Failure of the automobile registrations in Oregon to maintain the proportionate increase during the last two years which obtained in the early days of automobile registration in this state, indicates that many of the original automobiles in this state are being consigned to the junk heap and that many of the cars now being sold by dealers are replacements, according to Secretary of State Koser.

A comparison of registrations for several years shows a gain of nearly 13,000 automobiles at the end of May, 1921, as compared with the same period in 1920 whereas the registrations up to May 31 this year are but 6000 greater than the registrations up to May 31, 1921.
