

CANNED FRUIT IS WANTED FOR J. COUNTY FAIR

"Jackson county is going to have a county fair this year and success of the woman's department of the fair depends upon the women of the county," says a bulletin to the women of the farm bureau recently sent out by Miss Florence Pool, county home demonstration agent. "Last year the 'canned' fruits, vegetables, fish and meats prepared by the women of Jackson county helped to win first place for the county at the state fair. The plan this year is to select our canned exhibit for the state fair from the county fair exhibit. I know that you are interested in Jackson county making a good showing at Salem this year. Therefore, I am writing the women over the county through the various clubs to help out in the county fair and also the exhibit to be sent to the state fair.

"We want uniform cans for the state fair exhibit, so we have selected any type of glass top jar in pint or quart sizes. Would like the jelly, jam and preserves in 3 1/2-inch high clear jelly glasses. We want canned berries of all kinds, strawberry, raspberry, blackberry, huckleberry, loganberry, other canned fruits, vegetables, fish and meats of all kinds. Want them labeled with name of variety on bottom of jar.

"Will you plan as a club and also as individuals to take some part in the women's exhibit for the county fair? This not only includes the canned exhibit, but the textiles, art, etc. Plan to exhibit something in the canned exhibit that can be used in the Jackson county state fair exhibit."

NATIONAL PARK TO PARK ASS'N. SELECTS PORTLAND

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 17.—With the election of directors for the various states through which the highway passes, the National Park-to-Park highway association today reached the conclusion of its third annual convention which has been in session here for the past two days.

The directors elected this morning included:

California, A. L. Connard, Red Bluff; Oregon, Sydney B. Vincent, Portland; Washington, William Davis, Newport.

The new board will meet this afternoon to elect officers and map out a program of activity for the organization for the coming year. The most important matter to come before the board is the discussion of a plan submitted by S. P. Owens of Los Angeles for the reorganization of the association on a nation-wide basis.

In line with its policy of holding the annual conventions in the larger cities along to park to park highways, the convention selected Portland, Oregon for the meeting place in 1923.

It was adopted as a policy that after meeting in the larger cities for a few years, the convention would hold its annual gatherings in the national parks.

MONKEY GLANDS, ELIXIR OF YOUTH, ANCIENT THEORY

CHICAGO, June.—(By the Associated Press)—The restoration of youth to the aged, attempted recently by means of animal glands, was also attempted at least 3000 years ago, according to Dr. James H. Breasted of the University of Chicago. An "Incantation of Transferring an Old Man into a Youth of Twenty" is set forth in the Edwin Smith papyrus, the Egyptian document which Dr. Breasted has declared contains unparalleled evidence of advanced knowledge and scientific spirit on the part of Egyptian physicians of 1800 B. C., or earlier. The incantation, on the contrary, he said, is characterized by reliance on hocus-pocus. Dr. Breasted's theory is that an extraordinary break on surgery and external medicine fell into the hands of a quack who was more interested in charms for making old men young, and who had the incongruous texts combined in the same roll. Thus, in the papyrus magical formulae jostle an exposition of delicate surgical operations heretofore believed to be decidedly modern.

The handwriting indicates that it was probably written about 1800 B. C., and it is thought to be a copy of a manuscript that is at least a thousand years older. The original may have been written as early as 3400 B. C., it is thought by some of the words which appear in the manuscript and which were long out of vogue in 1800 B. C.

BREAK AIR RECORD SALT LAKE TO S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—A record for the airplane time between Salt Lake City and San Francisco was made by the United States air mail service today when three flyers working in relays negotiated the distance in six hours, 12 minutes. The record announcement was made by the air mail service after all past records had been considered.

Pilot H. B. Levis, who started the trip, jumped off at Salt Lake at 4:15 a. m. He negotiated the jump to Elko, Nevada, in one hour, 34 minutes. Pilot William F. Blanchard made the next relay to Reno in two hours and 18 minutes. The last relay from Reno to San Francisco was made by Pilot Harry V. Huking, who made the trip in two hours flat, arriving here at 10:32 a. m.

The trip was planned for the purpose of breaking the record.

Bank Reserve Increases.
NEW YORK, June 17.—The actual condition of the clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows that they held \$63,931,060 in excess of legal requirements. This is an increase of \$42,422,460 from last week.

not invariably produced perfect results, but, upon the whole, it has demonstrated its superiority to every experimental substitute that has been offered and the fact must not be overlooked that this great industrial republic has rewarded labor with its largest degree of liberty, prosperity and happiness. It is well not to hold its minor imperfections so close to the eye as to obscure its benefits."

The minority report to which today's reply was made, was signed by Arthur C. Wharton and Albert Phillips. The third labor member of the board, W. L. McMenimen, was in the east on an investigation trip when the minority report was issued.
