Y. M. C. A. CAMP TO START JULY 6TH, EXPENSES SLIGHT

Boys from different parts of the county are writing in to the Y. M. C. A. office and signifying their intention of going on the County Y. M. C. A. camp July 6 to 15. While there are many Medford and Ashland boys who will probably attend, there are also youngsters from Central Point, Phoenix, Talent, Griffin Creek, Oak Grove and other communities who expect to be on hand. By buying groceries and meats in quantity and depending upon the generosity of friends of the Y. M. C. A. with regard to cars, the expense of the ten-day outing will be kept down to the very low figure of five dollars per boy. This provides for every necessity in the way of expense outside of the bedding and personal belongings, a few dishes, etc.

At the Junior Y. M. C. A. club meeting in Talent last night, ten boys from that group said they were making plans to go. The leader, Lester Newbury, expressed his determination to bring the number up to the point where the Talent delegation would outstrip any other.

Letters from boys regarding camp have the true ring. One writes, "You can count on me being at camp, so bring enough grub." Another inquires, "Shall we bring something to swim in?" It is supposed he referred to the garb, whether a "store suit" or nature's own, so the reply did not unfeelingly suggest "the creek" as something sufficient "to swim in."

Another epistle has more thoughtful note, "I have often noticed that boys under your (the Y. M. C. A.'s) supervision do not use profane language, neither do they fight or quarrel—they have something good to do to occupy their minds and hands which will benefit them in the end." That's a recommendation worth while.

20,000 HOMELESS \$2,000,000 BLAZE

NEW YORK, June 16.—Firemen today were still playing water upon the smoldering ruins of what yesterday had been a half square mile of summer dwellings at Arverne, Long Island.

More than 400 buildings, from hotels and costly summer houses to little frame bungalows, were destroyed, rendering 20,000 persons temporarily homeless. The property damage is estimated at \$2,000,000.

The thousands of families spent the night on the beaches. The origin of the blaze is unknown.

De Mille Defends Filming of Novel

"On the stage it's truly said that the play's the thing," and on the screen it is equally true that "the story's the thing," asserts Cecil B. DeMille, Paramount producer. "It makes little difference to me where the story comes from. What concerns the producer is whether it be available for his purposes and whether it can adequately be presented by the cast he contemplates."

"Literature is still rich in story material, and it isn't likely that it will ever be entirely exhausted. To ignore the mine of fiction that lies ready at hand for transcription to the terms of the motion picture art is to proceed clumsily."

"On the other hand, to ignore present day writers and their ability properly to reflect current existence is to be equally idiotic."

De Mille's latest screen production is a work written expressly for the screen. Jeanie Macpherson is the author and transcribed her plot directly "in the terms of the motion picture art." It is called "Saturday Night" and will be given its first showing at the Page theater tomorrow matinee.

The imaginative and creative genius of Miss Macpherson is said to be delightfully, dramatically and at times humorously revealed in this stirring story of the two extremes of modern life—the upper and the lower crust.

Last Showing Tomorrow

MAY REDUCE RATE S. F. RESERVE B'K.

LONDON, June 15.—(By the Associated Press)—The bank of England today lowered its discount rate to 3½ per cent, a reduction of one-half per cent from the figure established on May 1, last.

Its action is believed to have been due to a desire to bring the rate more in line with the short loan market, which recently has had large funds unemployed at from 1 to 2 per cent, while the bank stood at 4 per cent. Another reason given for the change is that the authorities wish to assist the new Indian loan of 12,500,000 pounds which is being floated today.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The federal reserve bank of San Francisco has asked the federal reserve board for its attitude upon a possible reduction by the California bank's rediscount rate from 4½ to 4 per cent, it was said today at the treasury.

PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM YAKIMA JAIL

YAKIMA, Wash., June 14.—Three prisoners at the city jail, George Sherman, John Stamleis and Elmer Fullbright, escaped last night when the latter worked some floor boards loose and evacuated an exit under the jail. Prisoners who did not escape talked freely of the affair this morning and said that the first time Fullbright tried to get out he was stuck in the hole, which proved too small for his unusual size, and had to be pulled back until it was enlarged.

MARSHFIELD HAS A \$50,000 FIRE

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 15.—Losses estimated at \$50,000 were caused by a fire which destroyed an apartment house, a garage and for a time threatened an entire block here early today. Many occupants of nearby homes and apartments were driven out in their night clothes. Half of the loss was covered by insurance, according to statements of owners.

WASHINGTON U CREW ARRIVES POUGHKEEPSIE

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 15.—The rowing squad of the University of Washington has joined other collegians practicing here for the regatta June 26.

Washington arranged to have its first row on the Hudson this afternoon.

Coach Ed Leader is seeking the loan of a four-oared boat from Columbia, as he brought east only an eight-oared shell and wishes to put the substitutes through daily work outs.

ROTARIANS PAY IMPROMPTU VISIT ON MEDFORDITES

While the American Legion boys were staging a frontier days dance at the Natatorium last evening, a rival entertainment was enjoyed by a large crowd at the intersection of Main street and the S. P. tracks.

The special train carrying the New England contingent returning from the Rotarian convention in California developed engine trouble and was delayed in this city for something over an hour. The passengers were soon out on the street determined to get the most fun out of the situation possible. After doing the zig-zag, crack-the-whip and follow-the-leader up and down the platform, they suddenly made a dive for the Rex cafe where the piano was put into commission and as many of the bunch as could, crowded onto the floor in an attempt to dance between the tables. Some one sent the police department after Mayor Gates. His honor could not be found, but George Trechler and Ben Sheldon, directors of the Chamber of Commerce, were pressed into service and made to do the honors for the town.

Joe Chappell, editor of the National Magazine, speaking for the visitors, entertained the crowd with a most delightful talk, mingling real eloquence, with a few asides respecting California's "unusual" climate, the good judgment of the engine men in having the locomotive break down at such a delightful town, and the excellent service being rendered by their "irrigation committee" in car four.

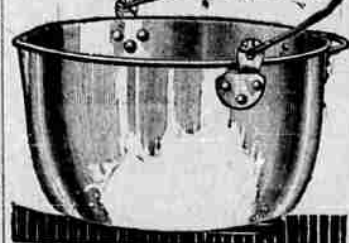
