

JACKSON BOYS AT O. A. C. HAVING TIME OF YOUNG LIVES

Four Jackson county boys are having the time of their lives at the college these days, where they are getting their first taste of a college education. They are John Bohner of Central Point and Ord Reed, Delbert Anderson and Roland Cate of Medford. They are under the watchful eye of Lloyd Moss, one of the college's most popular county club leaders.

"The youngsters are enjoying every minute," says Moss. "Delbert is one of the cheer leaders of the general assembly every day, where they sing and give club yells. John is the only one in calf club work, and he is getting a lot of valuable points on stock judging."

The daily program of the boys farmers and stockmen includes demonstrations of beef and sheep judging, talks on poultry, small fruits, soils and dairying. This week they are specializing in potatoes and corn and dairy testing. Friday a general stock judging contest is scheduled at the college pavilion.

The day starts for Jackson's delegation at 6 a. m., according to Lloyd Moss. Everyone piles out of bed, and after an hour of brisk exercise, breakfast is served at Pelling hall at 7. From 8 to 9 they go back to their rooms at Cuthbert hall, and "police up." Class work is held from 9 to 12. General assembly at 1:30 follows luncheon. The afternoon until 6 being devoted to swimming, tennis, baseball and athletic games. After dinner a social hour is observed until 10 o'clock, when lights are out and everyone is in bed and asleep.

"I'm coming back next year and bring 15 boys with me," declares Delbert Anderson of Medford. "I want to line up a baseball team to lick that Lane county bunch." Lane holds the baseball championship so far.

DAKOTA WHEAT IN NEED OF RAIN AND HEAT HURTS CROP

CHICAGO, June 22.—Reports from South Dakota that heat and drought were endangering the wheat crop tended to bring about higher prices for wheat here today in the early dealings. Unless rain comes soon, it was said, the yield of wheat in a large section would be reduced in a material degree. Heat damage advices from Nebraska counted also as a bullish factor. The opening ranged from 1-8 decline to 1/4 advance, with July 1.13 to 1.13 1/2 and September 1.13 1/2 to 1.13 3/4, was followed by a moderate general advance the then something of a reaction.

Calendar buyers were again active in the corn market but were met by commission house selling. After opening 1-8 off to 1/4 higher, July 62 1/2 to 62 3/4, the market sagged a little all around.

Bad crop reports especially from Illinois gave strength to the oats market which opened 1-8 to 1/4 higher, July 25 7-8 and after a slight reaction, scored further gains.

Provisions were steady despite the weakness of the hog market.

ENGLISH HEALTH BILL DEFEATED

LONDON, June 22.—(By the Associated Press)—The government was defeated on a financial amendment to the national health insurance bill in grand committee of the house of commons today. The committee immediately adjourned in order that the government might consider its position. The government was defeated yesterday in the house of lords on the question of the Palestine mandate.

The amendment was carried against the government by a vote of 20 to 14.

The defeat is considered in political quarters as of no greater importance than that which occurred in the house of lords yesterday and as unlikely to lead to modification of the government's policy.

PORTLAND VANTAGE IN FREIGHT RATES MEETS OPPOSITION

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 22.—Declaring that discrimination of two sorts will exist should state rates be not reduced, effective July 1, to the level recommended by the interstate commerce commission recently for interstate rates, O. O. Calderhead, rate expert for the department of public works, opened the hearing before the department called to determine the disposition of state rates here this afternoon with a statement of the situation.

"Such commodities as move in volume both state and interstate in this territory would be discriminated against when movement is entirely within the state," said Mr. Calderhead, who pointed out that the present interstate rate from Portland, Oregon, to Connell, Washington, is thirty cents, which is the same as the rate from Seattle to Connell, the distances being approximately the same. The interstate reductions would mean that the Portland-Connell rate would become 27 cents while the rate from Seattle would be as at present, thus discriminating against Seattle, it was indicated.

"If state rates are not decreased to the interstate level, the state traffic will bear and contribute to the aggregate revenue of the carriers an amount proportionately greater than that borne by interstate commerce in the same territory and state commerce as a whole will in that respect be discriminated against and in favor of interstate commerce," he continued. "Last year the interstate freight revenue of the Great Northern railroad within the state was \$5,032,705, and the revenue \$3,669,621, the ratio of freight revenue being 58 percent interstate commerce and 42 per cent state. By assuming that a ten percent reduction in interstate rates is to be accomplished, the interstate revenue would be only 55 percent and the state revenue proportion 45 per cent."

Mr. Calderhead also stated that since increases in state rates had always been made to conform to interstate commerce commission orders he felt the present reductions in state rates were justified and should be made over the lines of the smaller carriers as in the case of the larger carriers.

Representatives of the various railroad companies operating in the state were present at the hearing.

NET REVENUE ESPECIALLY FOR MAY INCREASES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—The net revenue of the Southern Pacific company from railroad operation in the five months ending with May were \$21,024,017, or an increase of \$2,996,693 over the same period in 1921, according to a statement issued today by the company. The net railway operation income for the period was \$12,047,825, an increase of \$1,869,129 over the parallel 1921 period. The income is derived after subtracting taxes, uncollectible revenue and equipment and joint facility rents from the revenue.

The May revenue from the same class of operation was \$4,415,124, an increase of \$2,106,940 over May, 1921. The May income was \$2,456,066, an increase of \$1,983,839.

CHICAGO, June 22.—(By Associated Press). ASKS TO BE NAMED PREFERRED CREDITOR

PORTLAND, June 22.—Argument on the petition of A. W. Stone of Medford to be classed as a preferred creditor against Morris Bros. Inc., defunct bond house, was made Tuesday afternoon before Federal Judge Wolverton by Gus Newbury of Medford.

In August, 1920, Louise Leonard deposited \$228 with the bond house, with instructions to secure for her a 6 per cent Canadian gold bond. Newbury stated. In December, 1920, Stone mailed Morris Bros. a Canadian bond of that description and asked them to sell it for him. The bond was delivered to Louise Leonard and a check mailed to Stone, but before Stone cashed the check the bond house went bankrupt.

Robert Maguire, attorney for the trustees in bankruptcy, contested the petition, claiming that the money was squandered by the bankrupt and never came into possession of the trustee. Judge Wolverton took the petition under advisement.
