

SPROULE DEPLORES EXTRA COST FROM RAILROAD DIVORCE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—The separation of the Southern Pacific and the Central Pacific railroad systems under a recent anti-trust decision of the United States supreme court "would be a mere makeshift," William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific company, said today in commenting on the situation.

The expressed fear of the Union Pacific that the Central Pacific would fall into unfriendly hands and that the good relations of the Union and Southern Pacific systems would be jeopardized through the necessity of the latter to affiliate with the Rock Island or some other line was also answered by Mr. Sproule with the statement that his company desires nothing more than a maintenance of the present mergers and relations.

"The Southern Pacific has not sought and is not seeking ownership of other lines," he said.

The Southern and Central Pacific systems have so fused into one system that the name Central Pacific has been virtually lost sight of, Mr. Sproule said. In the event of a separation, the Central Pacific would have to connect up its separate lines and re-arrange its terminals in order to continue profitable operation and the Southern Pacific would have to do the same.

Both would involve expenditures from which the public would derive no benefits, he said, and after it was all over there would have been no betterment of the service. The train runs would become "misfits" and as the separation would be without relations to present division and train arrangements, there would be the likelihood of great and costly confusion.

WHEAT PRICES IN CHICAGO SHIFT

CHICAGO, June 20.—Wheat scored a moderate upturn in price today during the early dealings, an unexpected advance in Liverpool quotations acting as the chief stimulus. A rally in sterling exchange also was a bullish factor and there was talk that some overnight export business had been done. The opening, which varied from unchanged figures to 1/2 higher, July \$1.10 1/2 to \$1.10 1/2 and September \$1.10 1/2 to \$1.11 1/2 was followed by gains all around.

Corn and oats were firmer with wheat. After opening unchanged to 1/4 higher, July 61 1/2 to 61 1/2, the corn market made a moderate general advance.

Oats started at 1-8 off to a like upturn, July 34 1/2 and then went higher for all deliveries.

Provisions responded to higher quotations on hogs.

LLOYD GEORGE AND POINCARÉ DISCUSS EUROPEAN ISSUES

LONDON, June 19.—(By Associated Press.) Raymond Poincaré, the French premier, had a three hours conference today with David Lloyd-George, British prime minister. The statesmen discussed German reparations, the Hague conference, the Tanager situation and Greco-Turkish relations.

With regard to reparations, it was decided that the reparations commission should investigate the road conditions of German finances and endeavor to determine whether, with the assistance of a foreign loan, Germany could balance her budget or otherwise establish her currency.

With regard to the Hague conference there was an agreement on the basis that any decisions of the conference should be a referendum, and that the experts could make their recommendations and the respective governments then would be free to take whatever action that they please.

With regard to the near eastern question, it was agreed that the British and French governments should expedite the appointment of commissions proposed by Great Britain to investigate statements by American eye witnesses of massacres of Greeks and counter charges by the Greeks and Turks, of wholesale killings in the war areas.

NORTHERN BAPTISTS CLOSE CONVENTION

INDIANAPOLIS, June 20.—Final business sessions of the 15th annual convention of the northern Baptist convention were held today prior to the adjournment this afternoon or tonight. Seattle, Washington, is to be the 1923 meeting place of the convention.

Resolutions favoring the repeal in certain states of the legislation which prevents the reading of the bible in public schools, advocating child welfare legislation, condemning lynching and mob violence, and supporting strict enforcement of the Volstead law, were adopted at last night's session.

DRY OFFICER'S RAID ENDS IN KILLING

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., June 20.—In a gun battle with officers searching his home for liquor at Pomona near here, John Telarica was shot and killed by Sheriff Frank Dueray, and W. H. Trimble, prohibition officer, was wounded twice.

GIANTS AND YANKS SLIPPING IN BOTH BIG BRUSH RACES

CHICAGO, June 20.—(By Associated Press.) Big Phil Douglas was not right yesterday, and the St. Louis Cardinals hit him hard in the early innings of the game and defeated the New York Giants 5 to 4, making it two in a row for the world's champions.

The Chicago Cubs lost a tough game yesterday. After leading the Phillies all the way and putting over two more runs in the ninth for what appeared to be enough to win, the Phillies staged a rally, which included a home run by Planch Hitter Peters, making the final score 8 to 6. Two men were on the paths when Peters made his smash and both scored ahead of him.

Brooklyn and Pittsburgh battled 14 innings yesterday before the Dodgers put over the winning tally. They rallied in the ninth and tied the count at five all, and won out 6 to 5.

The Detroit Tigers continued their bombardment and yesterday won their seventh consecutive game by handling Boston a 11 to 9 beating.

Trailing the leading St. Louis Browns by two and a half games today as a result of their eighth straight defeat, the skidding Yankees faced a battle to retain even second place against the rush of Ty Cobb's hard hitting Detroit club. The Tigers, by winning their seventh in a row, were within two games of the New Yorkers.

The Browns increased their lead by nosing out the Athletics 3 to 2, McManus driving in the winning run in the seventh, after a duel between Klop and Helmach.
