The complaint grows out of the merger recently effected by the two companies.

The commission made this announcement today in a report to the senate in response to the recently adopted resolution of Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, directing inquiry into the merger by the commission and the department of justice.

LARKENS TRIAL IS LAUNCHED IN CIRCUIT COURT

The trial of Cliff S. Larkins, charged with a statutory offense involving a 14 year old girl began in the circuit court this morning.

Under the new women juror law, in a case where the prosecuting witness is a woman or girl, the prosecution is entitled to have six women on the jury, and there are only three such all residents of Ashland, on the panel now. On a new venire issued by the court Saturday, out of 12 names drawn seven were women, and none responded. In the present term of court 92 names have been drawn, from which three women jurors were secured. The state has a right under the law to demand six women jurors.

All prospective jurors were asked if the fact that the defendant suffered from defective speech and hearing, would influence their verdict through sympathy.

Mrs. Alice M. Peil of Ashland was drawn as juror, and excused by the defense by the exercise of its peremptory. Mrs. Louisa A. Perozzi, also of Ashland, was excused by the defense.

The district attorney when the jury box was filled, made a motion that the trial be continued, owing to the law, that six women be on the jury was not complied with. The court denied the motion. The jury is composed entirely of men.
