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P. O. RECEIPTS SHOW STEADY CITY GROWTH

First Five Months in 1922
Show Increase Over 1921
As Well As Over Boom Days
of 1911—Declared Certain
Barometer of Growth.

Gross postal receipts of the Medford postoffice for the first five months of this year, show a 11 per cent increase over the same period in 1921. From January 1, 1921 to May 31, 1921 the gross receipts totaled \$17,142.52, and for the same period this year amounted to \$19,054.62. Based upon the present ratio of increase, the Medford postoffice will do a business of \$50,000 and over this calendar year.

In considering these figures of postal business and receipts, one should consider that they are recognized as the true barometer of a community's prosperity, and invariably rise and fall, with the changing tide of conditions.

The high water mark of the boom days—in August, 1911—the postal receipts for the twelve months preceding totaled \$33,527.49. For the eleven months from July 1, 1921 to May 31, 1922, the receipts were \$42,957.24.

For the 12 months preceding September, 1908, when the present records began the receipts were \$13,454.91. From thence the receipts showed a gain until the high mark of the boom period, and then a decline commenced, reaching ebb for the 12 months preceding October, 1915, when the receipts aggregated \$26,614.72.

For the period immediately following the war, and its last days, when the three-cent stamp and the two-cent postcard was in effect, the receipts from July 1, 1918 to June 30, 1919 were \$34,595.05.

The following is a table of comparison of the gross receipts, for the first five months of 1921, and the present year, and with the exception of January, 1922 shows an increase over 1921:

The falling off in January is due to the slack after the Christmas rush. The high month for this year is March with receipts of \$4,435.56. July and August are, usually dull, and the fall and winter months are generally heavy in normal years.

TOMLIN FACTORY TURNING OUT 8000 BOXES DAY

Busiest Lumber Mill in the
County Is On Tomlin Prop-
erty—Over 50 Men Em-
ployed Cutting 35,000 Feet
Per Day.

The busiest lumber mill in southern Oregon just now is the mill at the Tomlin Box factory, in north Medford. About 35 thousand feet of lumber is put out daily, and the box factory has a capacity of approximately 8000 apple or pear boxes every 24 hours.

The past few weeks Mr. Tomlin has installed new machinery and equipment in both the sawmill and box factory, and whenever circumstances justify can enlarge to a 50,000 foot capacity. Over 50 men are being employed at the present time, and boxes are being sent all over the Pacific coast and even down to Mexico.

The logs for the Tomlin mill are trucked in from the hills near Medford and also some logs are sent in from the Grants Pass and Glendale districts.

At the present rate of growth Medford promises to have in the Tomlin property one of the largest box factories in the state in the near future, for it has made a steady and consistent growth since its establishment.

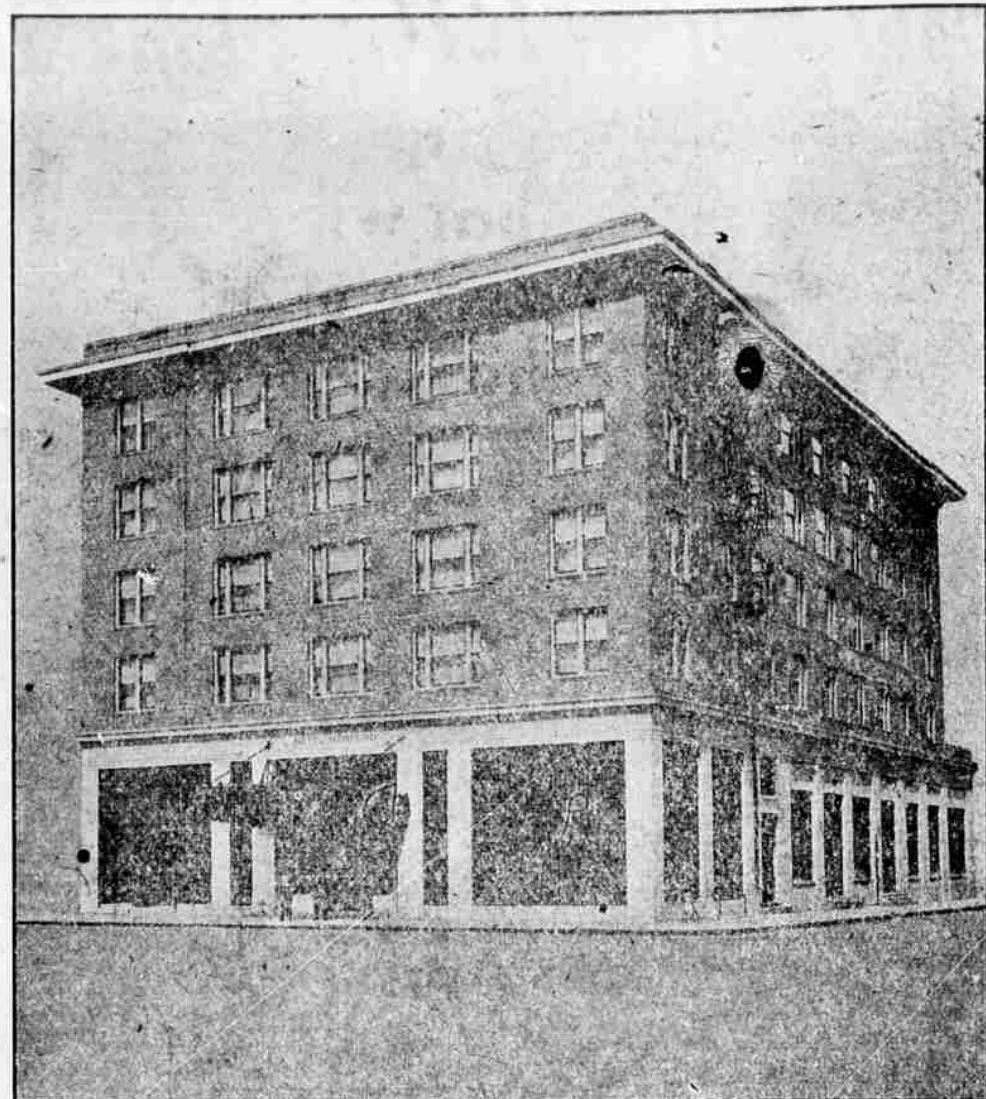
