Other members of the association having 40 pound cows are: Ralph Billings, J. Sanders, R. B. Purvis, A. B. Ferns, P. D. Lofland, J. A. Manke, J. E. Judy, L. A. Murphy, and Schulz Brothers.

This average is higher than that of April, and he also has the high individual production, made by Rose, a Jersey-Swiss, of 1582 pounds of milk and 80.20 pounds of fat. Fred Puhl of Medford has the second highest cow, Beaut, which produced 1361 lbs. of milk and 73.49 of fat.

R. E. Robinson of Talent, has an average of 869 pounds of milk and 43.27 of fat for his herd of 13 Jerseys. W. E. Moor of Ashland has an average of 903 pounds of milk and 41.20 pounds of fat.

The 40 pound list contains 64 cows. 248 were tested during the month. The following cows produced more than 50 pounds each:

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Five unprofitable cows were disposed of by association members. It has been shown that the cost of keeping even one "boarder" is greater than the cost of testing an entire herd for a year.

Applicants must present themselves for the examinations they wish to take at the time set for the question envelopes to be opened, as the examinations cannot be offered at any other time or place. Those entering only a few of the examinations should present themselves at the secretary's desk for registration and for information regarding the rules. The eleven subjects required for a one-year elementary certificate are underlines upon the program.

A NEW HIGHWAY FOR TILLAMOOK

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—As a result of a conference today of Lincoln county officers, the state highway commission and federal officials, decision was reached to go ahead with construction of the Neakowin-Salmon river forest road project in Tillamook county through the forest reserve to Devils lake in Lincoln county, and next year to continue the road work from Devils lake to a crossing or Siletz river. This will give an all-year highway between Toledo, Newport and Tillamook city which coast residents have been hoping for. The project will cost about \$500,000, Lincoln county to pay \$120,000 and the remainder to be paid by the state and federal government.
