

MINE UNION DENY RESPONSIBILITY IN ILLINOIS OUTRAGE

CINCINNATI, June 22.—(By Associated Press). Philip Murray, vice president of the United Mine Workers of America, commenting today on the mine troubles at Herrin, Illinois, said: "Insofar as President Lewis' message is concerned, it positively could not have had any bearing on the occurrences at Herrin. The organization denies any responsibility for the trouble. We must await more definite reports from Herrin before saying more."

President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, said as he understood from press reports from Herrin, Illinois, that the firing first came from within the mine stockade and it was then that the miners returned the fire. "Organized labor," said Gompers, "does not countenance any such acts from either side."

"The strike is on far too high a plane," added Mr. Gompers, "for violence to have any place in it."

Commenting on reports that a message from President Lewis of the miners had been received at Herrin terminating the miners at work there as "common strikebreakers," Mr. Gompers said he was "confident that the letter did not start the trouble" and he added "there was something else behind it."

VICTIMS DIED OF FRIGHT, ALIBI OF UNION WORKERS

HERRIN, June 22.—The union miners deny they killed any strikebreakers.

The correspondent accused a striking miner and the following conversation followed:

"How many were killed?" the correspondent asked.

"No one killed at all."

"Why, the dead are all over," the correspondent countered.

"We didn't kill them, they just dropped dead from fright when we surrounded their camp."

The striker then asked whether the militia was coming here, adding, "if the militia comes down here, that will mean just so many more guns for us."

The fighting has ceased and the only signs of the fight at the Strip mine are occasional piles of spent bullets. Groups of strikers are on all corners of Johnson City, Marion Westfrankfort and Herrin.

In attacking the Strip mine this morning the strikers surrounded it, "went over the top" of the high coal embankment surrounding the surface colliery in unison and took the mine employees prisoners. The prisoners then were divided among groups of strikers and taken in different directions.

ACCEPT YAP PACT BUT MORE CARE IN FUTURE URGED

TOKIO, June 22.—(By Associated Press). The Yap treaty with the United States was approved by the privy council and Japanese prince regent today. The treaty fixes the rights of each nation in the island which is under Japanese mandate.

The government's position on the Yap question was deemed unsatisfactory by the committee which investigated the treaty, for the privy council, and the committee requested the government to use greater care in the future when dealing with such grave negotiations. However, the committee reported the treaty favorably to the council through desire to respect the foreign relations of the empire and the spirit of the Washington conference.

The council unanimously approved the treaty, which then was sanctioned by Crown Prince Hirohito, the regent to the throne. Letters of ratification, it was said, would be signed and despatched to Washington within a few days by an official messenger.

SANTA FE FLYER IS DERAILED, KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kans., June 22.—Four cars of westbound Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe passenger train No. 1, Chicago to California, were derailed shortly before noon, at Corliss, near Holliday, Kansas, 15 miles west of Kansas City, according to meagre report received by officials of the road here. A number of passengers were reported slightly injured. The cars were reported piled against a bluff. The Kansas river runs on opposite sides of the track.

EXPECT FIGHTING TO BE RESUMED IN CANTON DISTRICT

AMOI, China, June 22.—(By the Associated Press).—More fighting is anticipated in the region of Canton. Ten thousand troops loyal to Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of the China republic, are reported returning toward Canton from a northern expedition.

Dispatches from Canton dated Monday said developments since Saturday had been unimportant. Fighting had ceased. Sun's routed troops were awaiting reinforcements. The city's railroads and strategic positions held by Chen Chiang-Ming, the general who, in the interest of the Peking government, drove Sun Yat into exile and reported capture.

Casualties in the Canton fighting are estimated here at 200. The American consul and the commander of the United States destroyer 217, which was stationed at Canton, boarded a Chinese cruiser to protest against the firing near foreign concessions. Sun's wife is missing and believed a captive.

PROSECUTION ENDS MADALYNNE'S CASE

LOS ANGELES, June 22.—Possibility that the state would close its case in the second trial of Madalynne Obenchain for the murder of J. Bel-

ton Kennedy, tomorrow, was expressed early today by prosecution counsel.

The trial was resumed today in the hall of justice, following a day in which the sessions were held at various places connected with the slaying of the young broker at Beverly Glen, a suburb August 5, last.

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
