MAYOR GATES TO TAKE CHARGE OF FARM HOME DRIVE

"There is now no more important enterprise being undertaken in the state than the establishment of the Farm Home for the dependent and orphaned children, on a farm which has been recently purchased by the Farm Home Board near Corvallis," declares Mrs. Unruh, campaign manager.

It is proposed to care for the children here in real homes, each cottage being a home unit, with a mother who will give to the homeless children home, love and care.

Mayor Gates has consented at the request of the Home board to take charge of the organization of the campaign for funds for this purpose in Medford and the north part of the county. Ashland district has raised their quota some time since.

Mrs. Unruh, the campaign manager for the Farm Home board visited Medford some days ago and at that time arranged with Mayor Gates to take charge of the campaign. Senator Thomas and other public spirited citizens promising assistance. It is expected that Medford and nearby cities will raise their quota which is \$1800, in time to be available for building the first unit which will be started about July 1st. Medford, says Mrs. Unruh, will be sure to respond with its customary generosity.

JESS WILLARD NOW DECLARES DEMPSEY IS AFRAID OF HIM

LOS ANGELES, June 15.—Declaring Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight pugilistic champion, and his manager Jack Kearns, have been dodging a return match with him since Dempsey won the title at Toledo, Ohio, July 4, 1919, Jess Willard, former champion, today made public through the Los Angeles Express a statement in which he asserts he would be ready to meet Dempsey by next fall if a match could be arranged immediately.

Willard's statement, which local sports followers consider more or less as an open challenge to Dempsey, sets forth that Willard was at one time signed up with Tex Rickard, the promoter, for a return bout with the present champion but that "Dempsey, through his manager, Kearns, dodged the match."

"Dempsey and Kearns fear me and have been dodging a return match with me since Dempsey won the title," Willard's statement continues.

"I haven't abated my defeat at Toledo. I was beaten fairly and squarely, but I was never tendered a return match. Many thought I was not in condition at Toledo. I wasn't, but that was my fault, and that is one of the reasons I want another chance at Dempsey. I can beat him if properly conditioned and the only way I would meet him would be with the understanding that I have four months in which to train."

LONDON.—In the third round of the Buckingham lawn tennis championship, Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory defeated Mrs. O'Neill, 6-0, 6-1.

Home Runners at It. NEW YORK, June 15.—Even though Babe Ruth isn't setting the home run pace this season, due to his belated start, the major leagues promise to pass the one thousand mark for their collective efforts if the present pace is maintained. The season is one-third gone, but 344 circuit clouts have been registered—155 in the National and 189 in the American—and opportunity to eclipse last year's mark of 936 seem bright.

The giants registered five home runs yesterday and a total of 18 hits in swamping Pittsburgh 13 to 0, and increased their lead to five full games over the Pirates. Snyder got two and Irish Meusel walked out his seventh. "Shufflin' Pig" Douglas easily held his rivals in check.

Harry Hellmann of the Tigers and Tillie Walker of the Athletics hung up their eleventh circuit blow. The Detroit slugger's hit aided him team to take the first game of the series from the Yankees 6 to 2, Sam Jones dropping his seventh straight start on the mound, but Walker, who also rapped out two other hits, couldn't stop his club's losing streak and the White Sox won, 8 to 5 with Faber pitching.

George Sisler's homer with the bases loaded featured a St. Louis rally that enabled the Browns to nose out Washington 7 to 6, and climb to within a game and a half of the Yankees.

The Braves experienced a sudden reversal in form after a brilliant winning streak and were victims of a Chicago slug fest, 15 to 2, with State starring at bat and in the field, while "Digger" Vance and a rearranged lineup, checked St. Louis, 4 to 0.

Coveleskie outpitched Collins and Cleveland blanked Boston, 3 to 0, but the victory cost the Indians the services of their hard-hitting second baseman, Stephenson, who sustained a smashed finger and will be out of the game for some time.
