

WALKER'S FIRE INSURANCE CASE GOES TO JURY

Closing arguments in the civil suit of the A. W. Walker Auto Co. against the Firemen's Fund Insurance company of San Francisco, for the collection of approximately \$10,000, for damage by fire to used cars, were made today. The defense claims that the valuation placed on the cars were too high, and allege "fraud and deception." The plaintiff claims the insurance company is trying to evade payment of the policy.

Fred A. Stuckel, superintendent of the claim department of the insurance company, with headquarters in San Francisco, testified that no policy would have been issued had the company known the true value of the cars. On cross examination, Stuckel was asked by Attorney Kelly for the plaintiff, "if the policy was not contested, for the moral effect on local agents?" Stuckel admitted it was for both the "moral and financial effect."

R. R. Coster, an automobile dealer of Portland, and considered an expert on the value of used cars, testified to the value of the cars, and placed them far lower than the figures given in the policy.

E. J. Blaser, of Portland, an expert automotive engineer, testified that he had inspected the cars after the fire, and gave his estimate on what it would cost to repair. Most of his estimates called for new tops, upholstery and paint.

Attorney Kelly made the opening argument to the jury for the plaintiff, and scored the expert defense as "being the relation between master and servant." He also charged "that the witness Blaser, if he could repair autos on the estimates he gave, would be a rival to Stines, the German mechanical genius."

The argument for the defense was made by Attorney Charles Reames, and the closing argument was made by Attorney Gus Newbury.

The case lasted two days, and has been one of the hardest fought civil actions in the history of Jackson county, attracting much attention from local auto dealers, because of the technical and highly involved legal points at issue in the case.
