ASHLAND O. N. G. GOES TO CAMP ON 15TH OF JUNE

Medford will experience a genuine invasion next week of crowds of southern Oregon and northern California visitors who will participate in her celebration of the prosperity she has enjoyed during the last several months. Every resident of Medford is expected to turn out to give the outsiders a hearty welcome and committees from the chamber of commerce, Retail Merchants Bureau, Greater Medford club and many individual citizens are arranging a splendid program for the week.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday will be the special days of celebration. On Wednesday flag raising ceremonies and aquatic sports will hold sway. Thursday the people will witness a special irrigation and industrial development demonstration, an unusual feature well worth seeing. Friday, which will be known as "Community Day," will be devoted to a big Hi-Jinx, free feed and baseball game between Medford merchants. Louis Ulrich will preside over the banquet and old dame rumor claims that the Hi-Jinx will be a fitting and novel wind-up of the three big days of celebration. Just what this Hi-Jinx will be has been kept a secret but out-of-town people can be sure that it will be a real explosion of Medford spirit. Special band concerts have been arranged for each day of the celebration.

Another part of the amusement provided visitors by local merchants will be free movie tickets given with merchandise purchases. Many of the business houses are offering unusual bargains for Prosperity Week so that visitors may make their visit productive as well as enjoyable.

In fact everything is all primed and set for a real celebration next week. People from every section of the country are invited to attend and those in charge of arrangements have assured them of a great time.

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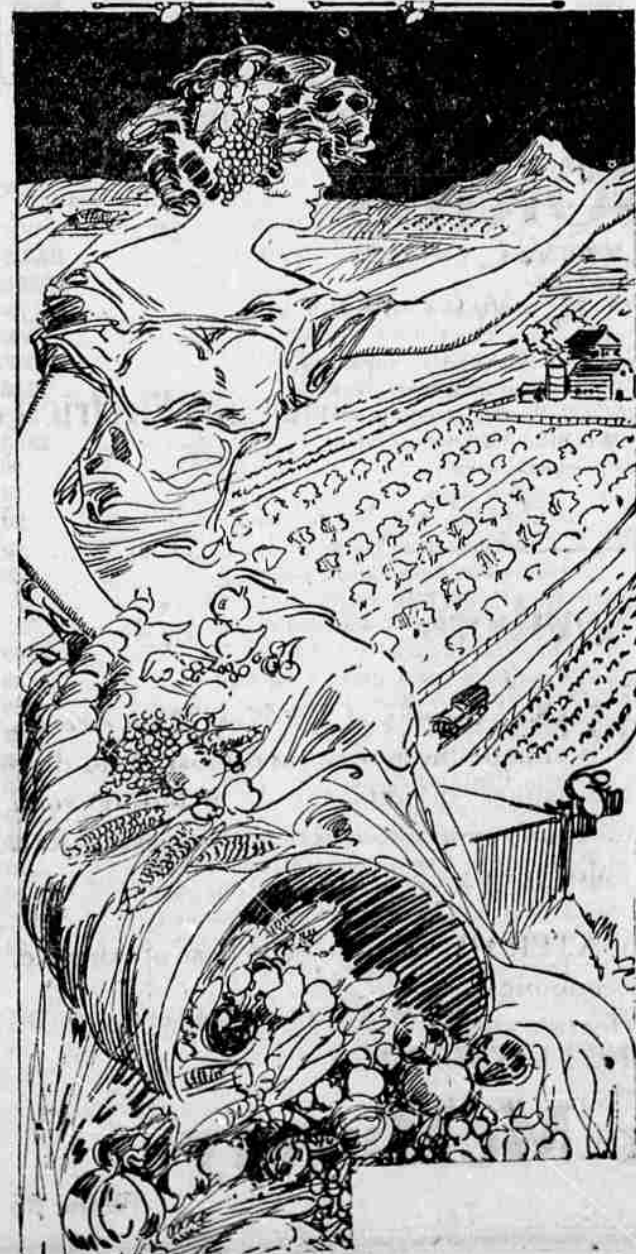
