

STATE HIGHWAY INSPECTOR BADLY HURT BY TRUCK

Clinton Arnold, who has been employed as an inspector for the state highway department, had his leg badly crushed yesterday when the cables on a hydraulic hoist on a large highway construction truck broke and allowed the front end of the dump body of the truck to fall on Arnold's leg. Today Arnold was resting easily and it is believed the leg will be saved.

The truck was spreading sand on the new highway just above Prospect and the driver had stopped the truck and had tilted the dump body ready to let go part of the load of sand. The front end of the body was held high by the hoist and Arnold climbed up and was trying to assist the driver by pulling the lever releasing part of the load when the cables supporting the front end of the body parted. The front end of the five-ton load dropped, pinching his leg between the under side of the body and the frame of the truck.

Luckily the body of the truck does not come flush with the frame at this point but it came within about 1/2 inches of it and his leg was compressed into this space and was painfully crushed. Several men worked for more than 30 minutes in getting the body of the truck pried away from the frame far enough to admit of extricating Arnold's leg. He was at once brought to this city by Jim Cleave and by his cousin, Dewey Hill of Prospect, in Greve's car. Upon his arrival here he was taken to Sacred Heart hospital.

Central Point, June 9.—Another one of those most successful of Baby Clinics was held here Thursday afternoon in the High School laboratory room under the direction of the Central Point committee of the Jackson County Health association, including the following ladies: Miss Mildred Carlton, Mrs. Victor Bursell, Mrs. R. VETERAN WORLD WAR IS HERE TO ESTABLISH POST

Tom Harney, a veteran of the World War, who is walking from Massachusetts to Seattle, has arrived and will take steps to organize a post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in this city. Harney expects to arrive in Seattle in time for the opening of the Veterans of Foreign Wars convention August 7th. He travels in full marching equipment, helmet and all, and is accompanied by his Airedale dog, "Girley."

Any man who saw service on foreign soil or waters between 1898 and 1921 is eligible to membership in the organization represented by Harney, and is fraternal, historical, patriotic, and educational, and is founded upon the doctrine of Theodore Roosevelt—one flag, one country, one language, tolerance, non-political, and non-sectarian.

Mr. Harney expects to remain in this city several days, and will put up a recruiting tent, in a drive for members, and if successful will establish a post and name it after one who paid the supreme sacrifice in the late war.

It has come to the attention of the officers of the Medford post of the American Legion that certain ex-service men are soliciting subscriptions for a magazine and representing that they are working for the national soldiers' bonus. The bonus question is being taken care of by the American Legion and the members of the local post want to again warn the public that these subscription solicitors are working for personal gain and that money given to them is furthering the cause of the ex-service man little, if any. The one big national organization for veterans of the world war is the American Legion and the people of Medford are requested to require any man claiming consideration of any kind because of service in the world war to show proper credentials from the American Legion and unless he can show them, to refuse assistance of any kind. It is only by these means that the legion can protect the public from being imposed upon.

Various money-making schemes have been started in the name of the ex-service man and an investigation by the legion has almost always exposed these schemes as fakes. One set of solicitors the local post was instrumental in stopping in Medford were later arrested in Portland and so the American Legion wishes to again ask the public to pay no money or give any other help to any man until they have communicated with some member of the local post.
