MANIA IS OVER

CENTRAL POINT, June 2.—There once was a time here when this, our own little city, was considered one of the most peaceful, most unmolested and undisturbed, and best little places on the face of the earth. Not much of any real wrong was ever done here, and a robbery, and especially robberies, were unheard of. That time though is getting to be like the fairy tale, because of the "once upon a time," part of it. Robberies have been so frequent here the past winter, that the once-believer in the good, and the once-sort of things around here, has almost turned suspicious and distrustful, and the doors to people's homes that once were unbarred and unlocked because everyone thought no one would enter his home on a mission of stealing and destruction, are locked now every night, for no man knows, as it were, when his turn will come to be the loser from the destructive prowler's visit. For a long time people here tried to believe that an outsider was doing the shady work, but from the arrest made as a result of the robbery of Monday night when the Service station and the Central Point confectionery were heavy losers, it was shown that such was not the case, although the man in question is almost a stranger here, having come to our community only a few months ago, months of profit to him evidently at some one else's loss. It is hoped that the arrest will put an end to the robbery mania here.

The Central Point schools closed for the summer vacation Friday, May 26th. 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TENT CATERPILLAR
THREATENS FRUIT
IN WASHINGTON

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 1.—A large share of the fruit crop in western Washington is threatened by an invasion of tent caterpillars, which is doing a large amount of damage, according to telephone advices received at the state department of agriculture from the state horticulturists in various places. On Vashon island, where the season is earlier than on the mainland, the caterpillars are reported to have cleaned foliage off many fruit trees and are attacking the gooseberry and currant bushes. It is feared they will spread to other bush fruits.

"The easiest and surest method of dealing with the pests is fire," declares a statement issued by the department. A torch in a single evening can clean out every tent in a good sized orchard and will not damage the trees if handled with care. Spraying will not avail in most places, if reports are correct.

The department states there is danger of the pest spreading into raspberries and logan berries and if they do the loss will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.
