

HOTTEST MAY DAY IN YEARS MAY 31, RAINFALL 1.22 IN.

The outstanding feature of last month's weather was the fact that on May 31st it had the highest temperature for that month since 1911, when official weather statistics were kept in Medford. The next warmest May day during that time was with a temperature of 94, one day in May, 1914. Another exceptional feature was the fact that there was only one killing frost, and that on May 26, with a 32 degree temperature.

Neither was last month an exceptionally warm one for May, with a mean maximum temperature of 72.05. The mean maximum for May, 1919, was 77.7; that for May, 1914, was 77.5; that for May, 1920, was 74; and that for May, 1913, was the same as last month, 73.5.

The rainfall of last month was 1.22 inches last year. No snow fell during recent years except that it was 2.47 inches last year. No snow fell during last month. There were six days with .01 of an inch of precipitation, 10 days were clear, 8 partly cloudy and 13 were cloudy. A thunderstorm occurred on May 25th.

NEW YORK, June 5.—(By the Associated Press)—W. E. D. Stokes, wealthy New York realty operator, today charged in open court that Mrs. Philip Lydig, his former wife, and the Rev. Perry Stickney Grant, prominent clergyman, "were living together at Bedford, Mass." Their engagement recently was announced. Stokes, who made this charge, while he was being examined in supreme court on the motion of Mrs. Helen Elwood Stokes for alimony in connection with her separation suit also claimed that Mrs. Lydig, society leader, had a contract with the late William K. Vanderbilt, whereby he was to pay her \$5000 a month for life.

Stokes made his allegation over protest by Samuel Untermyer, counsel for Mrs. Stokes who declared that Stokes was "trying to drag everybody into the mud."

CRATER LAKE VIEWS SPORTSMEN SHOW

Ray is one of the best wrestlers in the country, and although he recently lost to Ralph Hand at Gold Hill, it was only after a strenuous struggle in which Ray several times came near throwing the Gold Hill crack. Miller and Hand wrestled several months ago, Miller being unable to throw Hand, but having a lead on points. The match tonight should be one of the best ever staged in Southern Oregon.

In addition to the main event there will be two good preliminaries and a large crowd from Medford is expected to attend.

DEMPSEY TRAINER TO LAUNCH CLUB

A need which has long been felt in Medford is about to be supplied. "K. O." Bob Brown, who left Jack Dempsey as sparring partner last fall and who has fought some of the best heavyweights in the country is going to establish the Medford Athletic club in the near future.

The club will require monthly dues and is to be for business men who can come to the gym for an hour or so each day after work and take a mild workout, followed by a shower. Mr. Brown, who hails from San Francisco, will give boxing instruction and will see that the establishment is run in a clean, orderly manner.

The proprietor of the new Athletic club is seeking a location and as soon as it is found will install an open air gym with enclosed shower rooms, etc. As soon as the club is in operation an amateur boxing smoker will be held every Friday with a card of about six bouts. It is hoped that the first smoker will be held a week from this coming Friday.

In view of the fact that Medford has no Y. M. C. A. or other athletic club, it appears that the new club should receive a good measure of popularity.

RAIL STRIKE VOTE COMING

The reduction for mechanics averaged a little more than eight per cent, all machinists, boiler makers, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, electrical workers, car men (except freight car men) moulders, cupola tenders and core makers, and the regular and helper apprentices receiving a cut of seven cents an hour.

Freight car men commonly known as "car knockers" and the object of some of the heaviest assaults by the roads in their battle for lower wages, were cut nine cents.

This heavier reduction for the freight car men came under especially severe criticism in the minority report, the labor members declaring there was no justification for discrimination in car work.

Car cleaners, who now receive an average of \$4.18 a day, were cut five cents an hour, or forty cents a day. Mechanics, whose daily rate now averages from \$6.11 for electrical workers to \$6.28 for blacksmiths will lose 56 cents a day under the new decision, bringing their daily wage to approximately \$5.70.

The board's latest decision, which is to be followed shortly by reductions for railway clerks, telegraphers and all other classes of railroad employees except the train service men was brief and offered no explanation of how the new rates were arrived at. This omission brought more fire from the dissenters who declare the majority decision did not consider "human needs" ignored the pleas of the employees for a living wage and made "no attempt to show that mechanics are not entitled to such a standard."

Suggestion for "some recognized standard" to be worked out by the board and used as a basis for future wage adjustments was contained in the majority decision.

The decision, the minority report continued, tended to substantiate the position of the railroads that wages need not be established with reference to the employees' family. Contending that a minimum wage for the shop crafts should be fifty cents an hour, which would mean a rate of 87 cents for skilled mechanics.

The savings to the railroad far exceed anything justified by the savings to the public in reduced rates," the dissenters said, adding that payroll slashes during the last six months of 1921 had included layoffs at the annual rate of \$1,300,000, "in strong contrast to the increasing prosperity of the roads."

"The increasing anti-theft between profits and just wages will result in lowered morale; thus reductions will not result in economies," the minority opinion.

"The majority failed to carry out the function for which the board was created," continued the minority report.

"The duty of the labor board as a constructive, impartial body is providing means whereby railroad employees can have their legitimate human needs satisfied without recourse to stoppages, and to enlighten the public as to the state of the unregulated industry and the confusion of propaganda they shall be able to see the real facts as they affect the body politic. This decision fulfills neither of these duties."

Within a few weeks she was a star of the first magnitude.

Miss Russell sang in the Casino theater until 1899. She was with Webber and Fields company several years and later joined the McCaul Opera company. In this company she was the prima donna until her own company was organized. With that company she starred in the various roles in America and Europe and later entered vaudeville. During a later period she traveled and lectured.

It was soon after her first entry to the stage that Miss Russell married Harry Braun, musical director of the Pinafore company. In 1885 she had divorced Braun and later married Edward Solomon, musical director of the Casino orchestra. Following her divorce from Solomon, she was married in 1891 to John Chatterton, known here professionally as Signor Teruggini, a tenor with whom she sang. She married Alexander P. Moore, Pittsburg publisher in 1912.

PITTSBURG, June 6.—Funeral services for Mrs. Lillian Russell Moore, who died at her home here early today will be held in Trinity Protestant Episcopal church Thursday afternoon. The body will then be placed in a vault until a suitable mausoleum can be erected by her husband, Alexander P. Moore, publisher of the Pittsburg Leader.

During the day many telegrams of condolence reached Mr. Moore and other members of the family from all parts of the country. They came not only from leaders in the theatrical profession, in which Mrs. Moore was the "airy fairy Lillian" of the operatic stage was so long a figure, but from government officials and leaders in society who were pleased to number her among their friends.

Among the messages were many from persons who had been associated with her during the war in many patriotic duties. Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, talking over the telephone from Washington referred to her as "Sergeant Russell" for such she was by right of an order issued by Major General Barnett, when he commanded the United States marine corps.
