RECOGNITION OF BAKHMETEFF TO CEASE, JUNE 30

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Recognition of Boris Bakhmeteff as Russian ambassador to the United States, continued despite the collapse five years ago of the Kerensky government which appointed him, will cease after June 30. Mr. Bakhmeteff has been notified of this decision of the American government in a letter from Secretary Hughes, replying to a communication from the ambassador in which the latter, stating that his chief function in recent months of liquidating property claims growing out of the war, was now about completed, had offered to retire should the Washington government desire it.

The correspondence, published today, was dated late in April after Senator Borah had challenged the ambassador's status, long the subject of controversy in connection with plans to call him before a senate committee and in his communication Mr. Bakhmeteff states "the discussion of the subject had led him to question whether his continuance as ambassador would serve the best interests of my country and the convenience of the United States."

WOUNDED NURSE WANTS TO DIE

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 5.—Asserting again and again that she has no desire to get well, Peggy Marie Deal, trained nurse of Springfield, Ill., who early Saturday ended a war romance here by killing Frank Anderson, a department store welfare director, and then turning the pistol upon herself, lay in a hospital today fighting against what attendants said was an excellent chance for recovery.

She has a bullet wound in her left lung.

The young woman killed Anderson at a hotel where the police say they had registered as man and wife. According to her story, the shooting took place after Anderson had boasted to her of his love affairs with others, told her that he could not love any one woman and revealed to her that he was not yet divorced from his wife.

6-CORNERED RACE IS ON IN IOWA TODAY

DES MOINES, Ia., June 5.—(By Associated Press). Interest in the Iowa primaries today centered largely in the six cornered race for the republican nomination for United States senator to complete the unexpired term of W. S. Kenyon, now a federal judge.

A candidate to receive the nomination, must poll at least 35 per cent of the total. Otherwise the nomination will go over until the state convention in August.

The six candidates are Colonel Smith W. Brookhart of Washington, Iowa; Charles E. Pickett of Waterloo; Burton E. Sweet of Waverly; Clifford L. Thorne of Washington; Leslie E. Francis of Des Moines, and Colonel Claude M. Stanley of Corning.
