

FORUM TUESDAY AND VISIT TO FAIR GROUNDS

No forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce will be held next Wednesday, but a short business forum will be held at the Medford hotel on Tuesday noon, June 13th. The business will be transacted during the luncheon and adjournment will be taken so that the members of the chamber may be at the fair grounds at one o'clock in time to witness the moving of the first shovel of dirt for the construction of fair buildings.

Everyone who has a car is being asked to be at the fair grounds to attend this little ceremony which will take but a very few minutes. It is a publicity stunt that the fair association is asking the people of the county back. Pictures will be taken and also will be used in advertising the fair this fall. It will be a poor advertisement if there are only a few people present so that everyone who can could make an effort to be on the grounds promptly at one o'clock. There is no reason why the merchants of Medford cannot be back at their place of business by one fifteen unless they are to stop and look over the immense piles of lumber now stacked on the grounds or get an idea of the location and size of the buildings which are staked out. The progress being made on the speedway may interest those who attend and the directors of the fair association will be on hand to answer questions as to what is being contemplated in improvements.

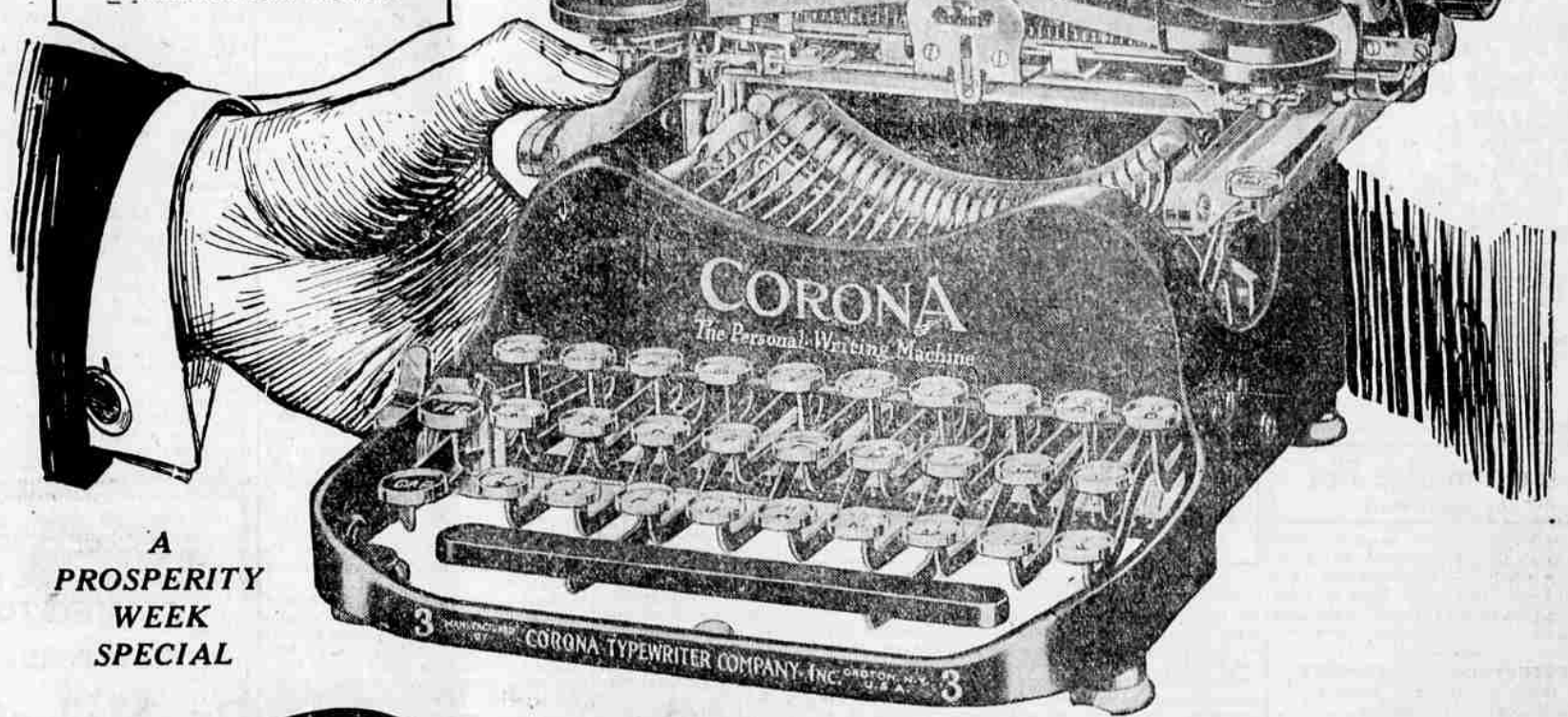
