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OFFICERS ELECTED IN DIAMOND LAKE IMPROVEMENT CO.

At the organization meeting of the Diamond Lake Improvement company held recently at the public library here the following officers were elected: President, J. A. Perry; vice president, C. A. Knight; secretary and treasurer, Fred E. Wahl; general manager, Geo. L. Howard. All of the above were elected directors together with P. B. Harrison, J. W. Wakefield and E. F. Robinson.

The Diamond Lake company is backed by the leading business men of Medford and Jackson county, about ninety in all having subscribed for \$23,000 of the capital stock, leaving \$2000 of the stock still unsold. The company is applying for a permit from the state corporation commissioner to sell the balance of the stock at this time, construction work on the Diamond Lake resort project having been commenced and the first truck load of material for boats and camp having gone out to Union creek last Monday.

The company has obtained A. D. Vandergriff to build the boats and as head carpenter on the construction work at the lake. He has operated a well known inn 17 miles out from Portland on the Columbia River highway and having leased the inn came back to Medford expecting to spend the summer in the upper Rogue river region camping, fishing and hunting. Upon his hearing of the Diamond Lake resort project just starting he decided to combine business with pleasure and hence will spend the summer at the lake. Mr. Vandergriff's daughter will accompany him. Mr. Jansen, associate of Mr. Vandergriff, and Paul Howard are now at Union creek, having taken the contract of making the shakes for the Diamond Lake buildings. The company will move their camp to Hamaker meadows or to the lake by June 25th.

The company expects to have the road open to Diamond lake and all necessary facilities to accommodate the influx of campers and tourists, by July 10th. There will be boats for rent, a gasoline station, a general store, meals will be served and tent houses will be for rent as sleeping quarters. Diamond lake and immediate surroundings are famed as one of the most beautiful and picturesque spots in Oregon, and the new resort being established there by Medford capital will doubtless draw a big patronage from this city and county, as well from all other parts of southern Oregon. Already many Medford people are planning to spend their summer vacations at Diamond lake.
