SALEM, Ore., June 9.—Semi-official
returns from all precincts in the state
compiled by Secretary of State Koser
give Governor Olcott a lead of 521
votes over Charles Hall, of Marshfield,
for the republican gubernatorial nomi-
nation in the May primary election.
The vote of the two candidates is
shown as Olcott 43,932; Hall 42,511.

The vote of other candidates fol-
lows: Louis E. Bean 3870; J. D. Lee
2066; I. L. Patterson 13,019; George A.
White 10,156.
