

SUSPENDED JAIL SENTENCE GIVEN SPEED VIOLATOR

A speed demon in the city of Medford will be a rare curiosity in a year from now if all of them receive the same penalty as was meted out to one who came before Justice Glenn O. Taylor this morning.

This gentleman was arrested several days ago near the town of Rogue River. Officer Hamaker, who is a member of the state traffic force and who is always around when speeders least expect, caught him making other objects on the highway appear as though they were in reverse. His speed was about 48 miles per hour and as the limit is 30, the man in the O. D. uniform and mounted on the little tin steed decided that 48 was too much.

The speeder was brought before the judge this morning and was sentenced to 30 days in jail and had his driver's license taken away from him for a period of six months. The jail sentence was suspended as long as the offender remains on his good behavior. This was the second time that this particular person was brought before the judge on a speeding charge.

The name is withheld because of the claim that he would lose his position if it became public.

FAVOR RADIO FOR POLICE BUSINESS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Resolutions favoring government control of the national bureau for criminal identification and asking for radio equipment for all police stations and a standardized police uniform throughout the country were adopted today at the annual convention of the international association of chiefs of police. Other resolutions adopted called for the standardizing of traffic signals and the regulation of pool halls and kindred places of amusement.

The train started just as McDaniel made a grab for the greenback. He was taken to a local hospital. He recovered the money.

FRENCH CONCERNED MOSCOW VISIT OF GERMAN MILITARY

PARIS, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—French official circles are displaying considerable concern over the arrival in Moscow of a German military mission of which Colonel Bower, chief aide to General Ludendorff, and Col. Hentze, an assistant of Hugo Stinnes, are members. The officials say they have reason to believe the military men have gone to Moscow to make a survey of the soviet army with a view to a possible accord between Germany and Russia.

The presence of German officers in Moscow and the recent warlike utterances of M. Freundt, chief of staff of the bolshevik army, are regarded with significance by the French officials.

TRANSFER CONTROL OF SILVER MINTS

DENVER, Colo., June 21.—Transfer of English control of the silver market to the American mining interests by the formation of a North and South American silver producers association and international cooperation to prevent substitution of other metals than silver for subsidiary coinage were the principal points advanced today before the western mining conference here.

Other speakers urged that the enormous increase of world credits and financial transactions make necessary an increased volume of basic money.

HARVARD BAN ON HEBREWS OPPOSED BY A. F. L. MEET

CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Four amendments to the constitution of the United States and repeal of the Sherman anti-trust law were recommended today to the American Federation of Labor convention by the special policy committee.

Without discussion or opposition, the convention today adopted a resolution favoring an investigation of the alleged discriminatory action which is said to be contemplated by Harvard college, to bar admission of Hebrews as students.

The convention adopted resolutions favoring a congressional investigation of parcel post rates and ordering Federation officers to investigate the federated press to determine if it is fair in presentation of labor news.

Fewer working hours for postal employees, who work night shifts was favored by another resolution adopted. The convention also voted its endorsement of labor courses in colleges.

Wood F. Axton, of Louisville, Ky., a tobacco manufacturer, was the first employer to address the convention since it opened ten days ago. He declared his stand with organized labor and added that "the federation has done more for humanity than any force in the world."

KATO, NEW PREMIER, TO CUT JAP ARMY



The cabinet chosen by Admiral Baron Tomosaburo Kato, the new premier has been confirmed. It contains several members of the cabinet of former Premier Takahashi and includes seven peers. Kato was the leading Japanese delegate to the Washington Arms conference.

PROPOSE \$200 PER DAY LICENSE ON CARNIVALS, ETC.

The city council last night with members Antle and Keene absent, and with the mayor and members Miles, Gaddis, Dressler and Lumsden present, disposed of a large amount of routine business and discussed a proposed ordinance to charge a license fee of \$200 a day for all traveling carnivals and tent theatrical tent shows, which would practically bar such amusements from showing in Medford.

As the intention is to bar only objectionable carnivals and tent shows and not bar legitimate attractions with legitimate features the council decided to give the tentative ordinance under consideration much further study and have important changes made before voting on it. The proposed ordinance does not apply to circuses, which will be allowed to show as heretofore at a license fee of \$50 a day per ring.

All over Oregon the various cities and towns, including Portland, are legislating against carnivals, street shows and other similar traveling attractions, which take much money out of the city and give poor entertainment in return. Especially is the legislation aimed to bar out all gambling contrivances and games of skill and chance, and this is the main purpose of the proposed new Medford ordinance, which has heretofore charged carnivals and theatrical tent attractions a \$50 per day license fee.

The council, acting at the behest of the property owners of Haven street, whose spokesman at last night's meetings was George Kuzman, decided to co-operate with the property owners and not only grade and gravel Haven street, but to open that thoroughfare up to connect with South Grape street.

The cost to each lot owner of this much needed and long desired improvement is \$15 per lot. The city owns three lots on the street and will stand its share.

A number of minor ordinances relating to straightening out property titles were passed.
