JAP SENTENCED MONTH IN JAIL AND \$300 FINE

After attorney F. J. Newman for the defense had changed the plea of not guilty which K. Suzuki made this morning in Justice Taylor's court to guilty and then asked for leniency, Suzuki was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$300 on a charge of having unlawfully having possessed intoxicating liquor.

Suzuki was arrested this morning and was allowed until 2:00 p. m. to secure an attorney to represent him in court. When arraigned this morning he pleaded not guilty. When Mr. Newman arrived to defend him this afternoon he inspected the still, the liquor and the large crocks which had contained mash which were in the courtroom and which the officers had confiscated when they raided the gardener's residence this morning and then advised the court that the defense wished to change the plea to guilty.

Officer S. B. Sandefer, Constable Hemstreet and Chief of Police Timothy raided the Japanese gardener's residence at the end of West Main street this morning and confiscated approximately 3 gallons of moonshine which tested 50 per cent alcohol by volume, one still which had been constructed by fitting a copper tubing condensing coil to the lid of a National Steam-Cooker and two large crocks which had contained fig mash from which the liquor was being made.

The officers stated that Suzuki made the liquor from wormy and imperfect figs purchased in large quantities from local grocery stores. In trying to determine the severity of the sentence and to ascertain the worthiness of the defense plea for leniency, Justice Taylor questioned S. B. Sandefer and Chief of Police Timothy both of whom declared that responsible sources of information had told them that the defendant had been delivering the moonshine in baskets of lettuce and concealed in other garden produce.

WAR EAGLE MINE WORK PROGRESSING PROSPECTS BRIGHT

Mining engineers are giving very favorable reports on the War Eagle Mine, one of the most productive quicksilver mines in the west. Many prominent Medford business men have subscribed stock and are taking an active part in its development. Prospects for the future of the War Eagle mine are bright and when the present program of the directors is carried out this mine will be known throughout the country and will provide a material payroll increase for southern Oregon.

1700 feet of drifts, tunnels and stopes have already been constructed and work is being rushed on a greater tunnel system. A \$10,000 furnace has been installed with a 35 ton per day capacity. Several cottages have been built in addition to the bunkhouse, cookhouse and other mine buildings. The holdings of the company amount to 520 acres of well timbered, well watered land situated on Evans creek twenty-five miles north of Medford. There is a seven-year indicated supply of ore at the present time. The Medford men actively interested in the War Eagle mine and who are pushing its development are C. M. Kidd, A. L. Hill, J. D. LOS ANGELES STADIUM COMPLETED IN MARCH

LOS ANGELES, June 9.—The new stadium here which has been under construction since last fall will be completed probably in March next year under present conditions of construction. It will be a large oval, housing a quarter mile track with a 220 yard straight-away, and in the center will be all field facilities for baseball, lacrosse, football and other track and field events. The bleachers will be of concrete construction and with a seating capacity of 75,000 with constructive provisions that will enable building of additional tiers at any time to increase the capacity to 100,000.

The total value of the project, including land value, is estimated at \$2,500,000.
