YAKIMA GRANGE TABOOS POLITICS

YAKIMA, Wash., June 9.—Political action for the state Grange of Washington is barred by the resolution passed unanimously today, by which committees and officers of the Grange are prevented from "endorsing any political party or candidate."

Delegates from the farmer-labor party, J. C. Kennedy and Mrs. Lorene Wiswell Wilson of Seattle, and Benjamin C. Marsh, secretary of the farmers national council from Washington, D. C., had hoped to obtain the convention floor for appeals for association in a campaign against Senator Miles Polidexter, but were stopped by the resolution. A conference of "liberals," including leaders of several of the minority parties, will be held here tomorrow and the leading grangers have been asked to remain for it.

PLANK SAVES LIFE OF KLAMATH BOY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 9.—Virgil Williams, aged 19, owes his life to the unaccountable premonition of a friend who placed a plank in Williams' motorboat before he left a camp at the upper end of Klamath lake yesterday. The sky was cloudless and the lake calm when the lad started alone for this city. Midway of the trip a sudden squall caught the craft, the engine died and the boat capsized.

Williams, who was unable to swim a stroke, seized a plank and drifted three-quarters of an hour in the icy waters before reaching shore exhausted.

STATE GRANGE FOR REDUCED SALARIES

McMINNVILLE, Ore., June 9.—The state Grange convention today was engaged in a debate over a resolution proposed by the Linn county delegation which demanded the abolition of certain state commissions and consolidation of others and to make department heads responsible to the board of control. The resolution suggested that the Grange legislative committee prepare the proposed legislation to be submitted to the voters in 1924.

The convention today adopted a resolution of the Tillamook county delegation proposing revision downward of salaries of state officers, including members of the state highway commission.

PRESIDENT ENJOYS GOLF AT RARITAN

PRINCETON, N. J., June 9.—President Harding reached here today at 1 p. m. to dedicate the Princeton battle monument after traveling across country by motor from Somerville, N. J., with his party.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., June 9.—President Harding planned to leave here at noon today for Princeton, N. J., to dedicate there a monument erected to commemorate the revolutionary war exploits of George Washington in the Princeton-Trenton campaign.

A familiar golf foursome with Senators Frelinghuysen and Edge of New Jersey and Speaker Gillette of the house, made up from the presidential party while away the party's stay in Raritan valley with Mrs. Harding and Secretary Christian. The presidential party was well entertained by Senator Frelinghuysen during the trip.

SHORT APPLE CROP IN WASHINGTON

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 9.—A preliminary crop estimate issued today by the state department of agriculture as of June 1, predicts a shorter crop of apples this year than last, while other fruits generally show an increase. There were 32,410 carload shipments of apples last year in this state, while the estimate this year is 28,463 carloads. It is predicted there will be 3401 carloads of pears as compared with 2999 in 1921 and 1815 carloads of peaches compared with 1874 last year. Cherries are expected to run 566 carloads this year; fresh prunes 1210; dried prunes ten million pounds; apricots 120 carloads and grapes 100 carloads.

The potato crop is expected to be about 9197 carloads and the onions are expected to run to 1500 carloads.

BENNY LEONARD AND J. BRITTON MATCHED

NEW YORK, June 9.—Benny Leonard and Jack Britton signed contracts here this afternoon for a championship bout to be fought at the New York velodrome on the night of June 26. Formal announcement of the match was made by Promoter Tex Rickard after several hours conference with the managers of the two title holders.

EDDIE RICKENBACKER EN ROUTE OMAHA

CHICAGO, June 9.—Eddie Rickenbacker reached here at 7 o'clock this morning on his around-the-country flight and left at 12:30 p. m. for Omaha, expecting to reach there tonight. He planned to proceed to Denver and Salt Lake City tomorrow and then to San Francisco, reaching the latter place late Saturday night or early Sunday.

Reports from Canton say Dr. Sun has called together the members of the parliament who had gathered there and renewed to them his assertion that his government is the only legal one in China. He also announced that he would not recognize the legality of Li's return to the presidency. Dr. Sun is using his influence, apparently successfully, to keep these parliament members from going to Tien Tsin to form a government.

There is strong pressure here in Peking for the immediate naming of a government leader. The members of the cabinet of the resigned Hsu Shih Chang, who are now functioning as a "citizens' committee" having repudiated all legal authority, today informed Wu Pei Fu that it was essential a president be put in office at once.
