The Union Pacific representative, H. E. Lounsbury, will address the members of the Medford chamber of commerce tomorrow noon and present their side of the question. The Southern Pacific will be invited to have a representative appear before the members forum at a later date to argue their side and in order to get the attitude of the members of the Medford chamber of commerce, it may become necessary that a referendum be taken, therefore it should be well for all to attend and get first hand information on the question involved.

The forum as usual will be held at the Medford hotel at the noon hour.

GIRL SLAYER GIVEN LIFE, HARD LABOR

JACKSON, Mich., June 20.—George Straub, confessed slayer of Alice Mallett, pleaded guilty to first degree murder in the Jackson county circuit court this morning and was immediately sentenced to solitary confinement at hard labor for life in Marquette prison.

Miss Mallett, who was matron at a girl's home was murdered about ten days ago, having apparently been attacked with an axe. Her head was crushed and her body mutilated in a night attack as she was enroute to her home. Her parents live in Ontario, Oregon.

O. K. GIVEN TO JAPAN CROWN PRINCE TO WED

TOKIO, June 20.—(By Associated Press). Imperial proclamation has sanctioned the forthcoming marriage of Crown Prince Hirohito, regent to the throne of Japan, and the Princess Nagako.

The prince regent is 21 years old, and was called to the duties of the throne in the prolonged illness of his father, Emperor Yoshihito. Princess Nagako comes from the ancient house of Kuni-No-Miya.

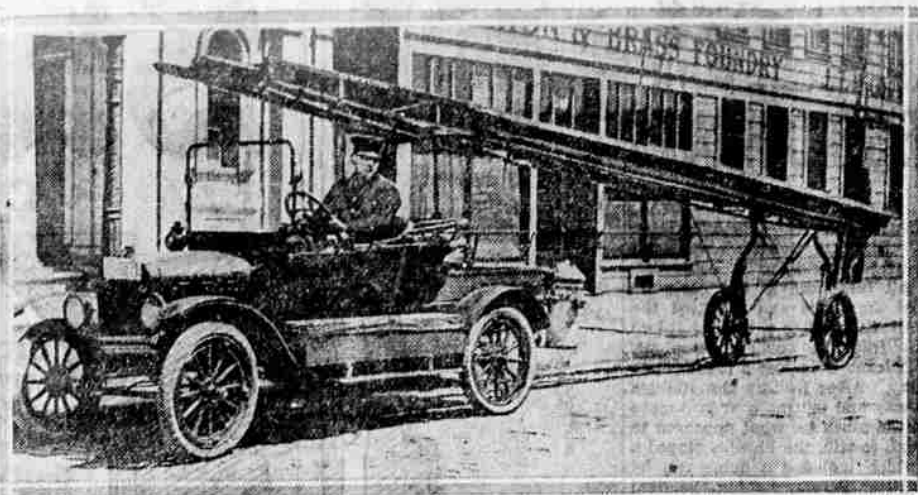

EGYPT'S CHIEF INDUSTRY MFG. OF ANTIQUES

LONDON, June.—The manufacture of antiquities is carried forward on such an extensive scale in Egypt, particularly at Cairo that it now has a place in reports on the industries of the country," says Professor Flinders Petrie, the famous Egyptian archaeologist in an interview in the Daily Chronicle.

The forgeries of Egyptian antiquities are often so well executed, he states, that even the most experienced collectors are deceived by them. Large sums of money have been paid for articles that were considered genuine treasures, but have now been pronounced spurious or of doubtful origin. So strong is the suspicion concerning the authenticity of scarabs and various bronze and gold ornaments and other articles alleged to have been found in Egypt that many collectors are afraid to risk buying them, and in an excess of caution often turn down antiquities that are undoubtedly genuine. Thus the forgeries have largely ruined the market for Egyptian historical treasures.

RIO GRANDE CROPS FLOODED AFRESH, TOWNS INUNDATED

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 20.—Twenty-one thousand acres of Rio Grande valley with crops valued at \$2,500,000 were flooded afresh in Hidalgo county, from a rise in the lower stretches of the Rio Grande as the result of flood waters which came down late yesterday afternoon from the San Juan river in Mexico, while the cloudburst flood of the upper river is nearing its crest at Laredo, 150 miles upstream, summarized the border flood situation early this morning.

Meantime the fate of 18,000 inhabitants of Piedras Negras, Mexico across the river from Eagle Pass, isolated since railroad and railroad bridges were swept out at midnight last night, is causing grave concern. Nothing has been heard from Piedras Negras since Sunday night and the Mexican city has been without water and light since that time. The city is known to be surrounded by water and the food supply is thought to be short.

5 CO-OPERATIVE LABOR BANKS ARE OPENED IN U. S. A.

CLEVELAND, O., June 20.—Five co-operative labor banks are being organized in the United States, and one was recently opened in Chicago, according to the Locomotive Engineer's Journal. Another, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Co-operative National Bank, has been in existence a year and a half, and its reported resources are nearly \$15,000,000.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Holding company has bought control of the Nottingham Savings and Banking company of Cleveland, which is capitalized at \$75,000 with reported resources of \$525,000 and has one of the oldest savings bank charters in northern Ohio. The Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship clerks has instructed its grand officers to organize a bank with a probable capital of \$500,000. The executive board of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers has obtained a charter for a bank capitalized at \$500,000 plus \$100,000 surplus. The workers of Birmingham, Ala., are organizing there the Federated Bank and Trust company with a capital stock of \$500,000. Representatives of the four transportation brotherhoods of Minneapolis, Minn., have applied for a charter for a national bank to be capitalized at \$200,000 in the twin cities.

The new Chicago bank is that of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers, capitalized at \$300,000.

OMAHA SUSPECT REFUSES TO TALK

RAWLINGS, Wyo., June 20.—Fred Brown, wanted by the Omaha police for the alleged kidnapping of two young women and other violations of the law, is recovering from a wound inflicted by a member of the posse which captured him last Saturday near Medicine Bow.

Efforts by prison officials to induce Brown to talk of his experiences or to discuss the crimes with which he is charged have been unsuccessful.

GUARDIAN STILLMAN BABY HANDLES CASE FOR STATE, WARD CASE

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 20.—John E. Mack of Poughkeepsie, New York, guardian of Baby Guy Billman, has been retained to prosecute Walter S. Ward, wealthy baker's son, when he faces trial on a charge of first degree murder for the slaying of Clarence Peters, former editor.

Announcement of Mrs. Mack's retention as special assistant to District Attorney Weeks was made public today.

Justice Morschauer today will resume his investigation into Mr. Week's complaint that George J. S. Ward, father of the defendant, Walter S. Ward, with others, "conspired to obstruct justice."
