

COUNCIL DECIDES TO GIVE BETTER FIRE PROTECTION

With all members present except Mr. Dressler, the city council last night took steps to give the new warehouse district of the city adequate fire protection, to provide hitching rack accommodations for the farmers visiting the city, and to abolish a number of complained of nuisances in various parts of the city.

It has been a matter of grave concern for some time to the councilmen and citizens with investments in the warehouse district which has grown up south from 12th and First streets, with still more plants talked of being erected in that section, that this district should be given better fire protection. Therefore, the council last night, after brief discussion, authorized City Superintendent C. W. Davis to purchase at once a car load of six-inch water pipe and several hydrants, and as soon as this equipment arrives a six-inch water pipe extension of about 800 feet with hydrants located at advantageous points will be made, south through the new warehouse district.

Practically the only hitching rack left in the downtown district was done away with recently when a large bill board was erected at the northeast corner of South Bartlett and Eighth streets. Since then farmers have been complaining about the lack of hitching accommodations to the merchants.

Louis Ulrich last night appeared before the council in this matter as a representative of the retail merchants. The councilmen were all agreed that adequate hitching racks must be provided as soon as possible, and authorized the council street committee, Messrs. Dressler, Gaddis and Antle to establish such convenient accommodations as soon as possible.

WALTER MILLER DEFEATS RAY IN 1 HOUR, 37 MIN.

Walter Miller of Los Angeles, middleweight wrestling champion of the Pacific Coast, threw Tom Ray of Omaha, Neb., last night at Gold Hill after 1:37 minutes of tussling and tugging, with a combination reverse arm lock and face hold. The match was slower than many seen in this section, and the crowd was slimmer than usual at the events of the Gold Hill Boxing commission.

The first hour was spent by both men largely in pulling at each other's necks, with flashes of speed, but both wary and cautious. Ray slapped a body scissor hold on Miller with his long legs, and squeezed until Miller rubbed his eyes in pain. The champion broke the hold, and the effort apparently tired Ray as much as it did Miller. Miller also got his head in some tight places, but Ray did not have the strength to flop him.

After the first 60 minutes Miller speeded up the proceedings, and punished his adversary with headlocks, etc. Coming out of a hold Miller trapped Ray, and after a few minutes of punishment, gave up. Miller said he could have snapped off Ray's arm with the hold, which he invented himself.

With 23 minutes to go in the second tilt, the pair were on their feet most of the time, with both aggressive. Miller rammed Ray into a post once, and both tried to throw each other out of the ring. Ray, when he had the body scissors in action, rubbed Miller's head over the rough canvas, and there were frequent signs of roughness on both sides.

Ralph Hand refereed the match, and set Gold Hill wild when he came into the ring.

The first event was a wrestling bout between two Gold Hill youngsters of tender years, and they used the same tactics as the men folks, and knew many holds. It was called a draw. There was a shower of coin for the boys.

Kids Davis and Schuler tangled in a three round boxing bout, and were wild and willing. They also received a draw decision, and a sprinkling of nickels.

Messrs. Blair and Conrad engaged in a 15 minute wrestling contest, and neither was able to throw the other. In the main event, the crowd was for Ray, and cheered every time he received an advantage. The winner was challenged by Ralph Hand.

Following Justice Hanby's decision yesterday, District Attorney Woolwine said he was inclined to accept the ruling made.
