OLD CEMETERY IN ASHLAND IS SCENE CEREMONY

ASHLAND, June 2.—Ordinarily, two cemeteries hereabouts are carried in mind by local residents, those of "Mountain View" and "Ashland," the latter being the older and located in the center of town. However, there are two others, both historic in regard to the earlier period and associations, these referring to "Hargadine" and "Hill" cemeteries. Hargadine is on an eminence, north of town, affording a beautiful view of the valley, while Hill is south of town, located on the old homestead of the pioneer family of that name. This latter resting place of the dead had fallen into neglect, but there has been an active renewal of public sentiment of late in regard to these sacred spots, with the result that Hill cemetery has been redeemed from forgetfulness and oblivion. On Decoration Day, in common with other burying places, it was visited and a brief memorial service held in behalf of the pioneers, the American Legion decorating the graves of nearly a score of the early settlers who were victims of the Indian wars in the 50's. Supplementing this tribute of remembrance, there was music, a report of the cemetery committee, and a few brief remarks by Rev. C. F. Koehler, reviewing historically the labors and sacrifices of those whom Memorial Day honors. As a result of efforts of the cemetery committee, the original Hill cemetery tract has been added to and the premises doctored, title being vested in School District No. 7. Not only has this transfer been made, but the State Highway commission has agreed to perfect an approach from the main road, in return for certain concessions made by the cemetery trustees. The surroundings have been greatly improved to the extent that the place is now an attractive one, devoted to the memory of several pioneer families whose efforts in improving the grounds has placed the burial plot in fine condition.
