

CRATER LAKE IS LAUDED BY AUTHOR IN COUNTRY LIFE

"I have discovered the most beautiful garden in America . . . and the best of it is perhaps that there cannot be another like it; for there is no other Crater Lake."

Among the scenic highways of America "the Columbia River highway is easily supreme."

The first quotation is from Walter Prichard Eaton's article on "Crater Lake" in the June issue of Country Life, and the second is a part of Charles Pierce Burton's article in the June Harpers on "America's Billion Dollar Industry," a review of the highway building achievements in this country.

The article in Country Life is illustrated with some exceptional views of Crater Lake, and Mr. Eaton goes into detail not only on the general scenic attractions of the park, but on the interest it holds for the scientific men, the botanist and geologist.

Coming at the time when the season of Western tourist travel is just opening, these two articles are expected to have an incalculable benefit to Oregon in attracting tourists.

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\$14,000 WILL BE PAID DEPOSITORS OF J'VILLE BANK

An order issued by Judge F. M. Calkins of the circuit court Saturday authorizes the payment of a five per cent dividend on all claims of depositors against the Bank of Jacksonville, which failed in August, 1920. The payment will be through the Superintendent of Banks, Frank C. Bramwell, ten days after the granting of the order. In the neighborhood of \$14,000 will be disbursed, Attorney George M. Roberts acts as attorney for the state bank board.

This is the first step towards a refund to the depositors of the defunct institution, and is made from collections of notes, overdrafts due and collected by those in charge of its liquidation.

According to the report of the state banking board on the condition of the bank, claims approved total \$282,216.87, and the assets of the bank aggregate \$208,062.85, plus approximately \$62,000 more, leaving a difference between assets and liabilities of close to \$25,000. The assets include large judgments obtained for overdrafts, etc., which, the report says are highly improbable of collection.

The report of the state banking board is on file in the office of Attorney George M. Roberts, and is a lengthy and intricate collection of figures, that is difficult for the layman to comprehend, as all the complexities of bookkeeping are involved. Several of the Bank of Jacksonville depositors have perused the report, and were completely dazed by it.

DISPLAY OF WAR PICTURES MADE

At the Veteran of Foreign Wars recruiting tent at Main and Front there is on exhibit a display of war pictures released by the war department, a book containing 1400 pictures including every division and branch of the service. Tom Harney, veteran volunteer hiker and booster, invites all service men and the general public to visit the tent and see the display.

Harney is stopping in Medford for the purpose of organizing a Medford branch of Veterans of Foreign Wars. He has recently formed organizations in many other towns en route from Massachusetts.

Harney has already received a number of applications since the setting up of the tent this morning and he thinks that no difficulty will be encountered in establishing a post here. The recruiting tent will be open until 9:30 next Saturday night.

that every liberty of the people can be taken away provided some individual or group of individuals representing the privileged few desire it for their benefit," the report continued. "The statement is often made that if the United States capitol could be transported to the England of the fifteenth century, half the members of congress would be 'to the manner born.'"

Harding Condemned

President Harding was accused of having contemplated "a system of industrial laws similar to those which prevail in Kansas" when in his message to congress last December he declared that "in the case of labor organizations we might well apply similar and equally well-defined principles of regulation and supervision as he had just previously recommended for corporations" in order to conserve the public's interests as affected by their operations.

"It is hardly believed possible," the report adds, "that the president implied that the present administration intends to further a policy which will deny America's workers the right to cease working collectively and to determine for themselves the conditions under which they will give service. Yet the language used leaves little room for a different conclusion."

"There is but one answer to the entire campaign of employers for the disruption and destruction of the labor movement, and that is continued organization, eternal vigilance, and the highest degree of solidarity."

ice cream cones, pop and buttermilk to the members of Aladdin and Affli temples at from 25 cents to \$1 a throw until the refreshment supplies were sold out. The money all went to the local women operating the wagons. Efforts were made to get

new supplies, but the all day thirst of the visiting Shriners and their love for ice cream cones had resulted in the wholesalers' supply running out. It was 7 p. m. before Affli temple, the last special train of the day to leave, departed.

The Louisville, Ky., temple special train which arrived here Sunday forenoon and the visiting Kentuckians were met at the depot by a hundred or more local autos and were given rides about the city and vicinity and taken over the Pacific highway, as the guests of Medford, to Ashland where they boarded their train two hours later.

Besides the thousands of Shriners passing through on special trains yesterday, all day long hundreds of Shriners from the northwest was coming through Medford by auto en route to the San Francisco convention.

To accommodate the Shriners on the special trains the news service company which operates on the Southern Pacific trains, had temporary stands on baggage trucks on the depot platform, from which were sold newspapers, magazines and the usual things sold on trains by their peddlers.

Next Friday, following the convention, over 20 special trains from various parts of the United States with Shrine temples which came to San Francisco by other routes, will begin to pass through here en route home by the northern route.

sions of retiring to private life, but is being urged to retain his great military power. It is pointed out that he could head a movement to establish a national army representing a united China, to be used only for defense.

Parliament has been summoned to assemble here tomorrow, but is not expected to muster a quorum. The effort to make Wu Ting Fang prime minister of the Peking government is designed to absorb rapidly the influence of the Canton government.

stricken crowds hindered the labors of the volunteer life-savers.

Property damage estimated at from \$1,000,000 to several times that amount was done by the tornado. The storm followed a day of intense heat and was as sudden as it was violent.

Ferris Wheel Wrecked

Clason's Point, a pleasure ground near City Island was in the direct path of the hurricane. A ferris wheel heavily freighted with children and young people had just begun to revolve with its passengers when the wind struck it. So sudden was the transition from a bright June sky to inky clouds that the men in charge of the wheel could not stop it and discharge the people in the cars before the top of the wheel was torn away and the remainder crashed to the ground, a tangled skein of steel. Dozens were buried in the wreck. Six bodies were taken out later and more than two score were attended by ambulance surgeons. A seventh victim died this morning.

Frail buildings were crushed by the mighty weight of the wind; electric wires were torn down and in the darkness and torrential rains the rescuers could do little until the storm had subsided. Hysterical men and women, tearing blindly at the wreckage, hindered rather than helped the workers engaged in lifting ruins of the wheel.

Trees Blown Over

Huge trees in Central Park were uprooted and tossed into driveways. Five people were hurt when the wind blew out great plate glass fronts of stores along Broadway and scattered haberdashery and clothing along the street. In Brooklyn lightning struck a street car and knocked six passengers unconscious. Electric signs along the white way seemed special targets of the cyclonic wind. A high sign extolling the virtues of an automobile tire was torn loose from its moorings, toppled over onto a skylight, carried a smaller sign with it in its plunge and started a fire in the disconnected wiring.

The telephone is a highly sensitive, delicately adjusted instrument. Think of it—without regard to distance, instantaneously reproducing every tone of the human voice.

The quality of its service, in great measure, depends upon careful use.

As with your watch, automobile or piano—the more care, better results.

Among the "out of order" reports received by the company, many result from the carelessness of the subscriber. A telephone may fall from desk or stand, breaking the mouthpiece or throwing the apparatus out of adjustment. The cord may become twisted; meaning a "noisy" line. A damp cloth laid on the cord or the moisture from an open window may cause the "short circuit" and an entire interruption of service.

All of these things are avoidable with the exercise of slight care. In protecting the telephone equipment you are protecting your own service.

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
