WHAT A LIFE
(Chicago Tribune)

That insect of astonishing life, the seventeen year cicada, is now in the trees. The males are making a sound which suggests a far away Niagara, a wind riding the forest at a distance and threatening to sweep down upon the hearer, something menacing and unknown beyond the vision.

The harvest fly, a two year cicada, comes later in the summer. There are two broods and so one every year. It has a defined sound which can be traced to a place and a cause, a song, so called, which is fascinating or irritating. The rush of winds which the seventeen year brood imitates is overhead but also far away, something which seemingly must swell, approach, and burst in fury.

Under the trees are the holes out of which the grub came. The skin which it wore when it emerged can be found on the ground or still clinging to boards or wire mesh where it slit to allow the cicada to take to the air and live its second and breed.

The female is silent. The male is the wind in the oak tops. He dies in a short while, eating nothing while he lives, and the ground soon is covered with the dead. The female lives several weeks. She has sawlike ovipositors, and with them makes a gash in a twig, lays the eggs from 400 to 600, in about forty-five minutes.

In about six weeks the larvae drop to the ground and burrow. They may go down to a depth of even twenty feet, attaching themselves to roots and undergoing changes in the period of over sixteen years in which they are preparing to emerge for the few weeks which produces another brood.

Thus the cicada is the longest lived of any known insect, but that long existence is all preparation for one whirl in the sun, alarming folk who think to see their harvests and their forests disappear as a horde of deviators sweeps down from the hill tops which are thundering with a host.

It does no substantial damage, possibly marring trees superficially where the twigs are gnashed for the egg laying, but it affects popular imagination and it should. In its preparatory existence the cicada, as larva and as pupa, has durability, indomitability, and a purpose which conquers. Its descent into the ground and its emergence from it is an achievement which belittles the return of Ulysses to Ithaca from Troy. The moment the pupa skin is split and left attached to the side of the house, to a screen or bit of netting, durability changes to ephemerality. There were years of darkness in the depths of the earth. There is a moment of sun and song and a brood is gone from the sunlight and another is dropping to dig its way into the ground.

UNDER COURT ORDER

McClintic in the district United States court, on behalf of the Anchor Coal company and 69 mining companies, against the United Mine Workers of America, district 17, as well as "any who would aid and abet the union men" in trying to prevent open shop workmen from going into the mines.

MEX. PETROLEUM IN
SENSATIONAL RISE

NEW YORK, June 20.—Any misgivings which may have been entertained as to the effect on the general list of the extraordinary movement in Mexican petroleum apparently vanished in the early afternoon, when high grade investment stocks shared in the further substantial rise. Mexican petroleum amounted to 17 1/2, compared with 169, yesterday's closing and Thursday's lowest of 132 1/2. Independent steels, motors, coppers, equipments and dividend-paying railroad shares were in the forefront of the upward movement. Studebaker reached 125 1/2, a rise of 5 1/2 points, while gains elsewhere of 1 to 5 points were numerous.
