

G. A. R. ROUSED BY SLUR ON MEMORY OF ABE LINCOLN

Desecry Attempt to Force Use of Johnson's History in the Schools of Dixie — Expect President and Congress to Act On Resolution.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 22.—Members of the Grand Army encampment spent this forenoon's session considering the action of the United Confederate Veterans in session at Richmond in what was declared to be a malicious attack on the memory of Lincoln and his purpose in bringing about the civil war. A condemnatory resolution was proposed, but finally, by unanimous vote, it was decided the better way to meet the situation was to ignore it. H. P. Burdick of Tacoma, assistant adjutant and quartermaster general, while favoring the action which the encampment took, expressed his private opinion that President Harding and congress should not lightly pass over the in-

cident and permit the history of H. W. Johnson, in which the attack on Lincoln is also made, to be used as a text book in the public schools of the south. A resolution was passed endorsing the Burleson-Morgan pension bill now before congress. Election of officers was made a special order for 4:30 o'clock this afternoon. Nomination of Enoch Sears of Spokane, junior vice-president commander for department commander, is said to be assured, other candidates having withdrawn.

NORTHWEST PIONEER CALLED BY DEATH

SEATTLE, June 22.—William W. Haines, 94 years old, said to be one of the oldest pioneers of the Pacific northwest, is dead at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. D. Bordeaux, here. Mr. Haines crossed the plains in 1852, settling at Coos Bay, Oregon. His activities extended throughout the entire northwest and he had a wide acquaintance among the early settlers of the district. He came to Seattle five years ago from Eugene, Oregon. Mr. Haines leaves two sons, C. W. Haines, Everett, Wash., and J. A. Haines, Oakland, Calif., and five daughters, Mrs. Grant Thompson, Lawn, Oregon; Mrs. H. L. Morton, Winthrop, Wash.; Mrs. W. W. Stevens, Homedale, Idaho; Mrs. Clara Ellis, Burns, Oregon, and Mrs. Bordeaux. Funeral services will be held at Eugene, Oregon, where Mr. Haines lived for many years.

NEW ATHLETIC CLUB TO HOLD SMOKER FRIDAY, JUNE 30TH

The gymnasium of the Medford Athletic club is practically complete and several local young men will begin training tonight for an amateur smoker which K. O. Bob Brown, the promoter of the club, has planned to stage a week from Friday night, June 30th. Two showers with cement floors have been installed and hot and cold water will be available at any time, day or night. The gym will be open at all times and members may make use of the facilities and equipment whenever they desire. A 20-foot ring is now complete and is the best ring in the city as it is solid, having been built on permanent supports. A punching bag and sand

bag have been installed and a hand ball court will be completed by the middle of next week as will bleachers to seat the spectators at the amateur smokers.

If the members are desirous of having a velley ball court, horizontal bars and other equipment in addition to the already adequate facilities, Mr. Brown will install them provided that enough of the members make use of them.

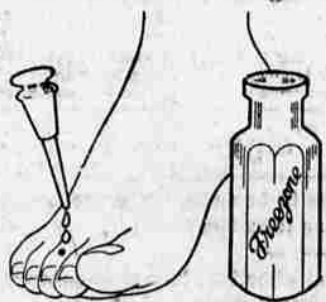
MORAL PREVERT IS GIVEN LIFE

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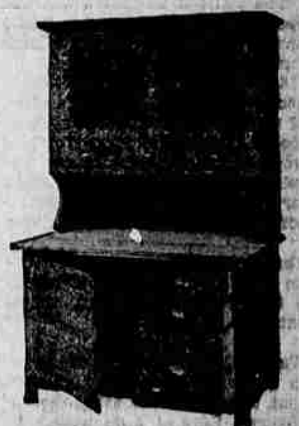
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
