

OPEN SEASON IS MADE UNIFORM THROUGHOUT STATE

PORTLAND, June 14.—Open seasons for deer and all upland game birds were made uniform throughout the state by the state game commissioners in unanimous action taken at the regular monthly meeting Monday. This is the first time that Oregon has had open seasons so regulated that the open season for a particular game bird will be the same in all parts of the state.

"Modern transportation and good roads have eliminated sectional lines and made it possible for sportsmen to travel quickly from one part of the state to another and thus enjoy two or three open seasons," declared Captain A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, in explaining the reasons for the commission's action.

Shifting Is Prevented

"There has been a large influx of sportsmen into each district during its open season and those with time and money enough to travel about as they desire have had the opportunity to hunt in many different parts of the state. This new rule of uniform seasons will prevent sportsmen from going from one part of the state to another to hunt and will help the game wardens in enforcing the law, as well as in helping to protect more game birds."

The seasons will be as follows:

Deer, August 20 to November 1.
Grouse and native pheasant, August 20 to September 20.

Sage hens, July 15 to July 31.

Chinese pheasants and quail, October 15 to October 31.

Prairie chickens, October 15 to October 31 in counties where there is open season.

The commission took this action under sections three and seven of the state game laws, which invest the commission with power to open and close seasons and make such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to carry out fully the purpose and intent of the laws pertaining to hunting and angling.

Interstate Uniformity Sought

This plan of uniform seasons has been under consideration of the commission for at least a year. The commissioners have studied the situation from all angles with a view to establishing the seasons at the time best for the majority of sportsmen throughout the state.

A movement is now on foot in the western states to make the seasons, bag limits and license fees correspond to these states, particularly in reference to tourists, but no definite steps have been taken so far.

In Oregon there are no changes in the bag limits or license fees through the action of the commission.

The commissioners outlined an inspection trip for next month. They will leave July 4 and travel to Ontario and then return through southern Oregon, through Vale, Burns, Lakeview, Klamath Falls and Eugene. They will visit the hatcheries en route, and be gone about two weeks. Captain Burghdoff will accompany them.

Plans also were outlined yesterday for development work in the egg taking stations along the coast.

L. E. Bean of Eugene, the new commissioner who takes the place of Bert Anderson of Medford, who resigned recently, was present at his first meeting yesterday. Blaine Hallock of Baker was absent on account of illness. Other commissioners are I. N. Fleischer, George H. Kelly of this city and M. Lynch of Redmond.

JESS WILLARD IS READY TO TACKLE J. DEMPSEY AGAIN

LOS ANGELES, June 14.—Jess Willard is willing to meet Jack Dempsey in a return match for the world's heavyweight championship of the squared circle. So the big Kansas rancher, oil magnate and ex-champion informed a newspaper man when cornered in his home in the Hollywood district here.

"I would meet Dempsey if we could come to terms," the scribe quoted Willard as saying. "Jack Kearns (Dempsey's manager) and I have talked over the terms of another match, but we haven't come to any definite understanding as yet."

Willard said he would probably spend the greater part of the summer in Los Angeles but would make a trip east soon to look after his oil interests in Kansas. During his stay in the east he said, he might enter into arrangements with Tex Rickard, the promoter, and Kearns for a bout with Dempsey.

Willard intimated that the question of gate receipts of such a match, should the proposition materialize, would not stand as a barrier to his signing the articles to meet Dempsey.

It is generally reported here that Willard has been in training since his arrival from the east some weeks ago, although the reports have not been confirmed.

Willard's family is here with him, he has taken a lease on a large but modest house, and it is understood he intends to make his home here indefinitely.

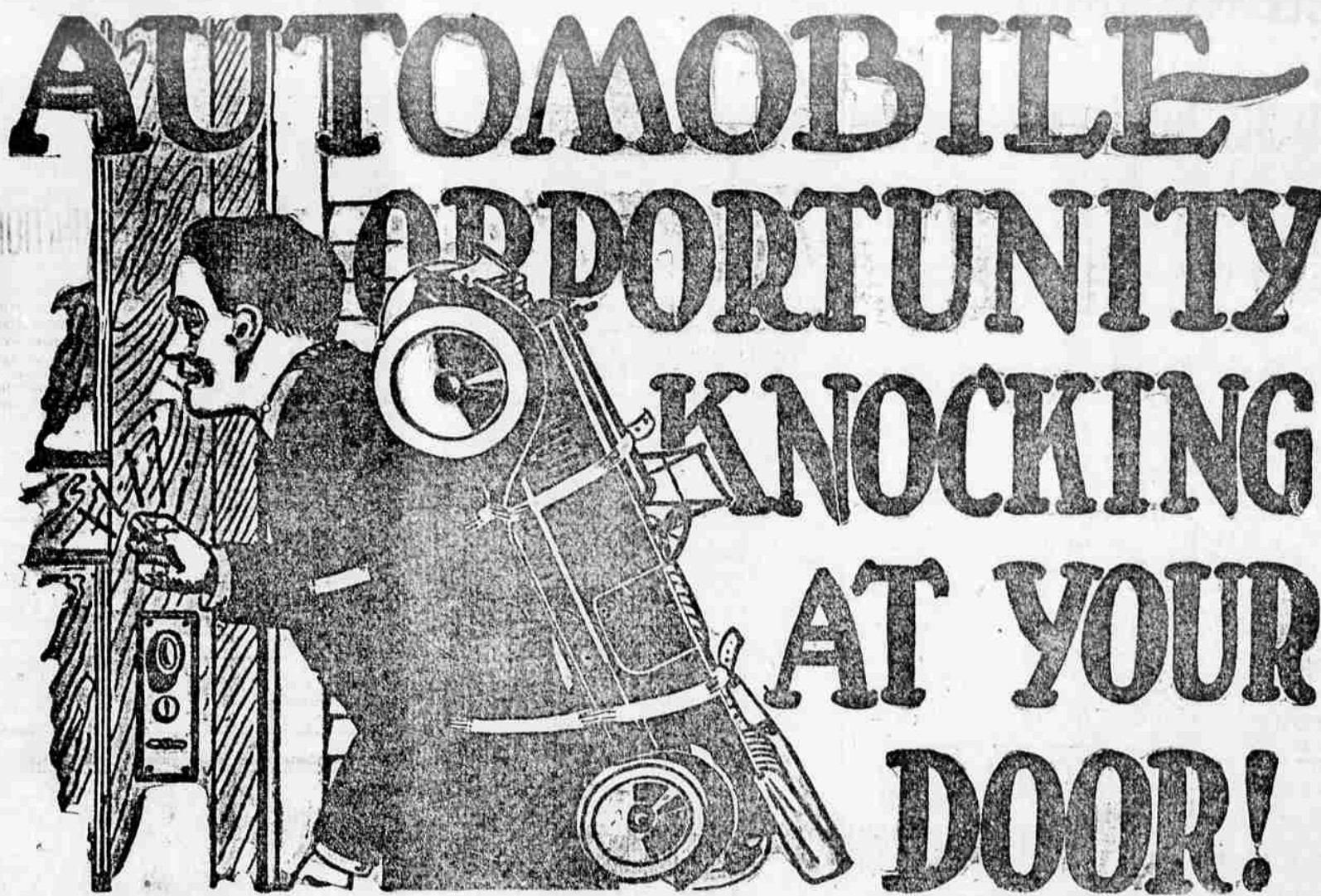
