PUBLIC INSPECTION BROWNLEE MILL TOMLIN FACTORY

Tomorrow's program of "Prosperity Week" consists of a recognition of the industrial and irrigation development that has taken place in the Rogue River valley within the last few years.

Between the hours of ten and twelve tomorrow morning, the general public is invited to inspect the Tomlin Box Co., the big new Brownlee lumber mill and the dumping of logs from the cars of the Pacific & Eastern railway into the mill pond of the Brownlee mill. The Rogue River Canning Co. and other industrial plants will be open for inspection. The Brownlee mill and the operation of the Pacific & Eastern are the two big factors that will bring greater prosperity to the valley than is now being enjoyed.

At two thirty in the afternoon the D. O. K. K. band will start the ceremony at the city park at which the irrigation development, especially the construction of the Medford Irrigation District system, will be given recognition. The ceremony is in charge of a committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, of which Benj. C. Sheldon is chairman. In the evening the Medford Post of the American Legion will stage a busy night in Jacksonville in 1848. No human being, unless he lived in Jacksonville at that time, can visualize what such a night really included and a correct reproduction in every detail is promised.

OREGON N. GUARD START TO ENTRAIN

SALEM, Ore., June 14.—Units of the national guard in 12 counties began entraining today for Puget Sound points for federal field maneuvers. George A. White, adjutant general said that advance estimates placed the attendance at 2000 men, the largest Oregon camp ever held. Organizations from distant points will board the trains today and converge at Portland from which point the entire force will leave on four special trains Thursday morning.

The coast artillery units from Albany, Newport, Toledo and Marshfield will go to Fort Worden tonight in special sleepers so as to arrive in Seattle Thursday morning from which point they will be transferred by boat to the forts opposite British Columbia.

Infantry troops, field artillery, engineers and field hospital units will go to Camp Lewis for their field training, leaving on three special trains out of Portland Thursday morning.

INDIAN WAR VETS MEET IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—Indian war veterans of Oregon will hold their annual encampment here today and tomorrow when the Oregon Pioneer association holds its fiftieth annual reunion.

The Indian war veterans program is directed by Mrs. Maude Springer Bowen, an auxiliary association, the Daughters of Indian War Veterans, is to have charge of their entertainment.

The annual reunion of pioneers will assemble at the municipal auditorium.

Still another event on the calendar of the pioneers is the annual meeting of the sons and daughters of Oregon pioneers, who will assemble tonight.

U. S. Export Trade Drops
WASHINGTON, June 13.—America's export trade suffered another decline during May, dropping from the total of \$213,000,000 reported for April to \$208,000,000. Imports, however, increased in May to \$254,000,000 as compared with \$217,000,000 for April.

CARL GRAY DENIES S. P. DISSOLUTION WOULD RAISE RATE

President C. R. Gray, of the Union Pacific system, says that in view of the widespread discussion of the recent decision of the supreme court holding illegal the control of the Central Pacific by the Southern Pacific, and the frequent reference to the Union Pacific in this connection, it seemed timely to make a statement of the interest of the Union Pacific in the situation resulting from that decision.

Mr. Gray says: The rates would not be more, or the service less, if the Central Pacific were made an independent and competing line as ordered by the supreme court, but every reason just to the contrary; and as for the possibility of the Central Pacific being merged with the Union Pacific, no line has ever come under the control of the Union Pacific which has not been improved in service and facilities to the public, and there is no reason why the present instance should constitute an exception in this respect.

Concluding paragraph of supreme court decision in the case of United States of America vs. Southern Pacific company and Central Pacific Railway company:

"In addition, the several terminal lines and cut-offs leading to San Francisco Bay which have been constructed or acquired during the unified control of the two systems for the purpose of affording direct or convenient access to the bay and to the principal terminal facilities about the bay should be dealt with, either by way of apportionment or by provisions for joint or common use, in such manner as will secure to both companies such full, convenient and ready access to the bay and to terminal facilities thereon that each company will be able freely to compete with the other, to serve the public efficiently, and to accomplish the purpose of the legislation under which it was constructed. And a like course should be pursued in dealing with the lines extending from San Francisco Bay to Sacramento and to Portland, Oregon."

The statement that this decision will wreck and dismember railroad lines now operated by the Southern Pacific company between Portland and San Francisco is obviously unwarranted in the light of this decision. The disposition suggested by the supreme court would result in competitive operations by two companies to the great advantage of the communities served both

in Oregon and California, and the public generally.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Threats of
