zurich.

Conferences between counsel for Mathilde's mother, Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick and Harold F. McCormick, her divorced husband, which saved Oser from an absent investigation in court yesterday were continued today. Mr. McCormick, playing the double role of father and guardian, has agreed to withhold consent to the marriage until Saturday.

Undaunted by the legal complications and the charges made by Mrs. McCormick that he is a fortune hunter with designs on both McCormick and Rockefeller millions, Oser, in reports from Zurich was said to be continuing plans for the marriage.

Counsel for Mr. and Mrs. McCormick asserted that no basis for a final compromise on the marriage had been reached.

DAUGHERTY
ACCUSED OF
A FRAME-UP

Senator Watson Charges U. S. Attorney General With Attempt to Railroad Son of Democratic State Chairman Ohio to Jail—Young Man Arrested Saturday.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Charges that an attempt was being made to "frame up" and "railroad" to prison Andrew T. Daugherty, of Columbus, Ohio, son of William Daugherty, democratic state chairman of Ohio, for having given information regarding acts of Attorney General Daugherty and Thomas B. Felder, New York attorney, were made to the senate late today by Senator Watson, democrat, Georgia.

Senator Watson made his charges shortly after young Daugherty, arrested here Saturday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses from a Washington hotel, had been ordered held by District Attorney Presmont for preliminary hearing June 7.

Landis to Aid

CHICAGO, June 2.—K. M. Landis, former federal judge and Francis E. McGovern, former governor of Wisconsin, will be asked to give their aid to the federal government in the prosecution of the war fraud cases now under preparation, it was announced by Attorney General Daugherty here today.

Mr. Daugherty came to Chicago to address the Illinois State Bar association.

The attorney general said he had a conference with former Judge Landis in Washington recently.

"While he gave me no direct answer, I am convinced he looks on my proposition favorably," said Mr. Daugherty.

Daugherty Makes Speech

CHICAGO, June 2.—Assumption by the several state governments of some of the "burdensome problems" now being shouldered by the federal government was suggested by Attorney General Daugherty today in an address before the Illinois State Bar association.

Among the phases of law enforcement which Mr. Daugherty held could be more effectively handled by the states were prohibition, "blue sky" stock laws, white slave traffic, anti-narcotic statutes and food inspection regulations.

Taking for his theme "the co-operative duties of the states and the federal government," Mr. Daugherty traced what he said was the gradual departure from the theory of government of the framers of the constitution and from the limits set by that instrument.

Important economic changes after the Civil war, he said, tended toward the concentration of all government power in one government.

Alluding to the modern tendency to such centralization to a "misguided spirit of nationalism" Mr. Daugherty said that it was harmful to the central government as well as to the states.

"Everyone who has observed present day conditions," he continued, "must admit that a delay of state activities has resulted."

TWO AVIATORS ARE
BURNED TO DEATH

EL PASO, Texas, June 2.—Ben Jenkins, Jr., of El Paso, a lieutenant in the reserve corps and Sergeant Arthur Juengling of the twelfth observation squadron at Fort Bliss, were burned to death this morning when their airplane crashed against the side of a mountain and was destroyed by fire.

The action brought protests from all women's organizations and also from the chamber of commerce which claims it will seriously interfere with the tourist and resort business.
