Sports 3 BOUTS MONTH FOR LEONARD TO NET \$250,000

NEW YORK, June 16.—A new fighting record is about to be hung up to dry by Benny Leonard, prince of the royal family of pugilism, who began today to dust off his armor like a plumed knight in preparation for bouts with three of the toughest opponents in the business within the short space of 32 days.

Jack Britton, world's welterweight champion, Lew Tendler of Philadelphia and Rocky Kansas of Buffalo, will meet him.

Three bouts within a month will net Benny at least a quarter of a million dollars, and if he knocks out Britton he will step out of the ring the welterweight champion of the world, the fourth fighting man since Napoleon to hold two championships. As Britton will not be down to 135 pounds, Leonard's lightweight coronet will not be in danger.

Leonard's summer season will open June 26 at the New York velodrome with Britton in a 15 round decision bout. Eight days later he will meet Rocky Kansas at Michigan City, Indiana, in an independence day battle for his crown, and on July 27, he will battle for the world's championship in Jersey City with Tendler, recognized as the most formidable of contenders.

LONDON, June 15.—(By the Associated Press)—Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory, the American lawn tennis woman champion, was defeated in the semi-finals of the Kent tennis championship in woman's singles at Beckenham today by Miss McKane, the British star, 6-1, 2-6, 6-3.

Giants Climb Higher.
NEW YORK, June 15.—Bill Ryan, youngster from Holy Cross, won his game yesterday from elderly "Babe" Adams and the Giants climbed higher in their ascent to the National League gonfalon, while the Yankee contingent, with their 1921 ace, Mays, fell before Cobb's outfit in Detroit and slipped to within a half game of the St. Louis Browns, who took a 3 to 2 game from the Washington Senators.

Incidentally George Sieler got his 101st hit of the year and jumped his batting average to .433.

"Duster" Mails went well for a while against the Red Sox, then weakened, the Sox defeating Cleveland 8 to 3.

The Athletics found two White Sox hurriers for 15 hits, won 19 to 8 and broke the Chicagoans winning streak of six games.

Cincinnati, baffled by George Smith's slants, lost to the Phillies, 7 to 0. The Cardinals loaded with their bats until the eighth inning of their game with Brooklyn. Then they started a rally that ended in a tenth inning victory, 4 to 3. Stock tied the score in the 9th, connecting for a homer with a man on base, and Hornsby's double in the tenth carried across the winning tally.

Shocker Put Out.
ST. LOUIS, June 16.—With only one-half game separating the St. Louis Browns from first place in the American league, the team's best pitcher, Urban Shocker, expects to be out of the game for the next ten days due to a broken blood vessel in his right leg. Shocker has been ordered by the club's physician to rest until the Browns start on their second eastern invasion of the season.

Shocker sustained the injury to his leg while the Browns were playing at Chicago in the last series of their recent road trip.

NEW YORK, June 16.—Guglielmo Marconi, Italian radio wizard, has failed to pick up any message from Mars in his trip across the Atlantic on his floating laboratory, the yacht Elettra.

Replying today to a radiogram sent by the Associated Press asking for a statement on the results of his experiment, Mr. Marconi said:

"Have no sensational announcement to make."
He added that he was arriving in New York tomorrow.
