

SESSIONS ASHLAND SUMMER SCHOOL NOW UNDER WAY

ASHLAND, June 21.—A splendid opportunity for accomplishing advanced work, also for making up deficiencies, is afforded by the summer school now in session here as a fixed educational asset of the town. In emphasizing its importance and availability, Supt. Briscoe states that "it is perfectly safe to say that children who are not strong in any of the grades will have opportunity to make themselves safe in their regular grade and those of advanced type will stand a good chance of being advanced to the next grade."

The purpose of the school is to give practice teaching to the normal students. However their work will be closely supervised by three experienced teachers chosen for their known ability along their special lines.

It is a double opportunity for our community as the children have the six weeks instruction and at no cost to the individuals or to the community.

The school began on Wednesday, June 21. Sessions commence at 8 in the morning and close at 11:45 each day. Pupils will take their regular grade books with them. There will be no afternoon sessions.

It is hoped that there will be from 100 to 200 pupils present themselves for instruction. Remember there are no charges, and that the instruction will be high class work.

A practice school is connected with this summer normal as an important adjunct, and is conducted during the same hours.

The summer normal starts out with a registration of nearly one hundred students, the sessions covering six weeks, and the gathering place is the high school building, the structure and its spacious grounds appearing to best advantage during the early summer months. Among the faculty is Peter Spencer, local high school grad and teacher, who has completed the course at the state university, and who will hereafter be associated with the corps of instructors at that institution.

With sessions held nominally in the forenoon only, this circumstance affords abundant opportunity for vacation hours, and nowhere else are such privileges so freely available as exist within the limits of this city and its immediate vicinity.

Among a multiplicity of picnics being held in the parks, a reading event was the one held by Trinity Episcopal church on Wednesday, the outing being a "basket" attraction, these recaptures being more than well filled.

Malta commandery meets Wednesday evening, June 21. In addition to a stated business session there will be work in the Red Cross. The matter of adjourning for the summer months will also be under consideration.

News Summary of Last Night

CINCINNATI—Government ownership and operation of the railroads will not be an issue in the threatened strike of 1,000,000 shop workers and others, spokesmen for the rail unions told the American Federation of Labor convention, which responded by withholding a reaffirmation of the federation's stand in favor of the adoption of such a policy.

CHICAGO—Disaster for the striking railway unions and unfortunate results for their membership was predicted to follow the threatened walkout on which a strike vote is now being taken by nine railroad labor organizations in a letter from B. W. Hooper, chairman of the railroad labor board to the union leaders.

SAN FRANCISCO—A conference of public utility commissioners from far western states to discuss the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific separation question closed with a telegraphic appeal by the commissioners of California, Arizona and New Mexico to the Interstate commerce commission to expedite its proposed consolidation scheme for the two railroads under authority of the transportation act of 1920.

CHAUTAUQUA, N. Y.—The board of directors on the general women's clubs in session here endorsed the principles of the non-partisan tariff league, and decided to send to the 2,000,000 members of the federation information on the work of the tariff league.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Senator Guglielmo Marconi, wonderman of the wireless, announced the invention of what might be termed a radio searchlight by means of which radio waves, which can be reflected like light waves, may be sent in a given direction in a beam, instead of being scattered to all points of the compass.

RAINS IN CANADA AND WHEAT DROPS

CHICAGO, June 21.—Rains in the Canadian northwest and generally cooler weather elsewhere led to a moderate downturn in price of wheat today shortly after the opening. Initial prices here were higher in response to an advance in Liverpool quotations, but removal of apprehension as to damage by drought in Canada was soon reflected in values here. The opening, which varied from unchanged figures to 1c higher, with July \$1.12 3/4 to 1.13 and September \$1.13 3/4 to 1.14, was followed by slight general gains and then by a setback all around to below yesterday's finish.

Corn and oats were firmer, owing to less favorable crop conditions for corn. After opening unchanged to 3/4c higher, July 62 3/4 to 63 1/4, the corn market scored slight additional gains.

Oats started unchanged to 3/4c higher, July 35 to 35 1/4 and later hardened a little more.

Provisions were a trifle firmer in line with hog values.

MRS. OLESEN WINS U. S. SENATE RACE IN MINN. PRIMARY

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 21.—Returns from Minnesota's state wide primary Monday were sufficiently near completion today to show Mrs. Anna Dickie Olesen far in the lead of Thomas Meighen, her nearest opponent for the democratic nomination for United States senator.

Frank B. Klogan, junior senator from Minnesota and one of President Harding's stalwarts in the senate, who was renominated in the republican primary over Ernest Lundeen, will face the political barrier with Mrs. Olesen next fall along with Henrik Shipstead, the farmer-labor nominee.

The first woman to sit in congress—Miss Jeannette Rankin—came out of the northwest when Montana voters sent her to the lower house in 1916. Whether the northwest will give the senate its first woman member will be answered at the polls in Minnesota next November.

Miss Grace F. Kaerscher of Ortonville was the republican nominee for clerk of the supreme court. Governor J. A. O. Preus and other state officials were nominated.

FRENCH POETESS FOUND GUILTY KILLING SPOUSE

PARIS, June 21.—(By Associated Press.) Madame Marie Besanobe, poetess and playwright, was found guilty today of the premeditated murder of her husband, Georges, whose body was found concealed in a trunk at Nancy two years ago. The court found there were extenuating circumstances.

Her daughter by her first husband, who also was on trial, was found not guilty.

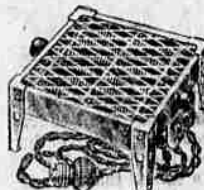
A love story of much appeal is woven around this pair, with the story fitting from San Francisco to the South Seas.
