

MAN WHO RODE WITH IMMORTAL 600 TELLS STORY

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia.—Ellis Cutting of this city, rode into the valley of death with the immortal six hundred.

Sitting at his home here this man who rode, "into the jaws of death, into the mouth of hell," recalls the charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava in the Crimean war. He saw Capt. Nolan, brave young aide-de-camp of the British commander, Lord Raglan, dash up and hand Lord Lucan, cavalry commander, a note. Mr. Cutting, then a seventeen-year-old British trooper, did not know what the note contained. History says it contained these terse orders: "Lord Raglan wishes the cavalry to advance rapidly to the front and try to prevent the enemy carrying away the guns—French cavalry is on your left."

Cutting saw his commander thrust that note into his glove before his bearer rode away.

"Forward, the Light Brigade!" The command rang. There was a flash of sabres. Down into the valley dashed the line of British horsemen, to certain destruction.

Cutting, who for 45 years was a railroad employe at Iowa Falls and Cedar Falls, retired two years ago and is now making his home in this city. He is now 85 years old and was seventeen when he enlisted in the Eleventh Hussars of her majesty, Queen Victoria. Mr. Cutting believes he is among the last, if not the last, of the men who were immortalized by Tennyson.

He vividly recalls the charge. He says he saw nothing, knew nothing but felt within him the insane urge that drove him forward with a furious desire to bury his sabre in a Russian breast.

"The Light Brigade," Mr. Cutting says, "was composed of the Fourth and Thirteenth Dragoons, the Eighth and Eleventh Hussars and the Seventeenth Lancers. It was commanded by Lord Cardigan. The men wore red trousers and blue jackets which gained for them the name of 'Cherry-legs.'"

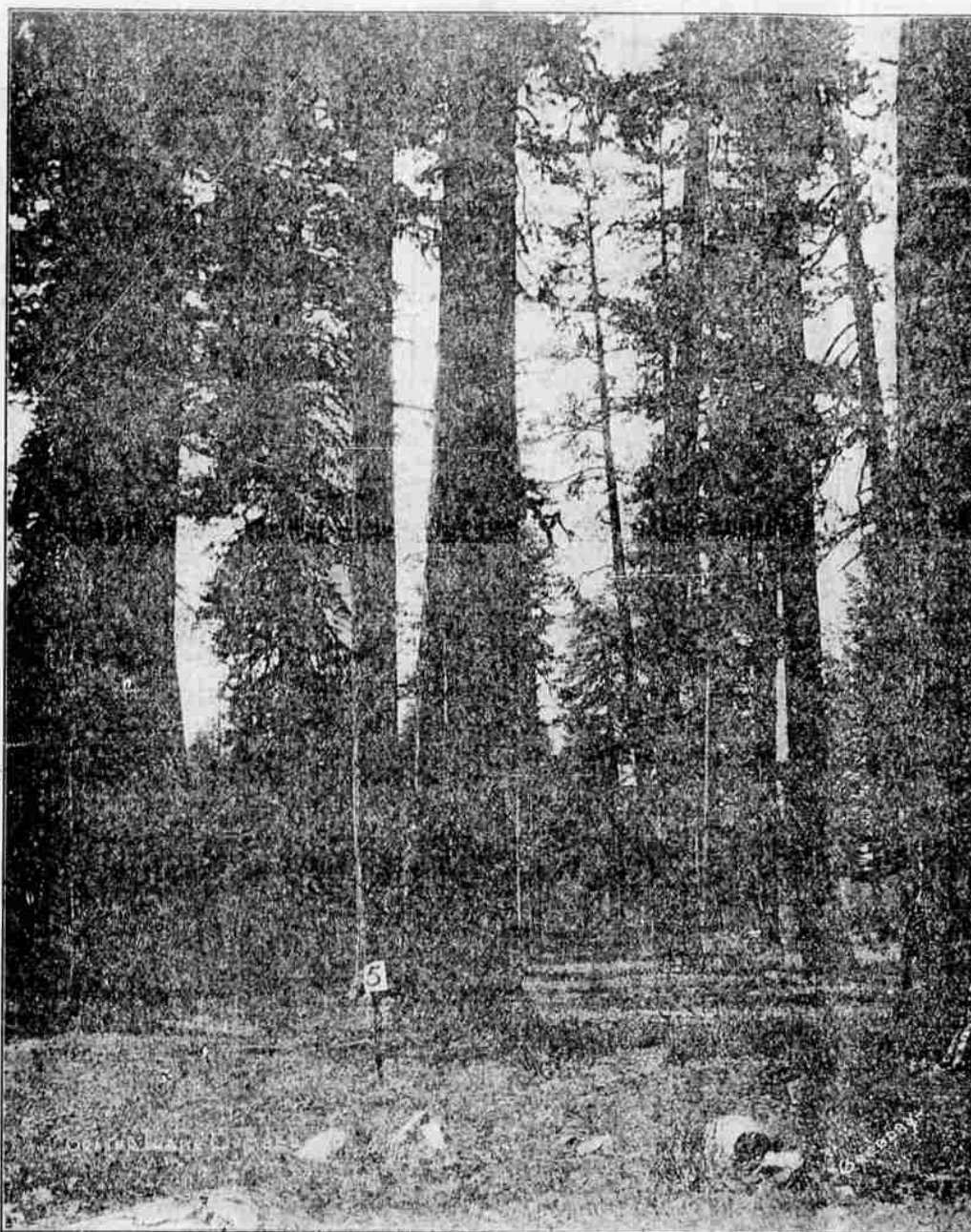
"The Brigade had been lying inactive during the progress of the fighting until the order to charge came. The battle had hardly begun until it was over. Blindly a few stragglers, clambering over moaning comrades, struggling through heaps of dead and dying horses and men in death throes, pools of blood, fought their way to the rear of the line."

Mr. Cutting diagnoses with history as to the number who returned. He says there were only six.

He was asked what was the secret of the futile and merciless command. Cutting said Lord Raglan denied to Lord Lucan that he had ever given the order to charge, and that then Lord Lucan pulled the order from his glove where he had tucked it.

Lucan asked.

Mr. Cutting does not know what the reply was, but for ten minutes he saw them engaged in a battle of words. He believes Lord Raglan gave it in good faith, but that instead of rushing in the cavalry, the infan-

try should have been sent in to maneuver.

VEGETABLES IN U. S. A. VALUED AT OVER A BILLION

WASHINGTON.—Vegetables grown in the United States in 1921 had an estimated value of \$1,104,000,000, according to the department of agriculture. This was 15.7 percent of the total value of all crops. The products of market gardens, which may or may not have been productive enough to be farms within the census definition, are not included in these estimates.

The total value of truck vegetables produced for sale often called the commercial crop, was estimated by the department at \$227,000,000.

The potato crop had a farm value of \$385,000,000, and the sweet potato, \$87,000,000. Together, these two crops comprised 43 percent of the value of all vegetables in 1921. The tomato crop of 1921 had a farm value of \$60,000,000; the cantaloupe crop was worth \$17,000,000; the cucumber, watermelon and cabbage crops each had a value of about \$15,000,000.

Farm gardens are a new item in the vegetable list and had an estimated value of \$405,000,000 in 1921.

The value of the vegetable crop in relation to prominent single crops and to groups of crops has some striking ratios for 1921, a year when the values of the large crops were low the department pointed out. The total value of the vegetable crop for 1921 was 85 percent of the value of the great corn crop; it was almost as large as the value of the hay and forage crops; it was nearly one-half as large as the value of the dairy products; it was considerably larger than the value of all poultry products; 46 percent larger than the value of the cotton crop; and 50 percent larger than the value of the winter and spring wheat crops.

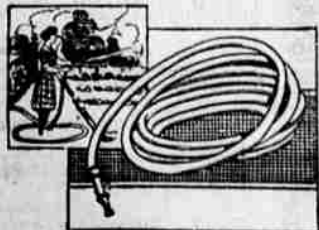

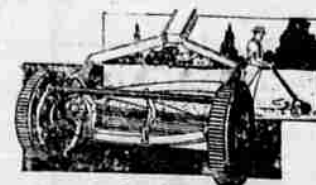
