## WOULD BAR ALL SHIPS WITH BARS

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A bill denying entrance to American ports of any ship, foreign or domestic, on which liquor is sold, was introduced today by Representative Edmonds, Pennsylvania, ranking republican of the merchant marine committee.

ST. LOUIS, June 17.—Adolphus Busch III, local brewer, was praised for his stand regarding enforcement of prohibition on shipping board vessels, and Chairman Lasker of the shipping board was denounced for allowing the sale of intoxicants on the ships of the shipping board outside the three mile zone, in a statement to the Associated Press by Dr. Wilbur F. Crafts of Washington, D. C., superintendent of the International Reform bureau.
