

YANKEE HOUSES IN CANTON HIT CHINESE SHELLS

Damage From Gunboat Fire
Not Known — American
Warships On Way — Sun
Yat Sen Asked to Cease—
Foreigners Flee.

PEKING, June 20.—Word that Americans in Canton were endangered was received at the legation here today in a message from the American consul at Canton. The extent of the damage to American property was not stated. The consul had protested to Sun Yat Sen against indiscriminate firing along the bank, the macadamized way on the waterfront.

PEKING, June 20.—(By Associated Press.) The American buildings in Canton were struck by shells during Sunday's bombardment of the city by the gunboats of Sun Yat Sen, the south China leader, who has been trying futilely to recapture his stronghold. Jacob Gould Schurman, the American minister, has asked Rear Admiral Strauss to rush protection to Canton and American gunboats are expected to proceed there.

PEKING, June 20.—Foreigners at Canton were forced to flee for safety from the indiscriminate firing of Sun Yat Sen's gunboats Sunday, according to a Canton dispatch to foreign legations here. Two thousand persons boarded a vessel when hostilities opened and went to Hongkong.

LONDON, June 20.—A Shanghai dispatch to the Morning Post says it is rumored that Sun Yat Sen, former head of the southern Chinese government, is on his way to Shanghai on a warship. He is said to be accompanied by Wu Ting Fang, who was foreign minister.

JAIL TERM AND FINE FOR BOOZE SELLING

YAKIMA, Wash., June 20.—E. F. Daudelin, proprietor of the Public Drug store, was this morning sentenced to spend 20 days in jail and fined \$100 on his conviction in the police court of selling intoxicating liquor. This is the first time in the history of the Yakima police court that a jail sentence has been meted out for this offense. Judge R. B. Milroy stated. Mayor R. D. Rovig appeared as the city's prosecutor, as the city attorney was busy in superior court. Daudelin's clerk, B. W. Witten, similarly convicted, was let off with a fine. Both druggists appealed.

KILBANE RULED OUT OF FEATHER TITLE

NEW YORK, June 20.—The New York state boxing commission today ruled that Johnny Kilbane of Cleveland had vacated his title of world's feather weight champion by failing to accept the challenge of Johnny Dundee of New York. Kilbane no longer will be recognized in New York state as the champion.

KANSAS AGITATORS' STAND NOT O. K.'D BY LABOR HEARS

CINCINNATI, June 20.—(By Associated Press.) By an overwhelming vote, the American Federation of Labor convention today refused to consider a resolution proposing that it congratulate Alexander Howatt and August Dorchy, leaders of the Kansas miners, for their stand against the Kansas industrial court. The decision was referred to the United Mine Workers of America.

During the debate, the lie was passed between President John L. Lewis of the Miners' union, who expelled Howatt and Dorchy from the miners' organization, and Joseph Lynam, a delegate from the Peoria trades and labor assembly, who introduced the resolution. When Lynam sought to discuss the resolution, Lewis made a point of order. Merits of the point was discussed by the convention and frustrated by President Gompers, who was presiding.

"Is the American Federation of Labor going to double-cross Howatt and Dorchy the same as John L. Lewis has done?" asked Lynam, who then added that "Howatt was a delegate to the convention but was not present because he is in jail, where he was sent by Lewis."

Mr. Lewis then pressed his point of order and while Mr. Gompers was repeating his ruling, Lynam interrupted to reiterate his assertion that Howatt had been sent to jail by Lewis.

"The gentleman is a liar!" said Lewis. "So are you, Jack!" rejoined Lynam.

With William Z. Foster sitting among the spectators, the convention without debate or dissent reaffirmed its declaration, first adopted in 1901, in favor of autonomy of craft unions affiliated with the federation as opposed to the amalgamation of these unions. Mr. Foster, a leader of the amalgamation plan, who arrived here today announced he would address a mass meeting on Friday night. Resolutions aimed at the state militia, state constabulary and private detective associations, employed during industrial disputes, were adopted without objection by the convention.

DECREASE SECOND CLASS MAIL LOOMS

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The administration is considering the matter of decreasing second class postal rates. It was said today at the White House. Considerable discussion was given to the subject at today's cabinet meeting and President Harding and Postmaster General Work were inclined to believe that a least a part of the increase in the second class rates made during the war should now be removed.

BONUS BILL AGAIN DELAYED, SOLONS MAD ABOUT IT

WASHINGTON, June 20.—An effort to get the soldiers bonus bill before the senate today failed, the senate adopting 51 to 22, a motion by Senator Watson, republican, Indiana, to lay on the table a motion by Senator Walsh, democrat, Massachusetts, to displace the tariff bill with the bonus.

"This is the third time that an effort has been made to postpone, delay and by that means, kill this bill," said the Massachusetts senator.

Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, declared that the object of today's proceeding was to prevent passage of the bonus bill at this session.

"This bill is being made the football of contemptible politics," said Senator Robinson. "I ask you after two years of playing with this question to stand up like men and dispose of it."

LUMBER RATES EAST REDUCED JULY 1ST

There seems to be an impression that a reduction will not be made in east bound freight rates on lumber effective July 1st, but the head of the Southern Pacific railroad freight department wired Mark Montgomery, the local S. P. agent, today to notify shippers as follows:

"Effective July 1st, rates on lumber to St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City will be reduced from the Pacific coast to 60 cents per 100 pounds, and to Chicago and St. Louis the new rate will be 72 cents; or a reduction of 12 cents at St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City, and one cent at Chicago and St. Louis. Rates in related territory to be adjusted accordingly."

RIO GRANDE FLOOD FORCES THOUSANDS OUT OF HOMES

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Advices from Mexico to the state department this afternoon said the government offices at the international bridge at Laredo were abandoned, that 1500 persons in Nuevo Laredo had been driven from their homes and that business houses, including two American stores had been flooded.

Troops were guarding the flooded area and train schedules across the river had been annulled. The consulate building in Nuevo Laredo was still 15 feet above water when the message was sent.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., June 20.—Bodies of several flood victims have been seen floating down the Rio-Grande at Mier, Mexico, 130 miles west of Matamoros and opposite Roma, Texas, according to telegraphic advices received at Matamoros late today.
