WALTER MILLER TO WRESTLE R. HAND ASHLAND IN JULY

ASHLAND, June 16.—A leading athletic event will be added to the Fourth of July celebration schedule, referring to a wrestling match between Ralph Hand, of Gold Hill, well known in local sporting circles, and Walt Miller, of Los Angeles, professional champion in middleweight records. Some folks who regard a boxing bout as a slugging contest not far removed from the prize ring, have no compunctions in witnessing a skillful wrestling match, hence none need fear that this athletic test will be banned from the regular program. The talk by Mayor Gates which should have been entitled, "Train the child in the way it should go and it will hardly depart from it," was very good indeed.

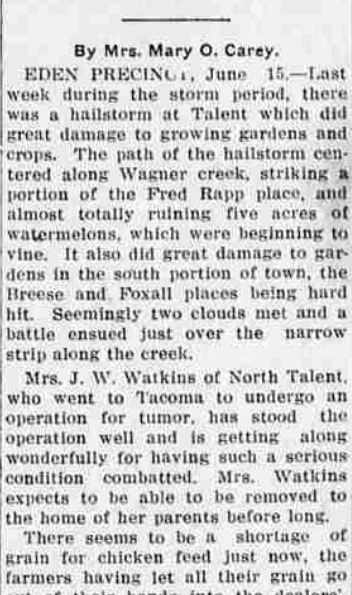
Mrs. Colver Furry has gone to Portland for a month, during which she will study. Mrs. Furry will teach in the Fern valley district this winter.
