

BOXING SMOKER AT YREKA PARK NIGHT JULY 30

Romeo Hagen of Seattle will meet Kid Meadows of Medford in the main event and a real mix is looked for. Hagen is as tough as they make 'em and the Medford boy is no slouch at the game.

Joe Blackburn of Medford and Young Felix of Weed will tangle for four rounds. Both of these boys are pretty clever with the gloves and Felix is as big a favorite with the Weed fans as Blackburn is here. It is understood that Joe will have to use his hands if he doesn't want his face to stop 'em.

Chet Brown and "Dummy" Poole will stage twelve minutes of fast leather pushing. Brown is a Medford boy, while Poole is from Weed. Poole won a decision over Brown at Weed Wednesday night and rivalry between the two is heated. This should make the next match a good battle, and Manager Dixon says that the last one should have been a draw. In fact, this match on the Yreka card promises to be a go-getter.

The program will be completed by two good preliminaries. Tickets are on sale in Medford, Ashland and Weed.

ST. LOUIS BROWNS IN FIRST PLACE

NEW YORK, June 17.—Ousted unceremoniously from the lead they have held since the early days of the American league race, the Yankees today were in second place, trailing the speedy Browns. St. Louis had a margin of a half game at the top as a result of their crushing defeat of Washington, 15 to 2, while Detroit greeted Hoyt with a fusillade of hits and humbled the Yanks 9 to 4 for the third straight time.

The Tigers incidentally strengthened their hold on third place, as Cleveland dropped another to Boston, 8 to 6 and at least were within hailing distance of the leading two clubs.

The Giants increased their lead to six and a half games as they put Pittsburgh to rout again, 7 to 1, while Burleigh Grimes held St. Louis in check and the Dodgers rang up a 12 to 2 victory. These results left only a game difference in the standing of the three clubs battling for second place.

Hornsby of the Cardinals kept within one of his American league rival Williams, by hitting his fifteenth homer.

Jimmy Ring pitched hitless ball for seven innings after relieving Meadows, and the Phillies trimmed Cincinnati again 7 to 2.

Chicago's ninth inning rally handed the Athletics another setback 9 to 8, while Grimes' home run drive in the twelfth gave the Cubs a 7 to 6 victory over the Braves.

SHIP LISTS, SCORE OF MEN TRAPPED

HAMBURG, June 17.—(By Associated Press.) More than a score of men were entrapped in the hold of the Brazilian liner Avare when she capsized today while being hauled out of drydock at the Vulcan shipyards here. Openings were being forced into the hold in order to save the men while the liner lay submerged for two-thirds of her extent in the bottom of the canal.

It is believed about 30 men, members of the Brazilian crew of the liner and shipyard workers, were caught within the vessel. Others on deck jumped overboard when the ship, for some unknown reason, began to list heavily. They were saved by motorboats and the harbor fire department which immediately began operations to liberate the entrapped men.

JAPAN WILL RATIFY U. S. AGREEMENT SOON

TOKIO, June 17.—(By Associated Press.) The privy council is expected to ratify within a few weeks the agreement reached at the Washington arms conference. Following her usual policy, Japan is unlikely to precede Great Britain in acting on the international accords.

The well informed however, say there is nothing to justify the fear that Japan may wait upon France, hoping qualifications or reservations according to the attitude displayed by France.

GEORGE SISLER IS BASEBALL WONDER MAN THIS YEAR

CHICAGO, June 17.—(By Associated Press.) Writing baseball this season has developed almost exclusively into writing about George Sisler, for the incomparable first sacker of the St. Louis Browns is playing such brilliant baseball that he leads in almost every branch of the sport.

Major league averages revealed today show that Sisler is first in batting averages, runs scored, total hits, total bases, three base hits and stolen bases in either league; is first in either league to make 100 hits this season, and is close to the top in two baggers and home runs in the American league.

Sisler went on a batting streak last week that brought his average to .423 against .419 the previous week. Sisler's stolen bases number 23, with Ken Williams, his team mate, second in the American league with twenty-one. The averages include games of Wednesday.

Bing Miller of Philadelphia is runner-up to Sisler on the American league averages with a mark of .376.

Ken Williams brought his home run mark to sixteen and leads Miller by three and Rogers Hornsby, the National league pace setter, by one. Other leading batters of the American league for 35 or more games: Cobb, Detroit .375; Speaker, Cleveland .369; O'Neill, Cleveland .367; Schang, New York .355; Hellmann, Detroit .351; Blue, Detroit .349; Bassler, Detroit .339.

Rogers Hornsby, the St. Louis star is the whole show in the National league battle of figures this week. Hornsby, by slamming out 14 hits in his last six games, batted his way from fourth place to the top of the heap with an average of .399, with Hank Gowdy of Boston, the leader a week ago, and B. Griffith of Brooklyn tied for second place with .385.

The St. Louis slugger, besides leading the league in batting, is tied with Young of New York and Carey of Pittsburgh for honors in base stealing, with eleven apiece. Hornsby is setting the pace for the home run hitters with 15. His closest rivals are Seak Wheat of Brooklyn and Eddie Ainsmith also of St. Louis, who have knocked out eight apiece.

Dempsey to Be Busy

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion pugilist was speeding east today with the intention of launching what he declared would be one of the busiest fall campaigns ever participated in by a heavyweight titleholder. Jess Willard, ex-champion, Bill Brennan and Harry Greb, a trio of leather pushers considered as likely opponents for Dempsey, will probably have the opportunity to meet the champion this fall, Kearns said.

The proposed match with Bill Brennan in Michigan next Labor day has been practically closed, Kearns said, although there was a possibility that Jess Willard might be substituted for Brennan. If the match with Brennan goes through according to present plans and Brennan is defeated, then Kearns will try to match Willard and Dempsey for a bout in New York, Jersey City or Montreal the latter part of September. A few days later Kearns stated, Dempsey would be billing to meet Greb in a six round bout in Philadelphia.

Referring to recent statements of Willard to the effect that Dempsey and Kearns were trying to evade a return match, with the former titleholder as "Bunk" Kearns declared he was ready to agree to a bout with Willard on a percentage basis, the same ratio to be in effect as that at the Toledo fight in which Dempsey stopped the big Kansan and won the heavyweight belt.

Willard, when told of Kearns' plan, avowed Kearns was "making unreasonable demands" on Tex Rickard so he will have a reason for not being signed up.

STRIKING MINERS SURRENDER GUNS

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 17.—More than 100 guns were surrendered late last night by striking miners at Scofield, scene of the first outbreak several weeks ago. Today miners at Spring Canyon will be relieved of their firearms. Quiet prevails in all the coal mining camps in Carbon county.

Extra deputy sheriffs have been reduced to two for each mine.

MINNESOTA'S NEW PRIMARY LAW IS CAUSING INTEREST

ST. PAUL, Minnesota.—Minnesota's electorate will nominate party candidates for congressional and state offices in the state wide primary election, June 19, after one of the mildest campaigns in recent years.

While interest in the primary was materially lessened by the workings of the new party convention law, under which state conventions of each of the major parties endorsed candidates for the various offices, subject to the primary, yet the appearance of a number of women's names on the ballot is causing much speculation as to the result.

Candidates endorsed by the party conventions go on the primary ballot with this fact stated after their names, while others filing for the same offices are entered as "independent" candidates for the nominations they seek.

Three parties have filed candidates for the primary: Republican, democratic and farmer-labor, the last named including factions allied with the National Nonpartisan league, which in previous campaigns has sought to capture the republican nominations.

While in some cases independents have filed for nominations in opposition to convention endorsed candidates, only on one office—the United States senatorial Democratic nomination—is a close fight looked for generally.

Mrs. Anna Dickie Olesen of Cloquet, endorsed by the democratic state convention for the senatorial nomination, has the opposition of two "independents," Homer Morris of Minneapolis and Thomas J. Meighen of Preston. Party leaders believe the real contest lies between Mrs. Olesen and Mr. Meighen.

Mrs. Olesen, presented with a small sedan automobile by friends in Minneapolis, is making an energetic campaign which will continue up to primary election day, she declares. She drives from town to town, filing her speaking engagements.

WOMAN CONGRESSMAN ARRIVES PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—Miss Alice M. Robertson, representative in congress from Oklahoma, arrived here today as guest of honor for the annual rose festival, which opens here next Tuesday. She came as representative of President Harding, who had been invited but who could not come. She will speak at a mass meeting of Oregon women next Wednesday.

EVANSTON, Ill., June 17.—A large majority of business men "now conduct their affairs in accordance with the avowed belief that right is superior to might; that morality is on a par with legality, and that the observance of both is essential to worthy achievement." T. P. O'CONNOR PROTESTS SLAYING CHRISTIANS

LONDON, June 17.—(By the Associated Press)—T. P. O'Connor appealed to Premier Lloyd George in the house of commons this afternoon to use his influence with Premier Poincare of France to stop Turkish massacres of Christians in Asia Minor, citing the recent affirmation by the Greek patriarch of Constantinople that 1300 women and children were murdered near Kavaka two weeks ago.

Mr. Lloyd George replied: "I am afraid I can hardly take the responsibility of adding to the burdens of Premier Poincare when he visits London, but I am quite sure all these facts are just as much alive to his mind as to the British government. His attention has undoubtedly been called to them."

MINNESOTA PRIMARY CAMPAIGN CLOSED

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 17.—Minnesota voters today saw the final campaign flourishes of the candidates in the state wide primary election held Monday, when United States senatorial, congressional, state and county candidates will be nominated.

Mrs. Anna Dickie Olesen, seeking the democratic nomination for United States senator, is opposed by two men—Thomas J. Meighen and Homer Morris.

Congressman A. J. Volstead in the seventh district, author of the prohibition enforcement act, is unopposed in the primary for re-nomination on the republican ticket.
