

GRAND PRIZE AT ASHLAND FOURTH - TO BE A FORD CAR

ASHLAND, June 5.—"Ford an Fourth" is the slogan heard on every hand in connection with the big celebration here on July 3 and 4. double holidays, arrangements for observing which are already under way as sponsored by the chamber of commerce, merchants, and everybody in general. In fact, four days are suggested as being the limit—Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. The grand prize will be a Ford car, supplemented by over a thousand dollars as represented by other awards. A Ford club is being agitated to give impetus to the celebration features, the organization not implying any political bias. O. F. Carson is chairman of the music committee, and Frank Jordan will have charge of the concessions. Territory which comes under scope of the celebration extends from Roseburg on the north to Dunsuir on the south, also eastwards to Klamath Falls.

Jake Daubert, veteran first baseman of the Cincinnati Reds has hit safely in 14 consecutive games, making four hits, including two doubles, in the Sunday game against Chicago. He had a record of 22 consecutive games up to May 15, before he was stopped.

"Babe" Ruth, the home run king, cracked his third homer of the season yesterday by driving the ball out of the park for the first time this year.

Pitcher Markle of the Reds pitched one-third of an inning against the Cubs yesterday and was charged with the defeat, having ascended to the mound after Frank Keck had given way to a pinch hitter during the Reds' rally.

Separated by the narrow margin of only a game and a half from their nearest rivals, the league leading Giants and Yankees were marshaling today for another of the season's crucial tests. The Yankees were on their way westward to open a western invasion in Chicago tomorrow, while the McGraw men had a day of rest before entertaining contenders from the other wing of the circuit beginning with the Chicago Cubs.

More than 30,000 fans crowded into Ebbetts field to see the Sunday clash between the Giants and the Dodgers. The spectators encroached on the field in the first half of the ninth and New York finished the game under protest. Their own ninth inning, however, gave them a 5 to 4 victory.

The New York Giants in the National league and the Boston Red Sox in the American played errorless ball Sunday and each of them won their games. The Chicago White Sox also were errorless, but lost to St. Louis in ten innings.

Postoffice Exam.
The United States Civil Service commission announces a postoffice clerk-carrier examination, to be held on July 15, 1922, for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk or carrier, postoffice service, Medford, Oregon. Salary, \$1400 per annum.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination, appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.

SUCCESS NOT AN EASY MATTER, H. S. GRADUATES TOLD

The churches of Medford held a union service Sunday at 11 a. m. at the Page theater, where the sermon to the graduating class of the high school was delivered by Rev. Frederick R. Leach, pastor of the First Baptist church. He spoke from the text Matt. 7:13,14 on the theme, "The Price of Success." The speaker in a practical and forceful way showed how Christ pointed out that entrance into the Kingdom of God was by a strait gate and a narrow road, while the gate and the road are broad, which lead to failure. These conditions of spiritual success seem rather hard, but they are no different than those which prevail in every other kingdom in life. The road to business success is hard and long and most difficult. The vast majority of business men fail at some time in life. Only 2000 lawyers in Boston obtain their living by their profession, and only now and then one becomes distinguished. Twenty-five out of 175 best wholesale houses in Philadelphia survived 23 years. Many admire success but few are willing to pay the price. They are looking for it on the bargain counter, and it can not be found there.

If one desires to enter the world of science and invention the same conditions prevail. There are opportunities, but who are willing to do what is required to achieve any great success? The only famine in this country, as one has said, is a famine of ten-thousand dollar men. The demand for competent men far exceeds the supply in every line of business.

In art and music we again see how few realize any great degree of success, because there is no willingness to keep everlastingly at it, till success comes. Being an expert or an authority is possible only for those who are willing to do research work and stay at it till they have mastered their department of knowledge. Webster worked twelve hours a day for fifty years, while Henry Clay declaimed in barns to the cattle for years to become efficient.

The educated person stands a better chance of succeeding than the one not educated. Brains helps one do his work more efficiently.

Only 14 out of 1000 entering 1st grade attend college, but these fourteen furnish the majority of the world's leaders. 74 per cent of the famous men found in "Who's Who" are college men. A person increases his chances of succeeding if he gets an education.

Intellect alone, however, does not insure success. The moral and religious nature must be developed to enable the person to rightly determine what is real success. False ideas have ruined many a young man. Some have the idea that cash and character do not go together. Real success is not found in applause nor in obtaining money. Neither is it found in living for oneself, but in helping others.

Christ was right when He said that the Kingdom of God was entered by only those who are willing to pay the price. This principle likewise prevails in every department of life, and will furnish the basis of success to the members of this graduating class. Education should be used as a means of doing greater service for humanity, and not as a mere means of making a better living.
