With Medford trade is Medford made

DAYS OF '49 AND
PIONEER PARADE
PROVE A SCREAM

The big spectacular event of the Prosperity Week celebration, the "Days of '49," staged by the American Legion post, drew one of the largest crowds last evening ever assembled in Medford, to witness the pioneer parade. Immediately after the parade, everyone went to the Natatorium to participate in the Western dance hall fun, which lasted until 1:30 o'clock this morning, and then only ceased because the refreshment and other supplies were entirely sold out.

It was a great night enjoyed by both old and young, punctuated during the parade and in the dance hall by myriads of gun shots. Most all the many hundreds of folks who visited that huge den of iniquity were liquored up with near beer and other soft drinks, limbered up on the dance floor, gambled to their hearts' content for paper money, ate hot dogs galore and almost blew up every time revolver shots were fired in the frequent bar room brawls.

When the parade started shortly after 8 p. m., Main street and the ends of the cross streets were crowded with peopled automobiles and with people standing on the sidewalks and street sides from Washington school almost all the way to the Natatorium. The parade was a cleverly arranged affair to bring out recollections of pioneer days in this locality. All the participants, mostly legion men, were in pioneer day costume. Even the D. O. K. K. band was garbed that way.

There were armed Indians, cow boys, miners and prospectors with pack outfits, prairie schooners drawn by oxen, trappers, Indian fighters, gamblers, sky pilots, and even a caged live bear. And all during the procession the paraders kept up a firing of rifles, shot guns and revolvers.

The fun started at the Nat immediately after the parade and the people began flowing into the large auditorium, in which cleverness was again displayed by the Legion men in transforming it into a representation of a western dance hall and saloon of frontier days. Along the south and west walls of the hall were located the bar and the faro, roulette, poker and other gambling games, which were kept busy from start to finish, as well as other taking-a-chance features.

The play was for paper money only. No one could spend a cent or gamble for actual cash, but paper money of large denominations could be purchased at the "Bank of Jacksonville" which was located at the northwest corner of the hall.

The entire proceeds were for the benefit of the American Legion post, and so well was the bank patronized, that the post cleared in the neighborhood of \$500, which wiped out all its debts and left a little surplus.

The scene was a picturesque one with men and women in pioneer costumes, wearing guns at their hips, mixing on the dance floor and everywhere else with the men and women garbed in the latest fashions. The orchestra, Launspach's nine pieces, including the traditional frontier day fiddler, was stationed on a raised platform.

The ladies of the auxiliary of the legion post, dressed in pioneer and old-time dance hall style, acted as bar maids and dance hall girls, and tended to the sale of other refreshments.

The program was given as advertised with the exception that the "Trained Spook Hounds" did not appear, but for a very good reason. The auxiliary, after selling about a thousand wieners and sandwiches early ran out of hot dogs, so there was nothing for the ladies to do but kill and boil the spook hounds and replenish the supply.

The exhibition given by Alice Teddy the big trained bear, was much enjoyed by the large assemblage. Her trainer has toured the world with this educated bruin lady, and now has a homestead on which he lives in the Green Springs mountain country. Teddy Alice performed many clever stunts and created much laughter by her roller skating and wrestling.

A sign in the southwest corner of the hall read "Relics of Jacksonville," but the corner was bare, and the people then quickly realized that these relics were the gambling games in full blast along the west side of the hall, presided over by some of the toughest mugs ever seen in Jackson county.

NEW LEADERS TO
ATTEMPT PEACE
AT THE HAGUE

THE HAGUE, June 16.—(By the Associated Press)—The conference on Russian affairs, in the absence of the domination of political figures who guided the courses of the international gatherings at Genoa and Washington, seems destined to bring into the limelight another and younger group of leaders as representing the great powers.

They include Sir Philip Lloyd-Graeme of England; M. Benoist, France; Baron Azevango, Italy; M. Sato, Japan; M. Cattier, Belgium and M. Van Karnebeck, Holland and already they have begun their efforts to shape the course of the conference.

At their initial private meeting last night they decided upon the scheme of a main Russia commission, with three sub-commissions, which would give detailed study to the technical questions of credits, debts and treatment of private property owned by foreigners in Russia, which must later be negotiated with the Russians. The details of this project were to be submitted to today's session of the conference.

Each sub-commission will consist of 11 members, including one each from the inviting powers, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan, together with Holland. The remaining places on each sub-commission will be filled in accordance with the interests of the various other countries in the questions with which these bodies will deal.

There were indications that the smaller powers, as had been the case at other conferences, were dissatisfied with what they regarded as the monopolization of authority by the larger powers.

NO FAVORS FOR
RICH DEFENDANT

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 16.—Walter S. Ward pleaded not guilty today when he was arraigned before Supreme Court Justice Morschauer on an indictment charging first degree murder in connection with the shooting of Clarence Peters.

When counsel for the wealthy banker's son requested that he be placed on trial immediately, he was informed by the court that his case would have to take the same course as that of any other prisoners.

"There are a number of men in jail here who want to be tried," said Justice Morschauer. "Why your man should be preferred, I cannot tell."
