43 K. K. K.'S INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

Arrest of W. S. Coburn, Former Ku Klux Potentate, Demanded—Kleagle Baker Attempts Flight, But Is Apprehended and Held Under \$10,000 Bail.

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—The grand jury which has been investigating the activities of the Ku Klux Klan in Los Angeles county will probably take up the question of submitting a report on the Klan organization at its session here today. Officials of the district attorney's office submitted the last of their evidence to the grand jury yesterday and that body returned 43 indictments.

That the Los Angeles authorities will ask for the arrest and detention of William S. Coburn, former official of the Klan who is believed to be in Atlanta, Ga., pending extradition proceedings, was indicated, following a conference between Deputy District Attorney Doran and Under Sheriff Biscailuz. That Nathan A. Baker, kleagle of the Klan who is in custody of the psychopathic ward of the county hospital, had made elaborate plans to leave Los Angeles before his arrest was announced here by Under Sheriff Biscailuz. Baker was arrested at the request of the district attorney's office and is being held under \$10,000 bail.

Thirty-four of the alleged members of the Klan, who were indicted yesterday, will appear before Judge Frederick W. Houser of the local superior court today and deposit bail in the sum of \$10,000 each, according to their attorney, Paul E. DeCort. Bench warrants will be issued for those who do not appear in court.

KLAMATH MAN SUICIDES AFTER MURDERING WIFE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 8.—A family quarrel evidently led to the death of Emma Miller Jackson at the hands of John Jackson, divorced husband, with whom she was living at Yainax, on the Indian reservation, 45 miles north of here, and the suicide of Jackson, according to information brought back today by Deputy Coroner Tawney, who was called yesterday to investigate.

The bodies were found on a bed in the cabin occupied by the couple. The woman had two bullet wounds in the head and Jackson was shot through the head, a 32-calibre revolver lying near his body.

The couple's eight-year-old daughter, Cynthia, told the officer that she had heard the pair quarrelling Tuesday morning. She spent the night at the home of her aunt. The next day Cynthia returned and found her parents lying on the bed. She said they would not speak to her and she went to school. At recess she told her teacher about the situation at home and the police were notified. Jackson was 39 and the woman 35.

BANKERS ABANDON IDEA OF LOAN TO GERMANY; ALLIES TOO DIVIDED

PARIS, June 8.—(By the Associated Press)—The idea of an international loan to Germany has been given up by the committee of bankers and they are meeting today to agree upon the form of their report to this effect, which will be submitted to the reparations commission.

The work of formulating the report, it is stated, may take two or three sittings. The prevailing conviction among the members of the bankers' committee is that two things are necessary to a loan: First there must be unanimity among the leaders which were to include all the countries represented on the reparations commission. Second, that the credit basis of Germany must be outlined clearly.

The bankers look upon the reparations commission's reply to their recent note as an official declaration that unanimity does not exist among the prospective lenders, and therefore feel that plans for a loan cannot be advised.

Great Northern to Be Electrified at Cost of \$20,000,000

SEATTLE, June 8.—Electrification of the Great Northern railroad, involving an expenditure of \$20,000,000 in which work Seattle will be established as western terminus for the distribution of electrical equipment, was announced by J. H. O'Neill, western general manager of the railway here today following receipt of advices from President Ralph Budd.

The first step in the electrification, O'Neill said, would be between Whitefish and Havre, Mont., with the next step over the Cascades between Wenatchee and Seattle.

HIGH TRIBUTE IS PAID LILLIAN RUSSELL MOORE

PITTSBURG, June 8.—(By the Associated Press).—Friends from officialdom, from the profession which carried her to the height of her operatic glory, and from the various walks of life which knew her in the later years today paid their last respects to Lillian Russell Moore, wife of A. P. Moore, Pittsburg publisher. The funeral at which Pittsburg friends and admirers from all over the country gathered in farewell tribute, took place in Trinity Episcopal church at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. Private services were conducted at the home previously.

A detachment of United States marines sent from Washington under orders from Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, was the bodyguard on the march to the church and cemetery. There the survivors of the 107th field artillery escorted the cortege to the vault where Mrs. Moore's body will find a resting place until a suitable mausoleum can be erected. A firing squad from the American Legion, whose ranks the distinguished woman graced by her membership, rendered the farewell salute.

Although a request that no floral tributes be sent to the home had been made, hundreds of wreaths from persons prominent in official and professional life were received. One of these was from the White House.

The honorary pall bearers were James D. Davis, secretary of labor, Senator Hiram Johnson of California; Representative Stephen G. Porter, Pittsburg; Mayor W. A. Magee, Pittsburg; J. L. Livermore, New York; Howard Chandler Christy, E. F. Albee, president of the National Vaudeville association of New York, and Senator William Flynn, Clarence Burchleigh, Colonel Oliver S. Hershman, E. M. O'Neill of Pittsburg.

Telegrams reached Mr. Moore and his family throughout the day. Among them was one from Secretary of the Navy Denby, who is on board the U. S. S. Henderson, on his way to Japan. The radio said: "Deepest sympathy. The country and the marine corps cannot forget Mrs. Moore's great help during the war."

BRUMFIELD APPEAL SET FOR JUNE 23

SALEM, Ore., June 8.—June 23 has been set as the date for the arguments in the case of the state vs. Richard M. Brumfield, now before the supreme court on appeal from the decree of the Douglas county circuit court.

Brumfield is now under sentence of death for the murder of Dennis Russell of Douglas county.

BONUS BILL IS PRESENTED, COST OVER 3 BILLION

Senator McCumber Presents Service Men's Measure at Last—Payments Spread Over 43 Years—Hope to Avoid Additional Taxation.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The soldier's bonus bill was formally presented today in the senate by Chairman McCumber of the finance committee with an accompanying report placing the probable cost to the federal government at \$3,845,659,481, spread over a period of 43 years from next January 1. This is approximately \$250,000,000 less than the estimate under the house bill, which was \$4,098,719,350, payable over 20 years.

The senate bill estimate was prepared by treasury experts and is based on the theory that 75 per cent of the 4,458,199 veterans who would be eligible for compensation would elect the adjusted service certificate option; 22 1/2 per cent farm, home and land settlement aid and 2 1/2 per cent vocational training. Should all of the veterans select the certificate plan, the total cost would be \$4,485,545,975.

With reference to financing the legislation, Chairman McCumber's report said it was hoped that the reduction in governmental expenditures plus the payment of interest on the refunded foreign obligations would be sufficient to obviate the imposition of additional taxation.

"If it does become necessary to impose additional taxes," the report continued, "it is believed we can better determine the amount of the necessary levy and the methods of distributing such burdens for the future at a later date when the future condition of the treasury will be more accurately established."

Reduce Cash Payments

Senator McCumber explained that an attempt had been made to reduce to a minimum actual cash payments under the bill during the next three years while the treasury is engaged in refunding the nearly seven billions of dollars of maturing government obligations. The estimated cost of the bonus for the three years was \$242,000,000.

After its presentation to the senate the bonus bill went to the calendar, where it will remain until there is an agreement to call it up. Senator McCumber and some other proponents desire early action, but several republicans are opposed to sidetracking the tariff bill, as they expect the fight over the bonus to consume at least a month and perhaps six weeks.

This measure differs somewhat from the house bill and very widely from the bonus bill that was reported to the senate last year and later sent back to the finance committee at the request of President Harding. The most important change from the original measure is the elimination of the cash bonus and reclamation features.

Five Plans Offered

As now drafted the legislation would give each veteran the right to select any one of the following plans:

Adjusted service pay, but only if his adjusted service credit did not exceed \$50.

Adjusted service certificate with bank and government loan provisions.

Vocational training aid.

Farm and home aid.

Land settlement aid.

The estimated cost for each of these plans is \$16,000,000 for the cash payments; \$3,364,900 for the adjusted service certificates; \$412,425,000 for farm, home and land settlement aid, and \$52,325,000 for vocational training. The expenses under vocational training and the cash bonus would end in 1915 under this estimate and those for farm, home and land settlement aid in 1929. Expenses under the certificate plan would continue to 1966, with a total of \$655,991,670 to 1943, when the certificates would begin to fall due.

Explaining the bill, Chairman McCumber said in his report that the amount of the adjusted service credit would be at the rate of \$1 a day for domestic service and \$1.25 for foreign service, less the \$50 bonus paid when the veterans were discharged from the service. In no event, however, could the total exceed \$500 in the case of those who had only domestic service and \$625 for those who had both domestic and foreign service.

Certificate Plan

The adjusted service certificates, payable at the end of 20 years from the date of issue or upon death, would have a face value of 3.015 times the total amount of the adjusted service credit. Until January 1, 1926, banks would be authorized to loan to the veterans an amount equal to 50 per cent of the adjusted service credit, plus interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent compounded annually from the date of

Cupid Carries a Gun at Royal Wedding in Belgrade

BELGRADE, June 8.—Elaborate precautions were taken to guard King Alexander and Princess Marie of Roumania during their wedding festivities today. The entire route of the bridal party from the palace to the cathedral was lined with double rows of soldiers and gendarmes with loaded rifles and fixed bayonets.

One line of the troops faced outward and the other inward. Their orders were to shoot immediately, it was understood, if they noticed any suspicious movement among the spectators. Residents of the city living along the streets through which the procession passed were forbidden to open their windows without special police permission.

Armed guards were placed on all the balconies and all the points of vantage and the number of spectators on each will be strictly limited so there may be clear space between each individual and his neighbors. No one was allowed to carry a camera, satchel or other objects without written permission.

The royal wedding has caused all the eligible swains and maidens of the picturesque peasant country seem to want to get married this week and the churches are flooded with applications for licenses.

OREGON GRANGE GOES ON RECORD AGAINST JAPS

MEMPHISVILLE, Ore., June 8.—Delegates to the annual convention of the state grange, in session here, today were considering two questions which are under debate, one relating to the present method of election of officers of the state grange, and the other an issue raised by a resolution providing for compulsory attendance at public schools by all children in the state between the ages of six and sixteen years. The latter question was before the committee on education.

The grange was on record today for denying Orientals right to own or lease land in the state and denying all Orientals privileges of citizenship. Resolutions to this effect were unanimously adopted. The grange also adopted a resolution criticizing judges for laxity in enforcement of the prohibition law.

A resolution opposing a federal sales tax was adopted without debate and another one was adopted instructing the national grange to take up with congress the question of exempting grange entertainments for tax, on the ground that they were educational in scope.

Delegates today went on a tour of Yamhill county and were to reconvene late today and select next year's meeting place. Newport was the only city that had extended an invitation this morning.

NO INDEPENDENT RUN FOR BAKER

PORTLAND, June 8.—Mayor George L. Baker will not be an independent candidate for governor of Oregon, regardless of the reports that have been in circulation that he would be in the gubernatorial race. He emphatically stated his position today.

"I am out of it entirely," said Mayor Baker. "It is well known that I did have ambitions to be nominated as the republican candidate for governor; but when I sized up the general situation, and saw the lines of cleavage developing in a most unfortunate controversy, I decided to stay out of the race, and I certainly shall not enter it at this time as an independent."

CHICAGO BROKER ASSAULTS GIRL

CHICAGO, June 8.—William T. Pursell, wealthy broker, faced charges today of attacking a 17-year-old high school girl who applied for a position at his office yesterday. Pursell was released on bond and permitted to spend last night at his home.

"I have no sympathy for my husband," said the broker's wife when she learned of his arrest. "This is not the first time he has been in trouble of this kind. The story is true. There is no use denying it."

The affair reached the attention of the police when the girl fainted in a department store after leaving Pursell's office.

Larger Crops Than Last Year, Forecast By Dept. Agriculture

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Larger crops than last year were forecast today by the department of agriculture. Winter wheat showed improvement to the extent of 22,000,000 bushels since May 1, with a forecast of 607,000,000 bushels or the largest ever grown. The spring wheat area is 1,000,000 acres less than last year but production is forecast at 247,000,000 bushels or 32,000,000 bushels more than the 1921 crop. All other crops, oats, rye, barley are to be large while the apple crop is held to be about 72 per cent of normal.

RICKENBACKER AIRPLANE HIT BY LIGHTNING

DETROIT, Mich., June 8.—Captain Eddie Rickenbacker got away for Chicago on the second lap of his transcontinental air flight at 4:21 o'clock eastern standard time this afternoon after minor repairs had been made to his plane, damaged earlier in the day when struck by lightning.

The bolt struck a flag pole beside a hangar in front of which the plane was being tuned up for the second leg of the flight from Detroit to Chicago and traveled to the engine of the plane. Some of the engine parts were fused but Rickenbacker, who was entering the field at the time, declared after an examination that repairs could be made by late afternoon. He planned to "hop off" for Chicago later in the day.

E. C. McClelland, 20, one of the workmen injured was burned about the legs according to reports. He is expected to recover.

FEAR 8 U. S. SAILORS DROWNED IN SIBERIA

VLADIVOSTOK, June 8.—(By Associated Press). Eight enlisted men from the United States gunboat New Orleans are feared to have been drowned in a sailing mishap at Amurday, Siberia. There has been no trace of the men since Sunday. Those missing are Coppersmith Allen, Carpenter's Mate William Wolf, Coxswain Harry Swanson, Boatswain Ferdinand Schell, Gunners' Mate Frank Silva, Seamen Leon Neodd, Robert Free and Brown.

LOCOMOTIVE FIREMEN TO FIGHT HARDING

HOUSTON, Texas, June 8.—A resolution condemning President Harding as an enemy of organized labor and declaring that all members of the organization should work to prevent his re-election, was adopted today at the convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen.

32 JAIL BIRDS IN LOS ANGELES, CALIF. ESCAPE THRU WINDOW AT MOVIE SHOW

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—Police and county authorities are looking for 32 men who got up and left a movie show. It was in the Lincoln Heights city jail last night. The 45 prisoners were not all watching the picture. One, with a cleverly contrived hack saw, was filing away three bars from a window while the movie plot developed. Then one by one 38 prisoners slipped through the window to liberty.

IRISH CITY IS CAPTURED BY BRITISH

Beleek, in Free State Territory Occupied By British Troops—Artillery Silences Beleek Fort—Londonderry Occupied By Liverpool Regiment—Rebels Gather.

BELFAST, June 8.—(By Associated Press). Beleek was occupied today by British troops which advanced to take the salient from the Irish irregular forces.

The fort overlooking Beleek was first captured by the British troops and then the city itself.

BELFAST, June 8.—(By Associated Press). An engagement between the Irish irregular forces in the Beleek district and British troops began at one o'clock this afternoon. At that hour signals were sent up indicating that the British troops were being fired on, while there were bursts of rifle firing from the north.

The British artillery then opened up, landing two shots near the Beleek fort, which is in free state territory.

BELFAST, June 8.—(By Associated Press). A British military column comprising artillery, infantry and engineers advanced into the Beleek district this morning with the reported intention of occupying Beleek by nightfall.

The republican forces are said to be falling back before the British advance.

BRITISH IN LONDONDERRY

LONDONDERRY, June 8.—(By Associated Press). Six hundred men of the Liverpool regiment arrived here last night, taking up quarters in Termonbhacca house on the Donegal side of the river. The Londonderry military barracks are on the county Londonderry side of the river so there are now large concentrations on both banks of the river.

The republicans have commandeered the St. Johns Orange hall four miles from Londonderry and also Dunmore lodge.

An Exchange Telegraph statement on the concentration says: "Several thousand rebels are reported to be concentrated at Raphoe, county Donegal, armed with the latest American rifles. Large rebel forces on the northern side of the Derry-Donagall border are reported to be conscripting Donegal loyalists who believe they are going to be used as a screen in a rebel attack on Londonderry."

OFFER MAX OSER A JOB IN HELENA

HELENA, Mont., June 8.—If Max Oser, fiancé of Mathilde McCormick, granddaughter of John D. Rockefeller, is unemployed for the summer a job awaits him in the Yellowstone park at a "satisfactory salary."

The Swiss horseman has been offered an offer of employment by a park transportation company from its headquarters in Helena. It became known today.

The company's message follows: "If unemployed will offer you position in charge of saddle horse tours in Yellowstone park with satisfactory salary. Answer."

Bolshevik Arrest Catholic

LONDON, June 8.—A sensation has been created at the Vatican by a report of the arrest by the Bolsheviks of Monsignor Czaplak, coadjutor of the Catholic metropolitan and at present the highest Catholic authority in Russia, says a dispatch to the Times from Rome.

But the film ended, then the lights switched on and a turnkey saw the real move of the evening was not in the picture and sounded an alarm.

Five of the men were captured during the night and one early today. Like a real reel, freight trains were handy just back of the jail and authorities believe a score or more of the jailbreakers are well on their way north. Some were mild-mannered prisoners and others were awaiting trial.
