Renewal of permits to sell, dispense or prescribe narcotic drugs must be applied for by physicians, druggists, dentists or others holding them by July, according to notice served by Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue. "Returns for registration have not been coming in very promptly," said Huntley. "I am sure that when physicians, druggists and dentists realize that if they do not complete their registrations before July 1 they will be prohibited from possessing, selling, prescribing or dispensing narcotic drugs, they will make every effort to respond promptly to the request sent out on May 20."
