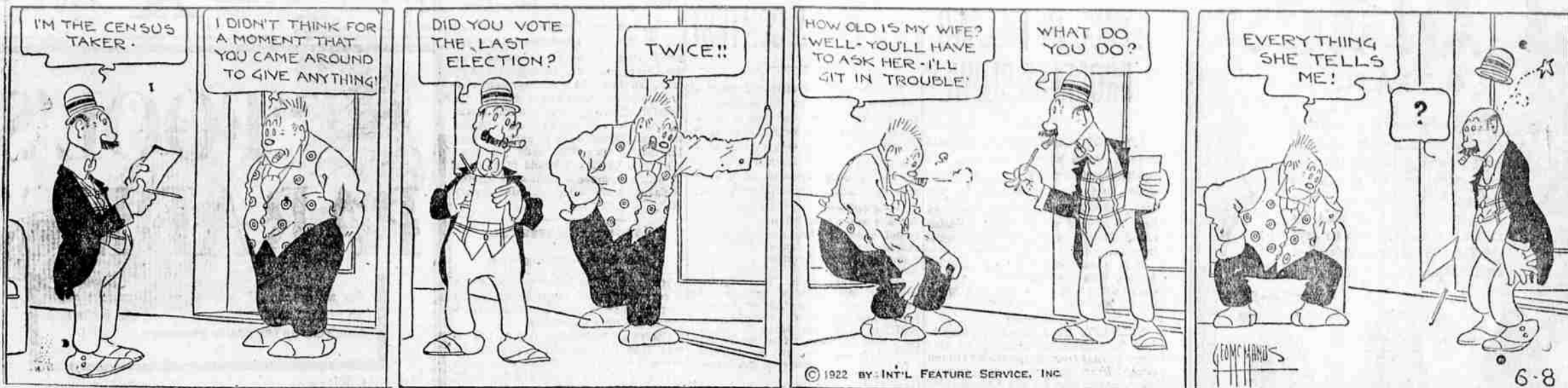


BRINGING UP FATHER

SAN DIEGO GREETES SECRETARY DENBY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 8.—Secretary Edwin Denby of the navy department today became the guest of San Diego and will remain until six o'clock tomorrow evening when he will depart aboard the United States transport Henderson for Japan. The secretary is accompanying members of the Annapolis class of 1881 who are voyaging to the Orient on the transport.

The Henderson entered San Diego bay early today and was moored at the Municipal dock, where officers of the navy and marine corps, accompanied by army men and by a committee of citizens, greeted the visitors at 8:30.

A short reception on the Henderson was followed by a parade through flag-draped downtown streets, an escort of cavalry leading the procession with the secretary and other guests occupying flower-decorated automobiles.

PRESIDENT HARDING OFF FOR PRINCETON

WASHINGTON, June 8.—President Harding accompanied by Mrs. Harding and a small party of friends, left Washington shortly after nine o'clock this morning for New Jersey, where tomorrow he will deliver an address at the dedication of the Princeton battlefield monument.

The president and his party traveled on a regularly scheduled train.

Accompanying the president in addition to Mrs. Harding were Senators Frelinghuysen and Edge of New Jersey, Speaker Gillett of the house, Secretary Christian and several newspaper men.

FRUIT BUYER KILLED AS SON IS BORN

YAKIMA, Wash., June 8.—Fred Hartie, fruit buyer from San Francisco who has been making his headquarters here for some days, and whose wife this morning gave birth to a son, was killed today when the automobile in which he and Walter Vasey were riding turned over near Natches, 20 miles north of here when struck by another car. Hartie lived for a short time after being pinned under the car. He was one of thirteen children and the baby was the first child of the second generation. The father's death took place about an hour after the birth of the son.
