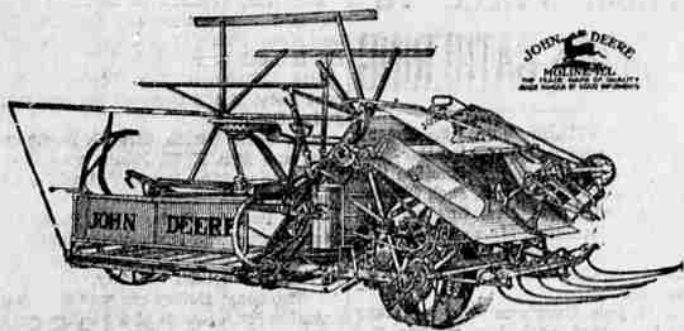

STATE SCORES IN MURDER TRIAL

WENATCHEE, Wash., June 9.—The state scored heavily late yesterday in the case of the state of Washington vs. Ray Bigelow and Everett Bozarth, charged with murder in the first degree in connection with the shooting of Jacob Weber on the night of November 26, 1921, when Judge Bell of Everett allowed Weber's dying statement to be included in the testimony. The jury was sent from the room three times while attorneys argued points of law, all rulings going against the defense.

Miss Alice Barton, nurse at the Overden home, where Weber died, who reached the wounded man a few moments after the shooting, repeated Weber's statement:

"I hit one of the boys over the head with my cane and the other boy said: 'Shoot the son of a —.' The defense strenuously objected to this but Judge Bell ruled it admissible under the rule of res gestae which permits a man's dying statement to be given in testimony. At the first trial Judge Bell ruled this statement out.

R. R. TELEGRAPHERS NOT INVOLVED

CHICAGO, June 9. — Railroad telegraphers will not be involved in the third wage reduction order of the railroad labor board, according to rumors today of the new contemplated slash from railroad payrolls.

The telegraphers number approximately 81,000. So many local conditions on various roads have to be considered that deliberation of an order affecting the telegraphers would necessarily consume weeks, it was said.

Chief among the groups are 220,000 clerks, 22,000 men in the signal departments and 80,000 freight handlers and truckers. Although the board members made no direct statement regarding the next cut, rumors were persistent in predicting a smaller reduction for clerical forces than those affecting the shop men, because the clerks did not receive increases proportionately as great as other groups of employees when the wage scale was going up.

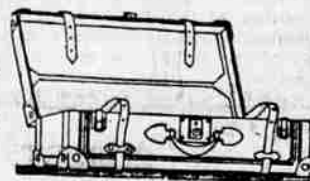
