

CRATER'S CLUB TO HAVE CHARGE OF FAIR CEREMONY

O. O. Alenderfer, the Big Eruption of the Craters club, will turn the first shovel of dirt for the permanent buildings to be erected on the county fair grounds. The little ceremony will be in charge of the Craters club and will take place promptly at one o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

A photograph will be taken to show that the people of the county are interested in their new fair buildings. Every Crater who can possibly do so is asked to be at the fair grounds and the general public is invited to participate in this event.

Every car owner is requested to bring a load of people to the grounds and be there at the appointed hour. All who attend this short ceremony can be back in Medford by one fifteen unless they stop to inspect the progress being made on the speedway and be shown the sights selected for the entrance building, the woman's building, the grand stand, the stock pavilion and the horticultural and agricultural palace. The latter building will be the largest one, measuring 75 by 149 feet.

STEPS FROM STREET CAR, HIT BY AUTO

Joe Gibson stepped from the south side of the Medford-Coast Railway street car last night at 9:50 and was struck by an Overland touring car driven by Glenn Fabrick, Jr., which was traveling east on Main street near Fir. The driver of the car at once applied the brakes and stopped within a very few feet from the point at which the man had been hit and knocked down. A doctor was called at once and the injured man was taken to Sacred Heart hospital where it was said by the attending physician that his injuries were not particularly serious, and he is expected to be up and about in a few days.

The street car had been standing in front of the depot, across from the Standard Oil station for some time. Gibson was aboard and was waiting for the car to start. Just before the car was ready to start he stepped from the rear exit directly in front of the approaching auto which was running within three or four feet of the car. It is supposed that he had forgotten something. He stepped from the rear of the car and was knocked behind it thus escaping being run over by the wheels of the auto.

Witnesses of the accident attribute no blame to anyone and consider it unavoidable.

NORRIS' GREAT SEA DRAMA AT PAGE

Frank Norris had no thought of motion pictures when he set great splashes of life across the pages of his manuscripts.

"McTeague" it was which astounded literary prophets, through its power and elemental force, its welcoming Norris as the future author of the "Great American Novel"—into referring to him as "the American Zola."

And after "McTeague" had made its great mark an earlier novel, "Moran of

the Lady Letty," came to light, written in the very flush of the author's vigorous style and before he had turned his attention to work of a more philosophical and less "active" nature.

In spite of the tremendously difficult scenic problems it presented—for the story is laid on the deep sea, amid hazardous storms—the story appealed to Jesse L. Lasky as splendid picture material and rights to the novel were secured.

But the problems of "location" were complicated with those of casting.

Norris' heroine is feminine to her rosy finger tips, yet vigorous of body, energetic of mind, capable of handling a mutinous ship's crew and subduing them to obedience.

Norris' hero is a son of aristocracy, yet equipped with the muscles of a stevedore and the grit and speed of a four-round champion.

Location perplexities of this Paramount picture of "Moran of the Lady Letty," which opens at the Page theatre tomorrow for four days, were solved by Producer George Melford, and the difficulties of casting faded away before the personalities of Dorothy Dalton and Rudolph Valentino.

Frank Norris' genius has been given new vivification.

ASHLAND PLANS FINANCE 4TH BY BUDGET SYSTEM

ASHLAND, June 12.—The budget plan will in a measure finance the Fourth of July celebration project, reinforced by miscellaneous contribution, as it is hoped to establish the budget system's status on a permanent basis. The canvass for the current season has already commenced, C. H. Pierce being chairman of a specific committee, the personnel of which will be reinforced from time to time. The budget proper includes all activities in which the Chamber of Commerce is engaged and their name is legion. It carries with it a purpose to raise \$4000 in a lump sum, and thus eliminate the necessity of campaigning interminably for this, that and the other project. The first day's canvass yielded nearly \$1000 and it is planned to raise the limit within a week. Its plan and scope follows precedent established by the old community war chest which proved such a success.

Concessions are in readiness for the Fourth. A deposit is obligatory when the privilege is granted, the balance being due by June 26. The Salvation Army corps at Medford will have a concession on a convenient location.

Opportunity is lying in wait to boost the celebration and publicity fund in general, either by making a pledge in behalf of the budget purchasing an auto name plate for your car, or investing in a ticket to the booster rally and concert at the Armory June 19.
