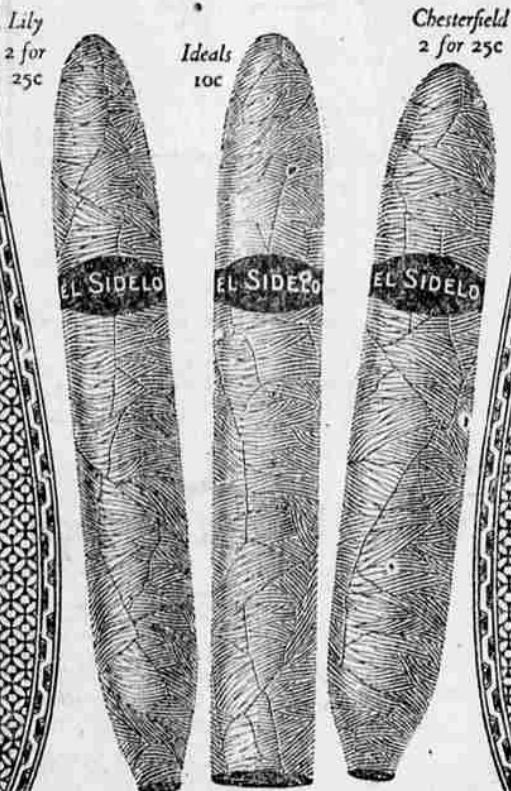

NEGOTIATIONS FOR PEACE IN IRELAND PROGRESS SLOWLY

LONDON, June 8.—(By Associated Press.) Irish negotiations are proceeding satisfactorily, it is officially stated and a full conference of the treaty signatories probably will be held tomorrow when Prime Minister Lloyd George is expected to return from his holiday trip to Wales.

It is understood that the experts dealing with the question of the Irish constitution will have a further meeting today.

THE SITUATION, adds the correspondent, "is somewhat Gilbertian and could only happen in an Irish war. There is Pettigoe in the free state, loyalist to a man, now under the authority of British troops, while on the other hand Belleek in Ulster, except for the fort, Catholic to the backbone, is now under the domination of irregulars who are neither Orange nor free state. This is confusing to an outsider."

"The people of Pettigoe are making every effort to retain the British troops until the boundary question is settled and a deputation is going to Belfast to put the case before the home secretary."

As the British forward march continued this morning, special constables acting as observers, occupied the hill-tops, commanding a view of Belleek and Magheramona castle. Advance parties of speeches held the roads and other strategic points. The troops engaged in the march are details from the three British regiments equipped with 4.2 inch howitzers.

RAIDING KLEAGLE LOSES HIS MIND

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—Nathan A. Baker, kleagle of the Ku Klux Klan, who, according to his own admission is said to have led the masked raid on Inglewood two months ago, broken in mind and spirit today, was in the psychopathic ward of the county hospital under observation.

Baker was arrested and placed there late yesterday after reports had reached the district attorney's office that Baker planned to take his own life.

NAPIERVILLE, Ill., June 8.—Evidence tending to connect the Ku Klux Klan with the destruction by fire of the St. Peter and St. Paul church here Sunday is being investigated by the state fire marshal today. Rev. B. J. Schutte, pastor of the church, is understood to have laid the evidence before the fire marshal.

An initiation of the Ku Klux Klan was held a few miles from the site of the church Saturday night. Fire broke out in the church a short time after the klansmen disbanded.

THOUSANDS SHRINERS TO PASS THRU CITY

Over 50 special trains carrying Eastern, middle west and northwest people from many large cities will pass thru Medford on the Southern Pacific railroad between June 13th and 20th carrying Shrine delegations to and from the National Shrine convention at San Francisco, and the Rotary clubs from their national convention at Los Angeles. Few of these trains will stop in Medford however over a minute or two.

The first of the Shriner trains will pass thru here Sunday morning, including Al Kader temple of Portland in two special trains and temples from Seattle, Galveston, Dallas, Philadelphia, Columbus, O., Buffalo and Louisville. It is understood the Louisville delegation train will stop in Medford for two hours Sunday.

Members of Hulah temple are arranging welcoming and greeting committees to meet these trains. The chambers of commerce has appointed Mayor Gates, Mark Montgomery and Chas. W. Davis to have the Southern Pacific depot and platform properly decorated with Shrine colors and emblems in honor of the many traveling Shriners.

certificate. After January 1, 1926, the government would make loans on the certificate on varying amounts according to the time negotiated.

Chairman McCumber said in his report that the committee had recommended elimination of the reclamation provision of the house bill for three reasons—any reclamation scheme would be exceedingly expensive and will in the end necessitate the expenditure of millions of dollars; it will be many years before a veteran will be able to determine whether he could secure any rights under such plan and where the projects will be located; and, in making an application for such aid the veteran would not know anything relative to location, cost or advantage of the project.

As a land settlement provision in place of the reclamation veterans would be given preference in making entry on any public or Indian lands opened to entry. To pay for these lands they would be entitled to a sum equal to the adjusted service credit, increased by 5 per cent.

Some ceremony attended the removal of the bill from the finance committee quarters in the senate office building to the capitol. Senator McCumber was accompanied from his office and across the capitol grounds by representatives of the American Legion and other veterans' organizations, while motion picture machines ground away.
